



Writing for a current magazine, Congressman Fruce Barton explains that congressmen, in forming their judgment, are led more by personal letters from constituents than by any other influence. Mimeographed sheets from organizations or

other influence. Mineographed sheets from organizations or petitions from groups have less weight than letters expressing the opinions of individuals. No matter how ill-phrased a letter may be, it is given first place in congressional consideration. To letter writers he gives this advice: "State concisely what you want and why. If you don't know, don't write. Leave out clippings, even though you may think that some prepared statement best expresses your feelings. Your congressman wants to know what you think. Never threaten. Never say: Many others feel as I ido, and unless you vote, etc. A congressman is human and threats make him resentful. To Hold

IN A RECENT issue of the American Mercury, Herbert Hoover, former president, points the way to dictatorship followed by a dozen European countries, and while he thinks we have been traveling in the same direction, he believes we have the resourcefulness and power to recover economic order and retain the blessings of democracy. In foreign countries, mismanaged and weakened, helpless peoples accepted to talitarian rule, banishing free expression and free enterprise, as a relief from confusion and as a means to security. In those countries production was reduced, unemployment increased and want and despair stalked. Then dictatorships were allowed to displace human liberties.

Mr. Hoover points out 10,000,000 unemployed, 18,000,000 on relief and a reduction in the annual national income of about \$25,000,000,000 as dangers in this country. This condition is due to underproduction and under-consumption, largely the outgrowth of uncertainty and fear.

Mentioning that the American people have become conscious of a bitter experience, he offers these concluding words of hope:

"We can recover from that experience. For

"We can recover from that experience. For we have more fat on our bones than those nations which had been stripped by the Great War. We have a sounder system of liberty than those nations which still carried over a class inheritance from feudalism. Unlike them, we have no threat against our national independence which necessitates the devotion of an impoverishing portion of our income to arms. We have no need to send our sons into European war and thus plunge ourselves into that impediate totalitarianism which is the inevitable need for organization of modern war. We have the powers of invention and discovery which can give a new era of industrial progress. WPA employment is unsatisfactory to those dependent on it because it serves only immediate needs, giving no chance to provide for idleness, and if one is let out, he is likely to be thrown into desperate straits. The WPA should be accepted as an emergency prop. Those depending on it would be wise to look for more permanent and profitable work in private industry. Getting along from hand-to-mouth is better than nothing, but it is not a hopeful course to follow indefinitely because if one's services are suspended he is thrown into despair.

In the present world crisis which is clearly a conflict between dictatorships and democracies, authorities should be permitted to stop the circulation of misleading propaganda of alien flavor in this country. Free speech and free press may be destroyed by allowing insidious attempts to undernine our form of government. Propaganda reminds one of the proverbial snake that licks over his victim before swallowing him.

While the president ordinarily delights in breaking precedents, he appears extremely sensitive to establishing a new precedent at this time — debating public issues with his rival. Even if the president had an official record that could be successfully defended, he would still be no match for Willkie. It is no wonder Roosevelt shies from the proposed debate.

Whatever the administration has done that is workable in seven years could have been made better by practical leadership. Substituting Wilkie for Roosevelt and McNary for Wallace will rationalize the course of public policies and provide more efficiency with decreased costs.







nite to do every afternoon—keep an appointment at the doctor's office or at the hospital.


