Population of Wayne county dropped from 10,566 in 1930 to 9,869 in 1940. This loss of 697 is recorded in the decade despite the fact that the population of Wayne showed a gain of 338 to 2,719, according to report from the census office in Fremont.

The number of farms in Wayne county is 1,453, about the same as the 1930 record of 1,482. However, the county had 1,523 farms in 1935.

Red Cross Issues Urgent Call for Refugees in War Zone Abroad.

Five million refugees are depending on the generosity of the American people for food and clothing furnished them through the Red Cross.

Glimpses from Eastern Tour

Washington, D. C.
June 16, 1940.

After mailing my contribution from Chicago Friday, Mrs. Bessie Currie Crawford, who lives at Western Springs, a suburb, came to the depot to visit us. It will be remembered by many that she was in the employ of the Herald somewhat over twenty years ago. Her husband is engaged in a chemical laboratory in Chicago. He taught at one time in the Wayne city school. In Chicago the church - Presbyterian - that has more millionaire attendants than any other church in the city was pointed out to us. For revenue purposes these over-rich aspirants for heaven ought to be redistributed, leaving a few in Wayne to serve the material requirements of religion. Cities like to boast of having the most of something or the biggest things in the world.

Historic Past Preserved.

Journeying through West Virginia and Maryland as we were approaching the city of Washington yesterday morning we saw historic Harpers Ferry with our first view of the Potomac. Besides numerous historic reminders hereabouts, we found in public buildings visited yesterday likenesses or statues of the country's distinguished individuals. We noticed a memorial going up for Jefferson - little slow I thought, in getting around to it. The presidents from Washington on are embalmed in paint, marble and bronze. The increasing procession of memorials tends to keep alive the patriotic sense.

Efficiency in Investigation.

An informative experience yesterday morning was an inspection of the federal building of investigation. A young fellow who knew his story well explained that 250 young men and women, specially trained to the service, were employed in the building. He said 13,000,000 finger prints were indexed and easily available, and no two have been found alike. We saw an array of ugly artillery and other equipment captured from gangsters and other outlaws. We witnessed shooting at dummies by young men qualifying to become G-men. The building houses the activities of the G-men, department of justice and other branches serving law enforcement. For public safety, this department of the government is eminently important.

Traffic Halts for President.

We were permitted to see parts of the White House - didn't call on the president or see any of his immediate household. However, while we were parked not far from Washington's monument, street traffic was stopped to give the president full swing en route for a week-end cruise on the Potomac. A half dozen motorcycle cops were in the lead, and the president, in the back seat of an open car, waved as he hurried by.

Senate Is in Session.

At the capitol we looked in on the senate which was in session Saturday afternoon. The house had adjourned for the week. In the senate, Senators Taft and Vandenberg, rivals for the republican presidential nomination, were having an apparently friendly conversation. A woman guide explained points of historic interest. Another biggest-in-the-world idea was sprung on us as the building housing the department of commerce was pointed out. It cost \$17,000,000 and employs 7,000 persons.

Karl Stefan Serves Well.

Before taking the Potomac cruise we enjoyed a brief visit with Congressman and Mrs. Karl Stefan. Nebraska's Third district may justly take great pride in its representation in Washington. Mr. Stefan is very busy and sincerely interested in his home constituents. He is profoundly troubled by the war abroad.

Potomac Ride Soothing.

A ride down the Potomac Saturday night was recommended as a soothing experience. The night was serene, the water smooth and the moon was on duty as the program suggested. The boat's four decks were filled by sightseers or pleasure seekers, not all belonging to the editorial party. Many young persons were finishing out the week with a high time with Bacchus playing a conspicuous role. We roosted on the top deck where the best view was had of shore lines and the distant hills and lights. The ocean's tide sweeps up the Potomac

as far as Washington, so we were informed. The ride was delightful, but it rudely set aside my life habit of early-to-bed.

Washington Weather Sultry.

