Mrs. R. W. Casper of Wayne, was elected president of Nebraska P. E. O. at the annual convention which closed in Lincoln Saturday.

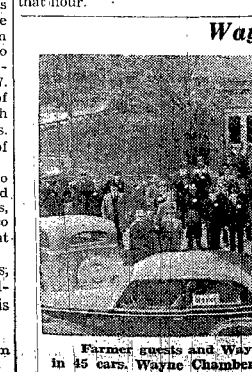

SOAKING RAIN IS RELIEF TO TENSE NERVOUS ANXIETY

ANOTHER soaking rain, reported general over the state, has for the present banished drought fears and greatly enlarged prospects for a year of normal production. The moisture would seem to furnish good ground for the hope that the grasshopper menace has been intercepted and wiped out. It is recalled that the few years' drought scourge in the seventies was suddenly ended by repeated wet spells. Agriculture has no absolute assurance this early, though conditions are much more favorable than they had been in several years. Fear that Nebraska was drying up and passing out as a rich agricultural state is effectually blasted by recent experience. With drought and grasshoppers out of the way, we will have time to devote to other sources of worry. We may pay more attention to the war abroad and the disjunct political economy at home.

Democracy Must Be Used in Home

Dr. G. L. Sandritter Gives Third of Addresses for Wayne Groups.

Democracy must be practiced in the home if it is to perpetuate in the nation, according to Dr. G. L. Sandritter of Norfolk, who addressed Wayne Parent-Teacher associations Monday evening at the city school.

When very young children should be allowed to make decisions on harmless subjects and thus learn to take the consequences of their decisions. Of course they should not be allowed to decide whether they should play in the street, for this involves danger, but they might select their clothes and take the consequences without any harm.

If children learn this responsibility for their own acts in childhood, they will pass through adolescence more safely, Dr. Sandritter explained. A parent worries about whether a child will be able to control himself, but he will be better able to if he has learned self discipline in childhood.

The child makes two changes in adolescence. He has new sensations and he begins to doubt everything. He will be able to make the physical adjustment happily if he is not worried with other things. Those who worry about accidents have the most and those who worry about physical ailments have the most of worries. Parents and teachers should gain confidence of the child. Any hesitation will lead the child to doubt and this doubt will carry over into other fields, even religion.

A criminal is one who rebels because he feels there is no place for him. Parents and teachers must help the child find his place in society. He is an individual in his own right and should be so treated.

The last address by Dr. Sandritter will be at the college the second or third Monday in May.

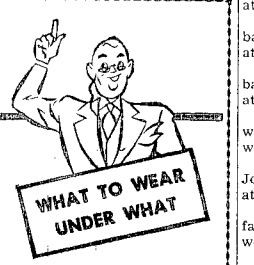

Partisan Speech

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT directed his resonant voice at young democrats' clubs, meeting at scattered dinners Saturday night, and by a network of radio connections, permitted the country to listen in. He made a political talk in which he accused republicans of trying to scare people into thinking the administration was seeking to push them into the war.

The president is uneasy lest some of the things his regime has done would be continued under a new administration. Failure at once to abandon entrenched setups on which a sick economic system is leaning, does not mean that oppression of employing institutions and a trend toward collectivism with shackled individualism, would be continued.

The president need not feel uneasy over appropriation of his plan—a plan which has piled up billions of indebtedness, multiplied bureaus, permitted an army of unemployed and kept industry and business in a fever of uncertainty. Aiding agriculture and employment will not be considered lese majesty, especially if more curatives and fewer palliatives are used, and economic health is thus permanently restored.

WILL M. MAUPIN, old-timer in Nebraska politics and journalism, recalls fifty years ago when the populist party or farmers' alliance met in Broken Bow and nominated Omar M. Kem to congress from the "Big Third" which included northeast Nebraska.

Three or four other men were candidates with only a few votes each. Now, one of the laws of the alliance was that no lawyer could be a member or receive endorsement for political office.

