

Willkie or THE COUNTRY SQUIRE in the White House, by John T. Flynn, revealing the president's political ascent with no good reason beyond the Roosevelt name, emphasizes the error in electing him in 1932—the mistake aggravated in 1936. Now in the face of broken pledges and flattened hopes, people are asked to forget demoralized homel economics and shift attention to foreign wars—asked to break the country's tradition by electing the president for a third term.

According to Flynn's portrayal, Roosevelt had no successful experience that justified confidence in his leadership at any time. He evidently won a seat in the New York assembly on the strength of the Roosevelt name, and he was lifted to the New York governorship in the same way. The treasury of the state had a comfortable surplus when he took charge. Despite the fact that he left the state with a deficit of over ninety millions of dollars, he was promoted to the presidency of the United States, to straighten out a post-war tangle, reduce expenses and balance the budget. What happened? Everybody knows.

People are now asked to continue the president in office—the international crisis used as extra pressure. This pressure is supplemented by hurrying the annual distribution of federal cash. People are asked to violate precedent and reelect a man who has proved no marked success in solving local problems or in safeguarding the nation against foreign aggression.

"To make this amendment a part of the constitution requires a majority of the votes cast on the issue, and 35% of the total number of votes cast in the election is necessary to constitutional revision.

"Not only are school trustees of Nebraska anxious for careful consideration in the behalf

"Not only are school trustees of Nebraska anxious for careful consideration in the behalf of financial support for the schools, they are deeply concerned also for the example of efficiency in the administration of school business. It is worse than uscless to teach civics to youngstees unless the standard of school business is in keeping with the ideals of the classroom. In view of those considerations, Nebraska has 25,000 school trustees who are watching the results of the vote on this important amendment."

Dr. Geo. Gallup's poll figures relative strength between Willkie and Roosevelt so nearly even that he can land on his feet as a prophet regardless of the outcome. His latest survey shows a trend to Willkie with New York and Delaware in the Will-kie column.

In his speech Monday night the president accused republicans of reversing themselves. What a charge! How many times has the president done that very thing? Note massacre of the 1932 platform, and then try to avoid weeping.

Capper's Weekly shows a picture of 5,000 reliefers in one group in New York City waiting for food handouts, and police had to be called to prevent rioting. This exhibition of poverty in the land of the "more abundant life" is appalling.
