Schools Improve In Modern Times

In Modern Times Today may of the Nebraska rural schools have been equipped with electric lights and furnaces and the buildings themselves are well constructed. How different from the schools described in the "Nebraska Folklors Pamphlet" issued under auspices of the Péderal Works calministration. Early in 1867. school was held not in buildings, but rather in tents, the corner of a settler's home, granaries or in dugouts.