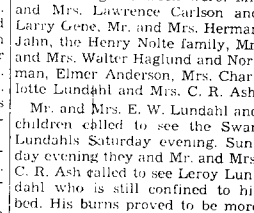

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# Land Owners Vote Monday on Proposed District

Farmers in the proposed soil conservation district vote next Monday, April 29, from 2 p. m. to 8 p. m. in five polling places on the question of establishing a district. Anyone in the district who has title to land or is an estate heir has right to vote.

polling places are: School in district 48, four miles north and three west of Wayne; Reinhardt school, district 36, one mile west and a half north of Altona; Kai school, district 73, six miles east and two north of Altona; district 53, five miles south and a half east of Windsor; Hoskins barber shop, three doors north of bank.

M. J. Hankins, conservationist, has opinions of a number of farmers who favor the proposed work. Among these are the following: "Wayne county farmers should certainly take advantage of this opportunity by voting Monday," Geo. Langenberg.

"The only way a man can measure the benefits is through a period of years. The short while I have been contour farming has thoroughly convinced me that this type of work should be applied to every farm. The fuel saving is a big factor. My tractor takes a third less fuel per day on the contour," Lyle Marotz.

"Soil is our heritage and we should conserve it for the oncoming generation. Voters will not have to drive more than four miles to vote and no land owner should consider himself too busy to vote," Alfred Sydow.

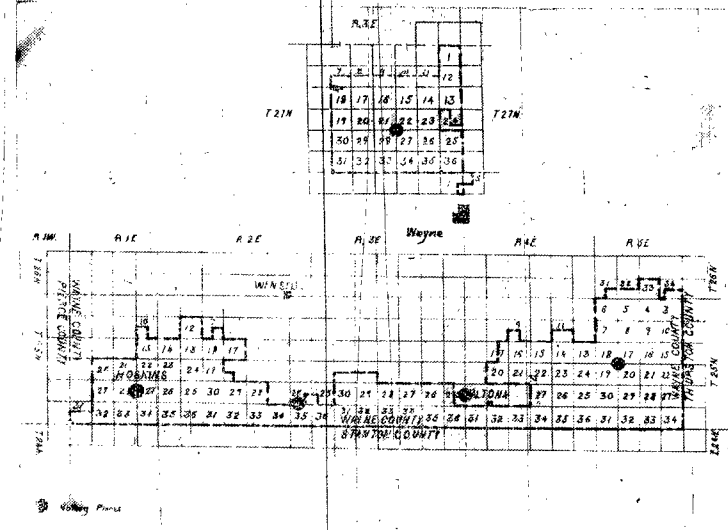
"Herman Dinklage and I will do all we can to see that the district is organized," Paul Splittgerber.

"We need a conservation district to carry out effective erosion control, and every land owner should consider it an opportunity to vote for the district," Dan Leuck.

"A district will help in conserving soil and moisture and will be of great benefit," Ed. Cauwee.

"I have started complete soil conservation program on my farm but we need a district to get this type of work applied more rapidly in Wayne county," W. A. Carpenter.

"The more I learn about soil conservation, the more enthused I get about one here. The sooner we start the work, the better," Bern-



hard Splittgerber. "Our children will be unable to move to new land when this wears out. Let's keep these farms in such a shape that our boys and girls will be glad to stay here. These are not alphabetical districts but are formed under a Nebraska law and are controlled by local men," Albert Watson.

"Land owners should understand that if their land is included in the district they will not be obligated to change their methods of farming. If they decide later to start soil conservation work, assistance will be available if this district is voted in. The district will have no authority to levy taxes or make any kind of assessments," James Greer.

"My pasture ridges are only held out recent spring rain. They were also effective in catching 1 1/2 winter's snow. It cost me only \$8 to construct ridges on 14 acres. This is only one of the several types of valuable soil conservation work that can be carried on in a district," Otto Sals.

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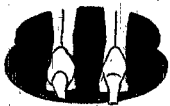

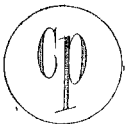

# Food Stamp Plan Is to Be Set Up In Eight Counties

This Area Is First Rural One In Country in Which Program Starts.

Federal food stamp plan for eight northeast Nebraska counties—Wayne, Stanton, Madison, Boone, Platt, Knox, Nance, Pierce—was officially designated by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace Saturday morning, this being the first rural area to be so designated and including more county units than any other in the country. It is estimated that about 30 days will be required to set the plan into operation. Wayne Chamber of Commerce has been cooperating with other organizations to establish the plan which will increase buying power of relief dollars and will also help consume surplus commodities.

