

Of September. Hoskins bonds in the sum of \$5,-000, an issue voted at a special clection early this month, were registered 'Juesday by' County Clerk L. W. Neednam, the funds to be used for imaterials in domple-tion of the new school, at that place. The bonds are in denomina-tions of \$1,000 each. They are dated August.1 and draw 3% per cent interest. A previous bond issue, dated August 1, 1938, was for \$10,000, the bonds for \$500 each. Federal grants will total about \$25,110. Farming across the slope, approximately on the contour, has increased during recent years. A gully 200 feet long on a farm northwest of Wayne was cut to a depth of six feet in four years. One gully in Stanton county was cut back a full mild across a section of good land to a depth of approx-imately 35 feet in 50 years. Sheet erosion has done much more dam-age because it affects every slop-ing, cultivated field. Many hill-spides have taken on a brownish applearance due to the loss of sev-real inches of black tertia ton scil

Loren Pohlman, seven miles north of Stanton, reports that his contour basin listing held all of a recent rain which exceeded two inches, and that his check dams held up in excellent condition. Mr. Pohlman also reports that he saves a great deal of tractor fuel for he can run his tractor in third gean all the way through the field. Bernard Splittgerber southeast of Winside, has this to say about his experience with contouring last year? "I contoured one of my fields by guess. Parts of the field were on the true contour and held the rain. Other parts were not on the contour yielded over 20 bu-shels per acre. I did not have to husk corn on the other parts, be-cause there was no corn." A year ago the Beatrice CCC camp was moved to Winsidel Since then 65 farms, totaling 13, 000 acres, have been surveyed and signed for a complete soil conser-vation program. More than 100 ad-ditional farmers have applied for assistance. Some 110,000 trees have been planted on over 100 acres, and about 300 acres of tame and native grasses have been seeded on the signed farms. About 5,000 acres on the 65 signed farms were farmed on the contour this spring.





It is the evident expecta-tion that the political juggemant that trushed wishes and aspirations in Chicago will do the same thing to the whole country.

His value to the ticket will be determined by his record as secretary of agriculture.
