Takes Own Life At Wayne Home

Collie Leads to Finding of J. E. Brittain Lifeless Here Wednesday.

City Attorney James E. Brittain, almost 47, took his own life Wednesday morning with a .32 caliber revolver, shooting himself in the right temple in the garage at his home about 10:30.

Though Mr. Brittain left no note, he had been very despondent because of ill health. He had had infantile paralysis when 3 years old and this left him crippled.

It was not the habit of the family to leave Mr. Brittain alone because he became more despondent then. As the plumber was to come to the home Wednesday morning, Mr. Brittain persuaded Mrs. Brittain to go down town to shop.

Neighbors did not hear the shot. Mr. Brittain's faithful collie, Sig, caused a commotion when a grocery deliveryman came to the neighborhood but the man did not realize anything was wrong.

Funeral arrangements, in charge of the Hiscox service, have not yet been made. James Elwyn Brittain, son of James and Mary Brittain, was born December 11, 1893, at the Brittain family home at 4th and Lincoln streets in Wayne.

Mr. Brittain married Miss Marie Gettman February 23, 1929. Besides his wife, he leaves two sisters, Miss Faye Brittain of Wayne, and Mrs. Edna Stewart of Minneapolis.

# Reach New High In Local School

## Shop Training, Offered for First Time, Is Popular With Students.

Tentative figures, compiled from records of Monday, show a new high in Wayne city school attendance. A good increase is noted in enrollment in high school and a slight decrease in grade totals. High school registration totals 269, compared with 252 last year. The senior class has 65, junior 68, sophomore 69 and freshman 67. At close of the term last spring the high school had 48 seniors, 63 juniors, 65 sophomores and 68 freshmen. The gain of 17, and perhaps more, is mainly in the junior and senior groups. This year's freshman class is smaller, due to fewer finishing the local 8th grade last spring.

Elementary grades have a tentative enrollment of 256, this including 133 girls and 123 boys. A few are yet to enter some rooms, being detained by illness or trips. The Monday figures showed 28 in the 6th, 27 in the 5th, 28 in the 4th, 26 in the 3rd, 21 in the 2nd, 31 in the 1st and 28 in the kindergarten.

**Maintain Standard.**  
Nebraska as a whole showed a decrease of 8 per cent in school population. The general trend is for smaller enrollment in lower grades, this gradually working into the upper grades. Wayne's totals throughout the school do not conform to this. Here the lower grades are maintaining their standard enrollments.

Non-resident enrollment shows a gain over last term. It is expected this total will reach 120 or more. Last year's total was 112. New enrollees in high school include: Robert Hockom who came from North Platte and Curtis Nye from Lincoln, in the junior class; Don Sieckman from Ohio, and Donald Gieschen from Leigh, in the senior class; Dewayne Buckley from Norfolk, Ralph Germeroth from Wisner, Vernon Huffman from Wakefield, and Eunice Gieschen from Leigh, in the sophomore class.

**Shop Work Popular.**  
The new shop work offered this year has proved popular, 91 being enrolled in four sections Monday. Two sections were planned at first, but four had to be organized. After a year or two, when a number have completed the work, two beginning sections and one advanced will probably handle this training.

**Arrange for Band.**  
K. D. Hanson's schedule for handling training of the city and school band will soon be arranged. Any in town or in this vicinity wishing to join the city band may see Mr. Hanson or Supt. N. F. Thorpe.

in the process of being repaired tells of the lesson on home mending. Rugs, orange crate chairs, stands and other articles made by the women illustrate the making of Christmas gifts. Money management in the home is depicted with a dollar cut into parts, each section being connected with food, clothing, car, etc., for which it is spent.

The girls' 4-H booths show the valuable information gained by club members. Among the handiwork will be seen braided, hooked and crocheted rugs, lamp shades, garments and embroidered table covers. One of the food clubs has a garden with flowers and stones, the stepping stones to health designating best foods. Correct table setting is shown in another booth, and the bird club has a miniature yard.

A 12-foot stalk of corn raised by E. P. Caauwe, information about eradication of bindweed and an exhibit of FSA are also in this hall.

