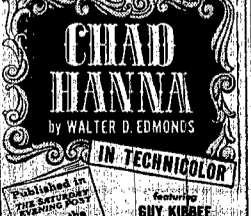

The newly acquired C and M Grocery will soon put in a new floor and do some redecorating. The shelves will be lowered somewhat and rearranging of stock done. Sometime in the future a new front will be put on the store.

Changes in Past Year. The passing of 1940 saw many changes in the buildings on Main street. R. K. Kirkman, early in the fall, moved from the E. J. Hundert building now leased by Carl Nuss, to the site of the former Wayne Drug Co. at 221 Main. A new front was erected by Mr. Kirkman at this new location, two full-view display windows placed and a prescription department arranged in the back. The partition at the back of the structure was removed making the store longer, and complete redecoration was done.

Edw. Seymour purchased the former Dr. Walter Bentback house, which was at 114 West 3rd. He had the house moved back and turned around so that it is now facing Pearl street, and remodeled it into an apartment house. An office building now being erected at the corner of 3rd and Pearl when completed will house four offices.

The Bressler building just west of the First National bank was remodeled for the Craven studio. An inside stairway now connects the upstairs and downstairs of this building to convenience C. C. Herndon who occupies both.

Fluorescent lighting was an improvement made. Mr. Herndon's studio had previously been in the upstairs of the Bressler and Davis building.

Dr. S. A. Lutgen had the exterior of the Wayne hospital painted and repainted. Some interior refinishing was also done.

Johnson's cafe early last spring was moved from 323 Main street to the Schulte building. This building was redecored and fluorescent lighting put in. A new ceiling was built and various other improvements made.

Graham's changed their locker service during the past year, adding a sharp freezer which will freeze meat in 2 or 3 hours, and putting in some exceptionally small and some large lockers to convenience those persons who store a great quantity of meat and those who store small amounts. A total of 18 lockers were added.

The Gamble store added new front glass and tool display racks. A Triangle Finance Co. office was added to the State National bank. The space for the office was taken from that formerly occupied by the Love barber shop, that shop being made smaller. A record check photographing machine was put in the bank. The Love shop was refurnished.

The First National bank enlarged the president's office, added another office and moved counters. Glass cages replace the metal ones. After-hours depository was installed.

F. L. Blair remodeled the building west of his store into an office for Russell Bartels and gallery for the Wayne Photo Co.

P. L. March installed a new sound system and refurnished interior of the Crystal theatre.

The Cavanaugh building housing the Chamber of Commerce and Cavanaugh insurance agency had a new brick front and reset windows.

Roy Langemeier enlarged his facilities at 614 Main by erecting a service building in which greasing and car washing will be done. The structure should be finished shortly.

The student-union building at the Wayne college was completed in the spring and was dedicated at commencement time. This building contains the faculty apartments, lounge, grill, ballroom and a few teachers' offices. Other improvements were made on the grounds of the college throughout the year.

The year of 1940 brought to Wayne an airport and the erection of a hangar at that place. The hangar will house six light planes. A small office building was also erected.

Park Is Completed. The long awaited athletic park became a reality in 1940, a field being seeded and a grandstand erected. Fences and gates were placed and other minor building was also done to make the park more useful.

Wayne has had its share of new houses, chief among these being built by Bernard Meyer at 316 Pearl, Chas. Messerschmitt at 211 West 4th, R. M. Chhart one block west of Bressler park, H. C. Kahler between 1st and 2nd on Douglas and three houses by Carl Wright on West 12th street.

The Catholic church had some redecoration done on it the latter part of the summer.

Warning Is Given About Using Fuel

A number of needless accidents have occurred in Nebraska when people have used tractor fuel as a substitute for kerosene in lamps and stoves and for starting fires, according to figures received by Agent Chet Walters.

The department of motor fuels tests thousands of samples of kerosene each year to prevent contamination and to see that it is a safe product. Tractor fuels in Nebraska are sold as tax free substitute for gasoline and do not have this safety precaution. Under no circumstances should tractor fuel be used as a substitute for kerosene.

The state division of motor fuels warns against this practice. A person may get by some time without trouble but invariably continuation of such a practice leads to an accident.

Wayne county has 68 families who have bought homes or made repairs under the FHA plan. Included are 61 property improvement loans insured to the amount of \$16,737.66 and seven small home mortgages for insurance by FHA amounting to \$19,800.

