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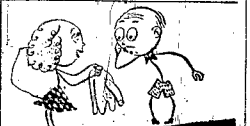



Americans Must Make Democracy Work in Nation

To be thankful that this country is not at war is not sufficient. We must do all in our power to make democracy work.

"America must think in terms of peace and not enter the war." These statements were made at Wayne college Wednesday evening last week by Howard Pierce Davis, news analyst who recently returned from Europe.

Mr. Davis said August 5, 1914, should be remembered as a date symbolic of what happens to a civilization when technical and scientific development outstrips social development. And November 11, 1918, should go down in history as marking the ascendancy of common sense and peace.

The speaker pointed out further that the Versailles treaty was a victory without peace, for six months later the Armistice nations had violated the peace principles.

"Germans forgot the horrors of a war because they experienced a peace worse than war," stated Mr. Davis. In 1933 they were ready for a dictator. Hitler suggested a program and in desperation the people gave it a trial.

For a time the dictator had support of 85 per cent of the German people, but recent events indicate that Germany will soon have a new government to replace Hitler's nazism, stated Mr. Davis.

The entire European situation was described by the speaker as incongruous and puzzling. Britain is fighting Germany and yet Britain does not want Germany destroyed because Germany is Britain's first line of defense against Russia.

Mr. Davis believes there is hope for permanent peace as nations are tired of war. A movement for a federated Europe is very prevalent and may solve the European troubles.

In Touch With Relief. The American Red Cross keeps in close touch constantly with war relief. The Red Cross is also cooperating with other relief agencies to coordinate the needed work.

If conflict continues the needs will increase and the best efforts of all will be required.

Girl Scouting Is Helped by Grant

Miss Dorothy H. Taylor Is in Wayne Two Days to Assist Groups.

To help each girl to become more adequate and poised as an individual and to become a contributing member in a group. This objective is being stressed in the girl scout program which is being enlarged through the Phillips gift.

Phillips grants have been given for both boys' and girls' work in Nebraska. The sum for girls, placed in the hands of a coordinating committee with Mrs. R. L. Cochran director, is for girl scouts, camp fire girls and girl reserves. The first step is to train leaders so that they can in turn take the valuable work to girls. Boy scouting is being promoted also by a Phillips grant.

It is through the new state gift that the girls' organizations are able to send out field workers. Miss Dorothy H. Taylor, member of the national girl scout staff, has been assigned to Nebraska girl scouting work and she was in Wayne last Thursday and Friday to meet with council members and troop leaders about the program.

Two scout leaders are devoting their entire time to the work and will visit the various points about every three months. The state has 875 girl scout troops.

Girl scouting has 10 program fields in which girls may work. These are: Home making, nature, out of doors, health and safety, community life, arts and crafts, music and dancing, literature and dramatics, sports and games, international friendship. A second class scout chooses one of several activities in each of these. A first class scout picks the one field in which she is especially interested and specializes her study. Activities rather than awards are stressed.

Regular scouting is for all girls from 7 to 18 years of age. Brownie scouting is planned for girls from 7 to 10 and its program is similar to scouting, though members work only for activities.

Wayne has six troops of regular scouts and brownies.

Reserve Officers Meet at Winside

Captain Maurice Hoffman, artillery reserve and camp commandant, was in charge of the lesson on anti-aircraft defense given last Thursday evening at Winside C.C.C. camp when reserve officers of Elkhorn Valley chapter held their December meeting there.

Films supplied by Omaha headquarters were shown. Officers were present from Wayne, Stanton, Winside, Wausa and Norfolk. The January 11 meeting will also be held at the Winside camp and Earl C. Frandsen of Norfolk, captain in the infantry reserve, will be instructor.

Miss Glennie and Miss Mildred Bacon, formerly of Wayne, plan to arrive in Randolph by Christmas after a world tour. The two left last spring from New York for a trip through Europe, Africa and home by way of the Hawaiian islands.

The association, covering Third congressional district, is open to all city, county, state and federal peace officers.

Wayne County Rural School News

School Levies Low in County

Amounts for Rural and City Districts Are Among Smallest.

Wayne county's annual tax levy for educational purposes is less than the general state average. In town schools of Wayne county the average levy is 12.15 mills per \$1,000 property valuation. The state average is 16.14.

The rural school levies in Wayne county average 3.57 mills, and the state average is 6.26.

Among town and city schools the state's low average is 7.69 in Hooker county and the high, 29.25 in Sheridan. Rural school amounts vary from a low of 2.84 in Cuming county to a high of 12.81 in Scotts Bluff county.

Only seven counties in Nebraska have lower rural school tax levies than Wayne's 3.57. These are Colfax with 2.98, Cuming with 2.84, Dodge with 3.46, Platte with 3.29, Sarpy with 3.28, Stanton with 3.06 and Thurston with 3.05. Loup county has the state's highest rural levy, 12.41.

In the state 19 counties have a lower town school levy than Wayne's 12.16. They are: Adams, 10.60; Banner, 11; Butler, 11.32; Cass, 10.01; Cedar, 10.01; Colfax, 8.33; Deuel, 9.44; Fillmore, 11.48; Hooker, 7.69; Jefferson, 10.86; Kimball, 12.63; Lancaster, 11.33; Logan, 10.63; McPherson, 10; Merrick, 11.03; Nuckolls, 11.31; Otoe, 10.96; Platte, 7.82; Saunders, 10.40. Sheridan county has the highest town school tax levy, which is 29.25.

Wayne county's average school levy of 4.07 is among the lowest in the state. Only four are lower and they are: Colfax, 3.51; Cuming, 3.53; Platte, 3.83; Stanton, 3.43. The high average in the state is 11.80 in Loup county.

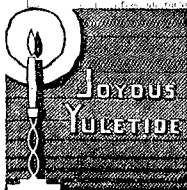

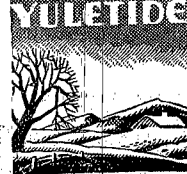