**In Livestock Division.**  
The hog department is especially outstanding this year in the livestock division. A tent had to be erected to care for entries. About 40 4-H baby beavers are in the calf barn. High price of beaves and shortage of feed last year resulted in a decrease in number. The showings of chickens and cattle are good and horses fair.

**School Awards Made.**  
Wayne city school took first honors among town schools in the educational exhibit, having 360 points. Winside placed second with 303, Carroll third with 221, Sholes fourth with 142 and Hoskins fifth with 76.

Among rural schools district 65 was first with 83 points. This school was taught last year by Miss Helga Nelson. In second place, with 43 points, is district 6, taught last term by Miss Mary Noelle. Placing third is district 5 with 37 points. This school was taught last year and this term by Miss Rachel Hansen. District 26, with 32 points, placed fourth. Miss Bernadine Meyer was teacher last term. In fifth place is district 56, with 31 points, taught last year and this by Miss Anna Fredrickson.

The wood work from Winside is especially fine this year in the school display. Rural schools show twice as much wood work this year as usual, and this is of excellent quality considering the tools available. One of the most outstanding exhibits is a miniature stage coach with horses made by pupils of Miss Anna Fredrickson in district 56.

Wayne merchants have a large tent of displays that will interest fair goers, and the showing of farm equipment and cars is outstanding.

Fair windows arranged by business firms were to be judged last night, the winners to be announced today.

After the Battle
WHEN the smoke of political battle clears away in November we will have on hand a newly elected unicameral legislature, and responsibilities falling to the chosen representatives will be very great, calling for utmost wisdom and care.

It is hoped some one will be able to evolve a practical idea to work over the primary law and make it more truly a vehicle to serve popular expression. The old convention system may be found feasible in naming candidates for offices least familiar to the general public.

The legislature will have to be careful in providing for education not to hinder established institutions, essential to culture and citizenship. The comptroller system, instituted a few years ago as a medium for the purchase of supplies for the state's schools, should be carefully investigated to see if it is not more of a nuisance than a help.

Altogether, the coming legislature will have many live issues to engross attention and to invite closest inquiry and study. It is to Nebraska what congress is to the nation, and a soundly constructive governor will furnish important leadership. Dwight Griswold can do it.

Hoover's Salary

A MITCHELL, South Dakota, man, writing the Sioux City Journal, makes clear what Herbert Hoover did with his salary while president. According to the record quoted, Mr. Hoover drew his salary, but divided all of it between the federal treasury and public charity. The Mitchell correspondent reproduces the following from Myers and Newton's History of the "Hoover Administration," page 231, as follows:

"In the efforts to reduce appropriations the salaries of federal officials and employes had been cut. Naturally, the pay of the officials whose compensation under the constitution could not be diminished was not affected, but the president, although according to the constitution his salary could neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he may have been elected, informed the economy committee that he would voluntarily remit back to the treasury 20 per cent of his salary if congress would pass the necessary legislation authorizing its acceptance by the treasury. Such a provision was included in the 1932 economy act. In this way President Hoover cut his own salary 20 per cent. At or about the same time and upon the request of his cabinet officers their salaries were reduced 15 per cent, so that there could be no complaint of unfairness by other governmental officials, whose salaries had been cut by 8 1/2 per cent. As a matter of general interest the fact here may be mentioned that Mr. Hoover throughout his public career never used any of the salary paid him as a public official for his personal purposes but always applied such money to public service or to charity."

Accusing Falsely

DURING defense preparations, as during actual war, mistakes are often made in charging disloyalty. Groundless suspicions are frequently based on farfetched imagination. Sometimes ill natured finds expression in accusing falsely. The Dies committee and the FBI may perform valuable public service by not only ferreting out fifth columnists, but by pointing on those who stir up groundless suspicions or engage in violence in the name of patriotism.

Nation's Business reports these examples:

Members of Jehovah's Witnesses, a religious sect, were beaten at Litchfield, Ill., until they kissed the flag. Sixteen of their automobiles were seized, taken to a vacant lot, over-turned and smashed. In Rawlins, Wyo., several men and women, also belonging to an unorthodox sect, were dragged from their homes by mobs and compelled to march through the streets carrying American flags."

