Let us be strong enough to avoid taking what we do not deserve, avoid falsehoods that do injustice to innocent and often helpless persons. In these trying times, we need strong characters with strong bodies.

We would say that Glenn Frank, who was killed in an automobile crash, was not only a super-intellectual, but a man who was eminently sound in his thinking. He followed no wild economic dreams, and he reached conclusions in harmony with practical judgment. America can ill afford to lose men of the Frank type.

Any person who wishes to make over this government according to the pattern of the one he left could save a lot of trouble by going back and taking shelter—if he can find it—under the system he thinks he would prefer.