Sunday in Washington was largely devoted to a trip to Arlington cemetery, Alexandria and Mount Vernon. The weather felt hot to a Nebraskan in the capitol city. Though I was assured it was really cool as contrasted with the variety usually dished out there at this season. Washingtonians expect sultry heat, as people of the Imperial Valley expect torrid elements and then don't want their distinction disturbed.

Guard Tomb of Unknown.

At Arlington, innumerable stones mark the graves of honored dead. The tomb of the unknown soldier is guarded through the twenty-four hours every day. The sentry acts like a mechanical man. He walks back and forth after brief intervals of standing at attention. He makes no extra motions and recognizes no one. A great amphitheater, used for memorial occasions, stretches back from the tomb. After the unknown soldier had been selected from four for special and perpetual distinction, eleven badges of honor were bestowed by different nations, and these are on display. The grounds, on the Virginia hills near the Potomac, hallowed by dearest memories, are beautifully arranged and kept.

Past Is Preserved.

Alexandria is pointed out as Washington's "home town." Many buildings are as old as the government, and in architecture and preservation they are convincing. The town apparently tries hard to keep old age from wearing off. The building where Washington presided as master over the Masonic lodge is carefully preserved.

Visit Home of Washington.

The last stop down the river is at Mount Vernon - a thousand-acre plot of ground where the home of Washington in the original pattern is seen. Everything is old-fashioned - the rooms, each with a fireplace, and the kitchen with pots and kettles used in a fireplace according to the inconvenience of the time. Flowers and trees enrich the place.

Arrive in New York.

We crossed the Hudson on a ferry boat last night, saw the statue of liberty and Manhattan's lighted skyline in the distance. The river is about a mile wide at this point. We are headquartered at the Roosevelt (Theodore) hotel with other members of the National Editorial association.

But even if I close my ears to the radio the dread headlines of the morning paper race through my mind. And suddenly I want to chuck the half stemmed berries into the garbage pail, pull my apron over my face and cry and cry. What does it matter whether the supper I get for my family is good or not? A million families half a world away will be hungry tonight! What does it matter if the grass is cut or allowed to go to untidy seed? Utter destruction is wasting the sweet green lawns in other lands and why should I know the satisfaction of sitting on my own little porch on a sunny afternoon watching my child when women by the tens of thousands will never see their homes again? Then there is quiet in my yard as the lawn mower stops for a moment. And Johnnie, turning a grinning freckled face, waves to me from across the pansy bed. Such a flood of love pours into my heart that there is now no room for fear! My fingers reach for the berries again. For that strawberry shortcake is important! I see it now. It's part of the pattern of security and comfort and "everyday-ness" that I, as a woman, am privileged to build against this terror that stalks the world. And I know now that by every deed and word and gesture possible I must protect my children against the hysteria that is rising even here so that they may grow to manhood and womanhood as strong and fearless and hopeful as if there were no war at all. So, supper tonight is important. And it will be important tomorrow night and the next night, and the next. For there is comfort in food and a sense of blessed security as the family takes their places at the carefully set table and mother carries in that longed for shortcake.

STAND AT CROSSROAD.

"America stands today where the road divides, at the signpost of war or peace." This warning came from Col. Charles A. Lindbergh in a national radio address Saturday evening when he condemned "meddling with affairs abroad" and denounced "hysterical chatter of calamity and invasion." Lindbergh admonished Americans that "this dabbling we have been doing in European affairs can lead only to failure in the future as it has in the past." We demand that foreign nations refrain from interfering in our hemisphere, yet we constantly interfere in theirs. Now that we have become one of the world's greatest nations, shall we throw away the independent American destiny which our forefathers gave their lives to win? Shall we submerge our future in the endless wars of the old world? Or shall we build our own defenses and leave European war to European countries?"

