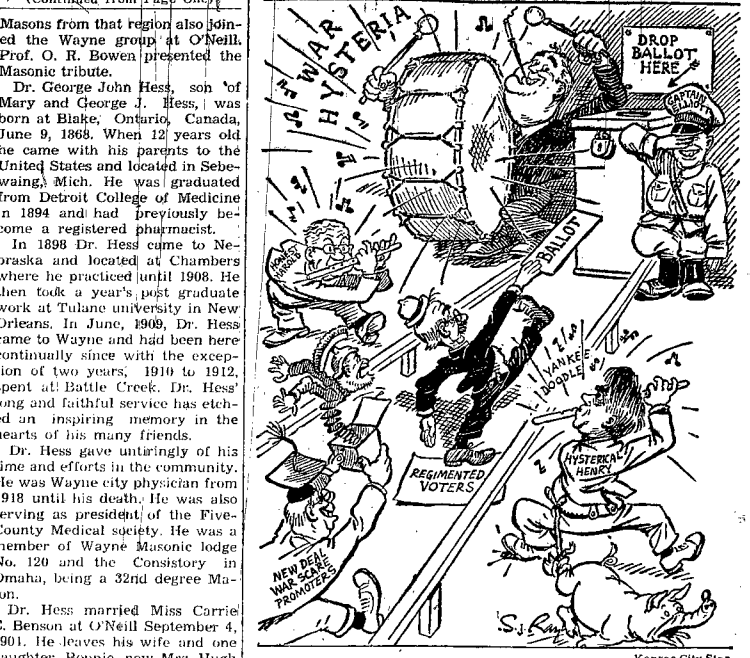

LEGAL NOTICE AS TO MEASURE TO BE VOTED UPON NOVEMBER 5, 1940

The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska will be submitted to the electors of this State for approval or rejection at the general election to be held November 5, 1940:

Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Nebraska: Section 1. That Sec. 1, Article VII, Constitution of the state of Nebraska, 1876, and the several amendments thereto, including the amendments proposed by the Constitutional Convention of 1919-1920, and adopted at the special election held on the 21st day of September, 1920, be amended to read as follows: "Sec. 1. The Governor, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction shall, under the direction of the Legislature, constitute a board of commissioners, for the sale, leasing, and general management of all lands and funds set apart for educational purposes, and for the investment of school funds, in such manner as may be prescribed by law." Sec. 2. That an additional section be inserted in Article XVII, Constitution of Nebraska, to be known and numbered as follows: "Sec. 1. This amendment (1940), shall be self-executing, and after it becomes effective, all statutes and laws and provisions of this Constitution referring to the present Board of Educational Lands and Funds shall mean and include, while in effect, said board of commissioners, Education Board of Educational Lands and Funds, as constituted hereby; and this amendment shall be in full force and take effect on the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, 1941." Sec. 3. That at the general election in November, 1940, there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Nebraska for approval or rejection upon a ballot separate from that upon which the names of candidates appear, the following amendment to this Constitution which is hereby proposed by the Legislature; and the amendment aforesaid shall be published once each week for four weeks in at least one legal newspaper in each county where a legal newspaper is published immediately preceding said election. Said ballot for the submission of said proposed constitutional amendment in the following form:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT "FOR an amendment to the Constitution of the state of Nebraska amending Section 1, Article VII, and Article XVII, and providing that the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall, from the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, 1941, be a member of the board of commissioners, commonly known as the Board of Educational Lands and Funds and providing that said amendment shall be effective on the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, 1941;" and "AGAINST an amendment to the Constitution of the state of Nebraska amending Section 1, Article VII, and Article XVII, and providing that the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall, from the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, 1941, be a member of the board of commissioners, commonly known as the Board of Educational Lands and Funds and providing that said amendment shall be effective on the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, 1941."

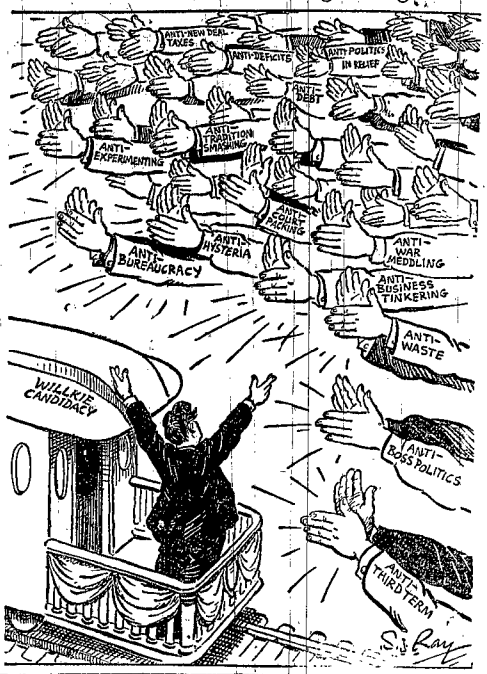