The organizing crew will sponsor meetings in the counties to inform relief clients about the stamp plan. Those receiving general relief, WPA, old age, dependent children and blind assistance, also those receiving FSA grants are eligible. Each person who may use the food stamp plan will receive instructions showing where, how and when to get stamps. Each will also receive an identification card and pamphlets on how the plan operates.


**Increases Buying Power.** Clients will be able to buy \$1.50 worth of food for each \$1 spent. With each \$1 worth of orange stamps, the client is given 50¢ worth of blue stamps. Orange stamps are good for any foods, whether surplus or not. The blue stamps, which the client receives free when he buys the orange ones, are good only for foods which are listed as surplus by the secretary of agriculture. The requirement that the orange stamps be purchased insures that the regular food purchases are maintained, so the food received with the blue stamps will be in addition to regular purchases.

Present surplus foods, which may be bought with blue stamps, include butter, shell eggs, pork lard, corn meal, dried prunes, wheat flour, whole wheat flour, pork, raisins, fresh pears, fresh apples, edible beans, fresh oranges.

**Rules About Stamps.** Participation, while voluntary, must be regular after first stamps are purchased. Food stamps cannot be used to pay old bills. Food stamps must be delivered at the time stamps are taken in exchange therefor. Stamps must be detached from the stamp book in the presence of the retail food merchant or his employe. Stamp books must be retained by the person to whom they are issued and cannot be left with food merchants. Change cannot be given to a customer using food stamps. Credit slips or due bills will be used when the food obtained is not valued at 25¢ or some multiple thereof unless the difference is paid in cash by the customer. Retail food merchants or their employes cannot act as agents for persons not eligible to obtain food stamps.

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## Erosion Takes Soil Fertility Hard to Rebuild

M. J. Hankins Gives Facts About Inroads Being Made in Area.

The area of soil ruined by erosion in the United States is twice the size of the state of Nebraska. Enough soil has eroded from fields in the United States to fill a freight train that would reach around the world at the equator 37 times.

Nebraska has one million acres of land ruined by gully erosion, and the state's whole wheat acreage is three to four million acres. Erosion takes 21 times more fertility from soil than any crop. The loss of soil by crops is mild compared to the loss by erosion.

Gully erosion, which is most noticeable, is much less serious than sheet erosion from hilltops. Where one acre is affected by gully erosion, about 100 acres are affected by sheet erosion.

It takes nature from 400 to 1,000 years to build one inch of rich top soil. In fields subject to erosion, one heavy rain may wash away an inch of soil.

Planting of sweet clover, etc., will build a fourth to a half inch of soil in 100 years.

Large acreages in the east, where farming has been going on about 200 years, have been abandoned. Artificial fertilizers will not replace the fertility taken away.

Many acres worn out by erosion and cultivation have been abandoned in parts of Nebraska. This is true especially where the rich top soil has disappeared and the subsoil is worthless.

Northeast Nebraska has some of the richest soil in the world but its fertility is decreasing after 50 to 75 years of cultivation and erosion. In some instances the productivity of land has been cut 50 to 75 per cent.

Northeast Nebraska is also fortunate in having a good subsoil beneath the rich top layer. But this soil too will wear out. By using plenty of legumes and getting plenty of rain, the subsoil in this section will produce fair returns. To make farming easier and more certain, this region should conserve as much as possible of its rich top soil.

These facts, presented by M. J. Hankins, conservationist at Win-side CCC camp, explain why many farmers in Wayne county are interested in soil conservation practices.

The election next Monday, April 29, when land owners will vote on the soil district, will determine whether or not conservation measures will be taken to correct erosion which is taking land value.

John Lorenzen, who lives north-west of Wayne, measured a gully formed in four years by water following a cow path and the ditch is more than five feet deep. On another place on his farm Mr. Lorenzen placed a seven-foot steel post seven years ago and soil is now 28 inches deep on this and other posts in the area. Mr. Lorenzen favors the soil conservation plan and thinks more will when they realize its value.

When men were building a new road south of Albert Watson's, they dug down 18 inches and struck the top of a six-foot fence post. The 24-inch woven wire, which was above ground in 1917, was completely buried. The fill had been eight feet since 1917.