Immediately on attaining power each dictator has suppressed all free speech except his own. The revolutions since the Great war were in most cases not the result of civil convulsions and the killing of many men. Those revolutions were the result of implanted ideas. Magic formulas were spun which promised relief to the infinite misery of war. Propaganda confused the minds and soiled the spirits of men. The news was colored and the facts were distorted. Potent catch phrases and slogans were summoned as labels for the cure of every social and economic ill. Half truths, quarter truths were amassed to prove the failure of established institutions. Just grievance was transformed into hate. Despair was fanned into destructive fear. Men were led to their own enslavement by ideas and fraud from polluted speech and press. Liberty died by the waters of her own well - free press and free speech poisoned with untruth. Untruth once triumphant could not tolerate debate and free criticism. Then free speech and press were suppressed. Truth alone can stand the guns of criticism."

One main college building and two dormitories, one for men and one for women, made up the college campus. J. M. Pile was president. Miss Stewart, Miss Colony, F. M. Gregg, F. S. Wolfe, Miss Kingsbury, Mrs. C. H. Bright, W. V. Vaughn and Mrs. Lowery made up the teaching staff. The enrollment reached a new high of 500 students. All this information was taken from the special college booster edition of the Nebraska Democrat issued in Wayne, December 5, 1902. This newspaper, yellowed with age, belongs to Geo. Bressler who found it among the possessions of his mother.

A short story in the paper told of the Democrat's gasoline engine playing out before the paper was printed. The staff then took the paper down to the Herald to be printed but after getting out a couple hundred papers that press too played out. An old-fashioned handpress had to be put into service to finish the edition.

The following are some personal items appearing in the paper: "Asher Hurlburt and James Sneath have bought a new hay press and will buy your hay or take the contract to press it for you... Clyde Omaha is now out for business in the auctioneer line and will give it his undivided attention... Claude Wright is teaching school in district No. 10 and is giving good satisfaction... Two run-aways last Saturday made it a day of rather lively interest... Miss Ringer of Wayne is teaching the winter term of school in district No. 8... George Sawidge was home a few days this week, having completed the railroad well at Wausa in a most satisfactory manner, and as George says, he made his little 15 cents on the job... The city council are at present wrestling with a bill posters ordinance, the matter having been laid over from last meeting to next Monday night. Just what use Wayne has for a bill posters ordinance is probably not clear to any one except the bill poster for whose exclusive benefit such measures are favored... A nice two-seated carriage, almost new, for sale cheap. Inquire at this office."

This old newspaper is made up of eight pages and is folded in a way entirely foreign to modern newspapers. Advertisements are all on the front and back pages. There is no foreign or national and not a great deal of local news in the early paper.

## Gerald Wright Contacts Byrd Expedition by Radio

(By Robert Wright.)  
Direct radio contact was made between the Byrd expedition at the South pole, and the bed room amateur radio station, W9WGL, operated by Gerald Wright in his home at 702 Logan street, on two occasions last week. The initial contact was made on June 13, between 3 and 5 o'clock in the morning, when a brief conversation took place. The second communication on June 17 was more encouraging as excellent transmission permitted code messages to be exchanged for half an hour, from 4:45 in the morning until 5:15.

"Gerry," who has been up at 3 every morning for several weeks trying to contact the expedition, was rewarded for his efforts by receiving a perfect RST59X report from the Byrd operator, Felix Ferranto, lieutenant in the marines. Felix is the radio operator for the snow cruiser, "Penguin," having call letters KC4USC, but at the time of the contact was operating from the west base over station KCUSA, Ferranto was the driver of the "Penguin" when it ran into a ditch between Detroit and Boston, disrupting traffic for 15 miles. A translation of a portion of the code message received by "Gerry" would read like this:

"The handle here is Felix. The temperature in the room is 73 degrees. Outside it is the same as before, 62 degrees below zero. Yes, our antennae were about 50 feet above the ground when we put them up. We are now under snow and can touch the top of them when walking on top. In a few months they will probably be underground. The time is now 3 minutes until 11 p. m. (Three until five in Wayne.) We have underground tunnels between the buildings and live on canned food. Want to get a few more contacts before the band closes up, so 73's Gerry. Try to be on the band at the same time."