Henry Accepts

HENRY WALLACE, former secretary of agriculture, and now new deal vice presidential candidate, did not explain in his acceptance speech the agricultural setup over which he presided for seven years. He did not mention the every-other-row of cotton ordered plowed under, nor refer to reduced corn acreage to create scarcity. The five million pigs destroyed to correspond with the administration's dizzy economy did not draw one tear of regret. Instead, Candidate Henry engaged in a reprehensible form of demagoguery. His major endeavor to all the republican candidate with the Hitler dictatorship smacks of desperation that is bound to revert as a boomerang. One newspaper tries to soften the blame resting on Henry by suggesting that the speech was not prepared by him, but was carelessly drawn from the new deal's ever ready class in speech writing. Attempt at extenuation is

based on an assumption that Henry must have inherited from noble ancestors certain fine qualities that, unhampered by environment, would have prompted a fairer and more reasonable line of thought. Left to his own resources, it is believed the vice presidential candidate would have acquitted himself more creditably, thus causing less damage to the purpose which he essayed to serve.

In his speeches Monday President Roosevelt sounded the tocsin of another emergency, or of an aggravation of previously existing emergencies, and called for a united people to uphold the standards of democracy. He did not directly mention himself as a willing leader of such a meritorious mass movement, and he could have meant to propose such a happy unity of mind and purpose as a generous contribution to ease the burden of Willkie's later responsibility. The Roosevelt manner of handling domestic tasks through seven long and weary years would hardly warrant the president in proposing himself as the only one who could lead the nation in mastering new problems added to those still unsolved.

Just to straighten out the record: A local report concerning discussion of ways to combat "subversive influences," following the noonday luncheon of the Kiwanis club Monday, mistakenly said one speaker, commending the FBI and the Dies committee, praised the president in that connection. The speaker quoted disclaims making any reference to the president or the administration, and his denial is supported by Kiwanians who were listening in. He explained that no reason existed to commend the president for the two valuable branches of the public service considered.

To speed preparedness, obstructive influences should not be allowed in the way. Move to nationalize industry is reported to have retarded production, and discrimination in building armament plants has hurt the feelings of the middle west which the east is reported selfishly endeavoring to squeeze out of consideration. Adequate defense is the main objective, and it should not be permitted to suffer delay through shortsighted policies.

According to a Gallup survey, the middle income group, representing nearly half of the voting population, favors Willkie by a slight margin. The upper earning group is preponderantly for Willkie, while the smallest earners are for Roosevelt. Both sides still stir themselves to capture the middle and biggest group.

In rural communities like Wayne where there are no labor unions, it seemed rather farfetched to declare Labor day a holiday and suspend usual activities. It seemed like getting all dressed up and then sitting around with no place to go.

If men are to be conscripted, it seems fair to conscript wealth, but to do so and turn industries over to the government would result in inefficiency and be an alarming step in the direction of a totalitarian state. That no one wants.

If the assassin who murdered Trotsky were driven to the crime by threats to relatives in Russia, the conscience of the soviet government has certainly reached abysmal depths.

Harry Hopkins resigned from the cabinet on account of his health. Ma Perkins, secretary of labor, might not hurt the service by doing the same thing.

Many democrats oppose a third presidential term through fear of inviting dictatorship.

White House Comment.

(Lincoln Journal)
Recently President Roosevelt said he had followed the rule never to comment on "pending legislation." That didn't seem to be in accord with what has happened as the research workers began delving into the record made since Jan. 1 last. This is what they found:

- Jan. 13-The president voiced approval of congressional reapportionment bill.
Jan. 19-Objected to elimination by the house of funds for national resources board and office of government reports.
Feb. 2-Opposed house committee reduction in farm relief estimates.
March 2-Criticized delay in Panama Canal legislation.
March 5-Opposed proposed changes in census questions; advocated extension of Hatch anti-politics act.
March 8-Endorsed Wheeler-Lea transportation bill.
March 15-Again opposed suggested changes in census questions.
March 20-Opposed any amendments to legislation continuing reciprocal trade program.
April 2-Opposed senate committee action in increasing rivers and harbors bill; suggested modification of bill to establish partial federal control of oil production.
April 5-Urged additional funds for Byrd Antarctic expedition; opposed Logan-Walter bill to permit court review of rulings by federal agencies.
May 6-Again endorsed extension of Hatch anti-politics act.
June 4-Endorsed congressional efforts to increase defense taxes.
June 14-Approved legislation extending sugar control law for one year.
July 27-Discussed problems involved in legislation to permit use of American ships for evacuation of British children.