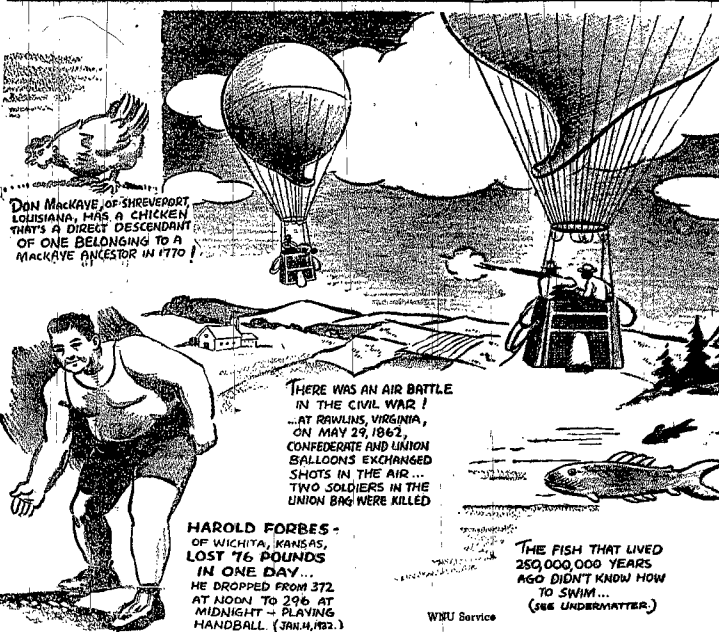

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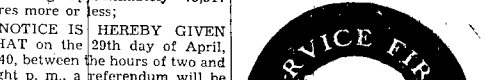

But embarrassment and humiliation he did: playing truant, stealing and finally taking an automobile and driving it about the city.

He and his two companions appeared so young that an alert officer arrested them on suspicion. Later, it was disclosed that Walter had twice before taken automobiles, driven them around town and left them within a few blocks of their original parking place.

Walter's mother, of a nervous disposition which drove her on, though exhausted, to her manual labors outside her home day by day, had managed, despite her ill health, to keep her brood of four together.

The oldest boy had assisted by sharing his earnings as a carpenter. Walter made their burden the heavier by pilfering his brother's tool box and selling some of the tools.

At school Walter was considered a superior student but extremely restless and apparently bored with his lot in life.

Learning of Walter's predicament and knowing the family situation thoroughly, the pastor of their church appeared, unsolicited, in the juvenile court hearing and asked that Walter be placed on probation to him.

By the time three months had passed, Walter felt that, in a measure, he had his father's companionship once more, for the pastor and he became staunch friends and the man's guidance was of inestimable value to the boy. The one-time truant progressed rapidly, and, now in the university, is making a record of which his "trial father" is justly proud.

Walter didn't intend to hurt and disappoint his mother by playing truant and stealing. His object in doing unconventional acts was to try to fill the void in his life where his father once held sway. A "man's boy," he must somehow satisfy his longing for manly devotion.

When the sympathetic foster-father entered his life, he adapted himself along normal, constructive lines.

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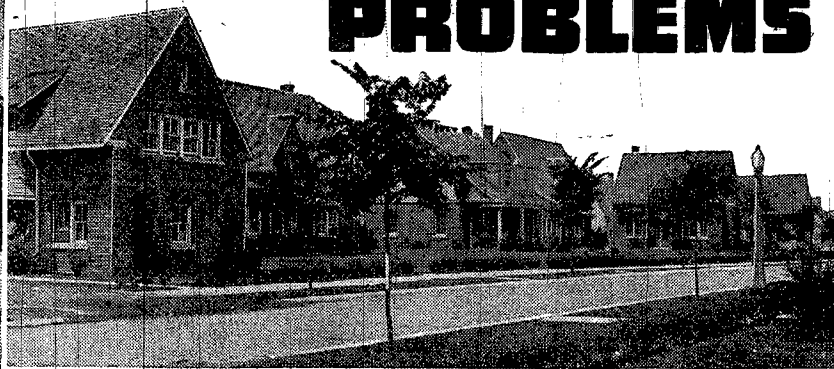

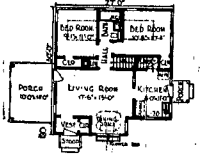

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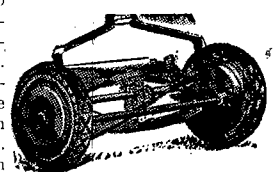