The operator went on to say that the men have difficulty keeping time and schedules because of the ever present night. Gerry was interested in maintaining a schedule with the expedition but was informed that all regular contacts must be made with navy stations. There are 60 men on the expedition and 30 are stationed at the west base, their stay being uncertain. Felix sent a verification

card from the South pole, which will arrive in Wayne sometime in January. Gerry was running from 700 to 900 watts input to his homemade transmitter, which is approximately that used by a small commercial station, and the South pole operator remarked that the signals were coming in as loud or louder than any yet received. As a result a substitute was sent to cover a navy schedule and Felix continued communication with W9WGL.

This Byrd contact represents a peak in Gerry's 11 out of 20 years with radio. He is the operator of an army amateur radio station, and has certificates indicating that he has established contact with all 48 states. He is also a member of the Rag Chewers club and the Northeast Nebraska Radio club. His radio friends include people of 40 different countries, with whom he has talked on phone and code.

Other significant contacts made recently by Gerry were with China and Japan during the present war, and with the New York World's fair, where they have the WGL card on display.

Last year Gerry reached the next to the last rung on the radio ladder when he passed an exam in Kansas City giving him a class A operator's license, second only to the commercial license.

The Federal Communications Commission recently prohibited amateur radio contacts with countries other than the United States and the Byrd expedition, due to the war situation and fifth column activity.

Kenneth Peterson, operator of the amateur station W9ZAR, made a brief contact with the Byrd expedition a few weeks ago.

Any persons wishing to visit W9WGL are welcome at any time.

## Refugee Children, Innocent War Victims, Appeal to America's Heart for Survival



"DEATH-DEALING airplanes ride the skies. The carnage of their creation sweeps many lands. Armored tanks and motorized artillery roll across whole countries destroying, as in a blight, all standing in their way. Cattle, crops, homes, people—innocent and defenseless children—stand in fear, then in despair, only to fall into destruction. Some will live. They must be aided to endure, to struggle on, to survive."

This was the message directed to America's generous heart by Chairman Norman H. Davis of the American Red Cross in asking prompt contributions to a \$100,000 war relief fund to be spent by the Red Cross for help to military and civilian wounded, and the homeless people of the warring nations.

"We must send relief as needed and not too late to be of use," Mr. Davis said. "We must send clothing, bedding, shoes, medications, surgical dressings and food."  
Before the most recent devastation of neutral countries by aerial blitzkriegs was begun, the American Red Cross had sent 320,000 garments, knitted sweaters and hospital clothes for the women and children victims in England, Finland, France, Germany-occupied Po-

land and for Polish refugees in other countries. To the Red Cross societies of the nations engaged in battle, the Red Cross sent 933,000 surgical dressings. These garments and surgical dressings were made in 1,500 Red Cross chapters throughout America. In addition, the American Red Cross purchased medicines, shoes, blankets, knitted underwear and almost a thousand other items at a cost of \$1,500,000

for shipment to the Red Cross societies of belligerent nations. But with destruction, suffering, and thousands of wounded added each day to the frightful toll of war as new nations become involved, the American Red Cross appealed to the nation for at least a ten million dollar relief fund. Contributions can be made to the local Red Cross Chapter in any community in America.—Davis said.

## Kindness Shown Years Ago Still Brings Rewards

How far reaching may be the effect of a kind deed? Thoughtfulness shown a visitor, Guy Irving Waltz, gospel singer and chorus director, here some 25 years ago has prompted him to sound praises for Wayne from coast to coast. And now Mr. Waltz hopes to get in touch with Wayne residents who befriended him so he may further express appreciation by sending each a copy of his book, "Little Stories," by the "Singing Poet of Maine."