That preliminary and hasty search of newspaper files showed 17 instances in 8 months where the president commented on "pending legislation." The rule requiring breaking of the rule seems to have been observed. The president has commented on pending legislation. It is kindly and charitable to say the president spoke carelessly and without recalling statements made in the recent past.

RATIONAL

Wendell L. Willkie, republican presidential candidate, commenting on the relationship between capital and labor, said he believed in establishing a basis of good will, conciliation and voluntarism. He urged union organizations to do everything in their power to prevent the spread of dictatorship to this country. He observed in his Labor day comment: "Labor day should also cause every friend of American labor to remember that in the totalitarian dictatorships of Europe they have liquidated free trade unions, and have imprisoned, or, in some cases, murdered union leaders." Willkie entertains the rational belief that clearer understanding and closer cooperation between labor and capital with less interference would solve many problems and would vitally aid national unity and national defense.

## INDEPENDENT THINKER OPPOSED TO NEW DEAL

"If one person were to spend \$20 a minute, starting from the time of Christ and continuing through the years, he would not have disposed of an amount equal to that spent by President Roosevelt while he has held office." This startling revelation was made by Erik McKinley Eriksson, professor of history in the University of Southern California. Miss La Verne Larson of Wayne, attended the university this summer, taking one of the courses taught by Mr. Eriksson—United States Constitutional history. He has his A. M. and Ph. D. degrees, was born in Iowa, is not a republican, nor is he a democrat, but rather a constitutionalist. Miss Larson contributed the following comments and opinions given during the course:

Professor Eriksson is definitely against the new deal, not objecting so much to the new deal policies, but rather to the way in which they have been put into effect. He believes constitutional amendments the proper procedure in launching the new deal. He has summed up the new deal relief program in the following words: "They are pouring money down the well instead of plugging the pump." "This method," he says, "can lead to no permanent recovery. The reconstruction work done could have been accomplished with one-twentieth the expense had it been done by private concerns."

Mr. Eriksson believes the only way the American people can stick to a democratic and constitutional government is by changing administration in the next election. Even here he is pessimistic for he says the new deal controls 20,000,000 votes, votes gotten because the people to whom the government has loaned or paid money are afraid a change in administration will affect their financial status.

"President Roosevelt," says Mr. Eriksson, "has as much dictatorial power now as President Wilson had during the World war. He can't declare war—congress has to do that—but he can recognize or refuse to recognize a foreign government, and in this way can create a situation where congress can do only one thing—declare war."

In his course of history Professor Eriksson divides the new deal program into four divisions: reconstruction, social security, relief and recovery. He is not antagonistic toward some of the social security programs, for they were needed. What he objects to is the way in which social security is handled. Much of the management is in charge of the national government when it really should be controlled by the states.

In regard to conscription Mr. Eriksson states that "if the people don't want conscription it is up to them to see that congress doesn't pass the Burke-Wadsworth bill. Once this bill is passed it can't be declared unconstitutional for there is nothing in the United States constitution which provides for that."

It provokes Mr. Eriksson when the present administration takes credit for the things planned by the Hoover administration. Many of the social security measures were originated by the Hoover administration, but because congress would give no support they failed to pass. Hoover had the right idea in handling them, leaving the control of finances in the hands of the state; while President Roosevelt has put everything under federal control.

In regard to the Dies committee and their investigation of un-American activities, Professor Eriksson believes it is all right for the group to uncover the people engaged in these activities, but he doesn't believe it right for the committee to pass upon the guilt or innocence of the people concerned.

Wm. Mears, eldest man in Wayne land one of the county pioneers, celebrated his 93rd birthday Thursday, August 29, when relatives and friends called on him.

Mr. Mears is active and maintains his own home alone. He is one of the pioneer Peter Mears family. Mr. Mears has three sisters whose ages are 90, 87 and 71.

Mr. Mears is a member of the Peter Mears family who came from Grinnell, Ia., to Wayne county in the 70's. Peter Mears bought land southwest of the present site of Wayne for \$2.50 an acre. He brought his family here by covered wagon, the trip requiring 15 days.

