It was said Kem was one of the very few members of congress who made financial saving from the experience in Washington. But it is not recalled that Kem made any sizable contribution to the cause of public saving service.

A nightmare to economic recovery has been the number of strikes occurring dur-ing the past seven years. Congressman Karl Stefan reports that during the five-year period from 1933 to 1938, 12,477 strikes have taken place, involving 6,401,-449 men and causing a loss of \$4,200,000, 000. During the previous five years, 1928-1932, there were 3,813 strikes, with 1,451,-784 idle men and \$260,000,000 sacrificed. Thus, while industry was trying to struggle to its feet and endeavoring to cooperate in reemployment it was handicapped by a tremendous increase in voluntary idleness with the cash loss multiplied by sixteen. It looks as though drganized labor could have made a more favorable impression on the public by waiting until lost strength had been regained before piling on obstruc-tive demands. More cooperation would doubless have speeded recovery. Mark Sullivan does not agree with the

Mark Sullivan does not agree with the belief that President'Roosevelt is the most formidable candidate that could be named for republicans to oppose, Sollivan contends that the two-term tradition would swing conservative democrats to support of the republican candidate, and that usually such democrats would be glad of the ex-cuse so to vote. Showing how an administration may pile up support to continue control, how the advantage is altogether in favor of one who wants to remain in power, Law-rence points out in conclusion that the "spontaneous wave of sentiment for a third term has given way to a deliberately controlled process by which delegates are selected through state central committees dom-inated by administration influ-ence."