Home buyers are meeting their mortgage obligations in almost perfect order, according to State Director Holger Holm of Omaha. The FHA at present has on hand only two homes which have been acquired by default. When this is compared with 2,962 mortgages accepted for FHA insurance, this lapse is almost negligible.

FHA is now self-supporting and is operated on funds acquired from insurance premiums and appraisal fees.

Under the national housing act FHA loans are available for repairs, alterations and improvements. Money for buying a new or existing home may be obtained from private lending institutions with the mortgage insured by FHA providing all conditions are acceptable.

TEA IN WHITE HOUSE

It is likely that the first big battle in the house of representatives in January will be over the investigation of un-American activity including all phases of the fifth column movements. The battle will not be over the question of how much shall be appropriated, but rather over that of how the war against such activities shall be carried on. In a way it may be said to be a contest between backers of the Dies committee and those who favor F.B.I.

The Dies committee as now composed will expire with this congress. It will seek a new authorization to continue the work and probably an appropriation of a million dollars for the purpose. It is easily probable it will be continued and that ample funds will be voted. Not all those who have criticized the Dies committee have been out of sympathy with its purpose. Its methods of publicity have been under fire many times. The committee insists that it is through disclosures and publicity that it does its most effective work. Whatever may be said about the Dies committee and the publicity it has attained, it has uncovered many un-American groups, and now is even in better position than ever to carry on the work for which it was set up.

The department of justice and the Dies committee have been at loggerheads and frequently have rushed to print in criticism of each other. There are more than a few who believe that searching out fifth column operators should be left to the department and its F. B. I. In the matter of appropriations, congress has dealt more liberally with the F. B. I. than with the Dies committee. It has expanded its forces of operators by one thousand or more, and they have produced results in the way of arrests and indictments and in speedy action in sabotage cases in particular. As the defense program proceeds and expansion of industries and volume of output continues, still greater vigilance will be necessary. After the debate has been concluded it is more than likely that the forces arrayed against the terroristic activities of the fifth columnists will be greatly enlarged and their work augmented.

The national defense authorities and the managers of the big steel companies differ as to the capacity of the latter to provide sufficient steel for our armament program and to supply British orders on hand or on the way. The government experts seem to think that there should be an immediate expansion of the steel industry by 30 per cent or more. The big steel makers claim that with the new facilities under way, their capacity will easily be equal to all demands. The present capacity of the steel mills is about 83 million tons annually and present consumption for defense purposes is about 10 per cent of the total.

The British government has placed orders for 60 new merchant vessels, which will be built in the eastern coast ship yards. It also is seeking to purchase more vessels from our merchant marine, including some of those which have been anchored in the Chesapeake region many years as obsolete. Our government had retired several hundred such vessels because they were old and out of date. Among them were several big ships which were captured from Germany during the world war. Some of them were obsolete "because" they were coal burners, and modern shipping uses oil for fuel. It has been discovered that there are advantages to the coal burners in this time of war, and Britain has purchased and put into operation many of the old ships. Britain has an unending coal supply, while its oil comes from other countries. It is said that the government will sell Britain all the coal-burner ships it may desire from the fleet of obsolete vessels, which, though not modern, can quickly be placed into service by overhauling.

The committee of the house which is investigating the migratory farmers movement is meeting with considerable success in finding out the facts about why farmers leave home and take to the highways to search for a job and a livelihood. It claims that there are over four million farm people now in the migration. California and the southwest have received the larger number of those moving away from their farms in the middle west. More has been said and published about the migratory workers there than elsewhere. But the movement from the farm has not been confined to the middle west, nor have all the farmers gone to California. Some of them have moved eastward.

Plainview is trying to have the cotton stamp plan established there.

An artist in human relations, Emily Post offers in this book of good manners both a child's etiquette and a reliable guide for character training in which the parent teaches child and the child teaches the parent.

Thrilling Fight
With Bear Told
By Iowa Pioneer

When the citizens of Scott county, Iowa, began contemplating the building of a new courthouse they looked around and discovered many old relics on the old structure, one of the most interesting being the iron representation of two pioneers fighting a huge bear, this hanging above the entrance. One of the pioneers depicted is John Cooper, grandfather of Mrs. Art Auker of Springview, Neb., formerly of Wayne, Mrs. W. E. Lindsay, C. E. Benschoff of Winside, and Bert Hyatt. W. A. Cooper, son of the man who fought the savage animal to the death and uncle of the Wayne folks, tells the story.