When Mr. Waltz left his home in Boston a quarter of a century ago to come to Wayne to direct a large chorus in union services at the Presbyterian church, he said goodbye to his wife and two small children. As he kissed his little 18-month-old son he had a strange feeling come over him. After singing in Wayne three days he received a telegram from his wife, informing him that the little son had passed away. Since he could not reach Boston for the funeral services, Mrs. Waltz advised her husband that he should, if possible, finish his engagement in Wayne. Mr. Waltz recalls that the hardest job he ever performed was trying to sing a solo and direct a chorus the day of his son's funeral.

On his fifth day in Wayne the chairman of the union services committee called upon the singer and said, "Mr. Waltz, we all feel sorry for you. Here is \$150. Use \$50 of it for car fare home and use the rest as you see fit while you spend the next few weeks at home with your wife and little daughter. This money will help you on the funeral expenses and pay your living while you rest at home a while."  
Mr. Waltz can't recall the name of the chairman or others on the committee, but he is anxious to get in touch with them. It was not so much the money as the real true Christian spirit shown by folks in Wayne that has aroused deep appreciation and has led the singer to spread word of this incident in many states.

At the age of 65 Mr. Waltz is still trying to bring cheer to the sick and aged. He writes that the kindness of Wayne people prompts him to continue this service. Just last week he sang for children in a hospital in Portland, Maine. "To my dying day I will remember Wayne," concludes Mr. Waltz. ## Recipes

### Breakfast Cereal with Apples.

Top dry cereal with apples pared, very thin, cover with a generous sprinkling of brown sugar and pour cream over all as a delicious note in breakfast dishes. Apple

sauce may be used instead of the raw fruit if desired.

**Eggs Ranchero**  
1 1/2 cup sugar  
1 1/4 cup egg whites (10 to 12)  
1/4 cup sifted cake flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Cook 1/2 small onion, minced, in butter until lightly browned. Add egg-milk mixture and scramble; turn into hot dish and sprinkle with 2 tablespoons grated American cheese.

**Daffodil Cake**  
1 teaspoon cream of tartar  
1/4 teaspoon vanilla  
4 egg yolks, well beaten  
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind  
Mix flour and 1/2 cup sugar, and sift three times. Beat egg whites until frothy, sprinkle with salt and cream of tartar, and continue beating until stiff enough to form peaks, but not dry. Gradually beat in remaining 1 cup sugar and carefully fold in flour-sugar mixture, sifting about 1/4 cup at a time over surface. Divide batter into 2 equal parts. Add vanilla to one part and fold well-beaten egg yolks and orange rind into other. Put by spoonfuls into ungreased large tube pan, alternating white and yellow batters. Bake in moderate-

ly slow oven (325° F.) about 1 hour and 15 minutes. Invert pan until cake is cold or about 1 hour before removing. Yield: 1 large cake.



## A Big Brother Succeeds.

His many excellent traits of character were not quite enough to prevent fine-looking Owen from succumbing to the lure of almighty drinking parties with pleasure-seeking companions. A member of one of the best families in Nebraska, Owen had an average education, a loyal, helpful wife, and held a position of trust with a large trucking concern.

Parties became an expensive burden. While drunk and brooding over his financial difficulties, Owen committed a burglary.

"Guilty" was his plea to the charge, and since it was his first offense, the court, taking into consideration his family history and past record, placed him on probation.

A civic organization provided a "big brother," who, while maintaining the strictest supervision over his ward, became Owen's close friend. No more

parties, no association with former companions—instead for more than two years regular work and regular accounting to the "big brother" was the rule.

Owen recovered his self-respect, regained his standing in his home community; and, economic conditions notwithstanding, he began to progress financially. He commenced making payments on a home and now has only 12 more monthly installments to meet before it is clear of encumbrance.

A worthwhile citizen, Owen was retained in the community as an economic producer instead of being sent to a penal institution at a cost of approximately \$450 a year to the taxpayers of the state. There are thousands of cases like Owen's in which probation, properly carried out, has succeeded. About 80 per cent of the offenders do make good if properly supervised.