As section lines were marked only by four holes, the task of locating land was a real one. When Mr. Mears was riding anxiously about the prairie trying to find his place so that the caravan might establish the new home, I. O. Richardson came to help.

The Mears family stayed on a place near Wisner the first winter, but by spring Mr. Mears had a frame house for his family. He also built a barn. Mr. Mears broke the first land in Strahan precinct.

Wild game was plentiful on the prairie in pioneer days. Mr. Mears killed 13 deer the winter of 1880-81, and a neighbor gave him most of an antelope which he had shot.

Prairie grass twisted tightly furnished fuel to keep pioneer homes as comfortable as possible.

The Mears home provided lodging part of the time for the crew building the railroad from Emerson to Norfolk in 1881. The county seat was moved to Wayne from LaPorte that year. Later the Mears family moved to Wayne and operated the hotel on south Main street.

William Mears, who has lived here throughout the town's history, has watched the modern city of Wayne develop.

Local Lady's Cousin In Fatal Accident

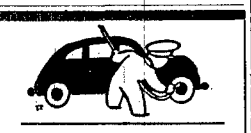

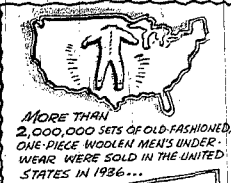

## Consolidation of Schools Is Shown

Figures compiled in the 1940 Rural Education Moving Forward book issued by the state department of education show a tendency toward consolidation of schools in Nebraska. In 1918, 52 per cent of the teachers in Nebraska were instructing in one-teacher schools. In 1936, 42.6 per cent in the state were in one-teacher schools. In 1918, 86.4 per cent of the total number of schools of Nebraska were one-teacher schools; in 1937, 75.3 per cent of all schools were one-teacher schools. In 1934-35, 28.9 per cent of all the children in Nebraska were in the one or two-teacher schools. In 1918, there were 6,638 rural schools in Nebraska. In 1939 there were 5,831 rural schools in Nebraska, of which 5,747 are one-teacher schools.

A man of rather good appearance was arraigned before the court about five years ago, on a complaint charging him with shoplifting.

When he had read the complaint to him and asked the usual "Guilty or not guilty?" he replied, "Guilty, I s'pose."

He said it so hopelessly that we questioned him further. Then he explained that he was 59 years of age, had spent most of his life in prisons, and expected to end his days in one.

"When I was arrested the first time," he said, "I was innocent, but they found me guilty and sent me to prison for 11 years."

"I became a 'trusty' and worked outside of the prison walls, driving the prison truck. When I would drive into town and see families together, I got so lonesome for the folks at home that I nearly went crazy."

"I got to thinkin' about dad and mother, Brother Bill, and Sis. Well, I guess I made a mistake when I didn't return one evening. They caught me, as they always do, and added a couple more years on top of the 11."

Jan Masaryk, former minister to England from Czechoslovakia, once declared that the greatest service to the cause of democracy that could be rendered was for Americans to make youth realize the overwhelming advantages of democracy over every other system of government, to contrast freedom of thought, of the press and of speech with the experiences in the totalitarian states, a worship of the "Almighty State," "All-Important Race" and physical fitness for "Later at the Front."

In democracy he compared intellectual independence with regimentation; baseball with continuous marching; training for dignified peace with preparation for horrible slaughter; religious liberty with religious persecution.

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broken heart, and Sis had committed suicide because of the disgrace I had brought upon them.

"Well, that gave me a grudge against the law, and it has cost me many more years in prison trying to satisfy it."

Such an instance demonstrates the failure of reformatory and penitentiary methods, which are expensive and ineffective as regards both the individual and society as a whole.

The thought was borne in upon the judge as he gazed into the penetrating, gray eyes of that nice-appearing ex-convict, old enough to have been his father, that somehow society was guilty in this case. Somewhere along the path that he followed from the cradle of innocence to the shadows of prisons the forces for good had weakened their hold on him and finally let him go.

If a small part of the money spent in convicting him and now being paid out in watching him the rest of his life had been used for preventive work when he was young, he probably would have been an honest citizen instead of a tragic failure.