The statue shows, one of the battlers about to follow through with a lusty swing of his axe and the other hysid upraised a long hunting knife which he hopes to stick into the bear's midriff before the animal bats him down. This dramatic combat, preserved in iron, tells a true tale of Scott county's history.

John Cooper, known far and wide as "Uncle Johnny," farmed an 80-acre tract about a mile west of the present town of Blue Grass, Ia., and also a 40-acre plot a mile northeast of where the Blue Grass Presbyterian church now stands. His log cabin home and barn were on the larger piece.

John Cooper, five feet nine inches tall, and weighing close to 200 pounds, strong and muscular, was popular with his neighbors, enjoyed the respect of the community. He was always ready to argue but was always ready to do his fellow man a good turn.

It was one of the good turns for which he was known that drew "Uncle Johnny" into the fight of his life with a 400-pound black bear.

"Father was working in a field near his home," his son recalls, "when some men came on the run, shouting that hunters had chased the bear into some high weeds on the 40-acre tract."

"Father whistled for his hunting pack and grabbed a loose fence post. He could have gone to the house for a gun, but a shooting iron to him was to be used only when game was at a distance. He intended to get close to the bear, I guess—and he did."

"The neighbors didn't urge him to get his gun because they'd heard him say many a time that the only thing he feared was a rattlesnake or a mad dog."

"Father ran toward the field of weeds and the dogs, joined by some mongrels and bulldogs which came along with the neighbors, soon flushed the bear. Furious the animal came charging at father and reared up on his hind legs as he drew close. Father swung the club, landing aside the bear's head and sending him rolling."

"Then a funny thing happened. Instead of getting on his feet where he stopped, the bear rolled back almost to father's feet and reared up again, placing both great front paws on father's shoulders and showering him with blood as he snorted and blew to clear his aching head."

"Father thought he was finished then but the dogs came to his rescue, nipping at bruin's flanks and turning him away. Father swung again as the bear went after the dogs and the fight continued this way for 10 minutes or more. Finally the bear was beaten and dragged down."

Winding up the story the young Mr. Cooper says his father told him that in an hour after the fight was over there wasn't hide nor hair left of the bear. What hadn't been carried off for eating or for fun, had been taken as souvenirs.

Early Legislator
Of Nebraska Dies

John A. Robertson Passes
Away at O'Neill Home
Christmas Day.

John A. Robertson, 73, of O'Neill, state legislator for a number of years and credited with introducing the state's first mothers' pension law, died Christmas evening at his home 20 miles north of O'Neill after suffering two heart attacks that day. Mrs. Helen Sandell of Wakefield, is one of the children.

Funeral rites were conducted Saturday at O'Neill. Mr. Robertson came to Holt county in 1833, pre-empted 80 acres and lived in a 12 by 12 shanty. He burned corn stalks and hay for fuel. Mr. Robertson succeeded and became an influential farmer in that vicinity. He and Miss Rachel Rebecca Hindman were married Christmas day, in 1885, at Niobrara. In 1935 they observed their golden wedding anniversary, and Mrs. Robertson died in 1936.

Deceased was a member of the state legislature in 1895 and 1897 and of the state senate in 1913, 1915, 1917 and 1925. He served on the draft board during the World war.

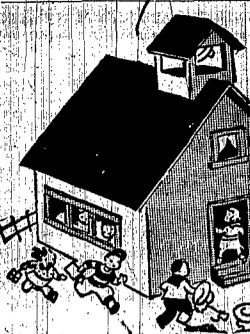

Wayne County Rural School News

Schools Improve In Modern Times

Today many of the Nebraska rural schools have been equipped with electric lights and furnaces and the buildings themselves are well constructed. How different from the schools described in the "Nebraska Folklore Pamphlet" issued under auspices of the Federal Works Administration. Early in 1867 school was held not in buildings, but rather in tents, the corner of a settler's home, granaries or in dugouts.

It is told that one of the early schools in Custer county had been excavated out of the side of a hill. In the top and back of the school house was stored corn that was used for fuel. Wandering pigs often raided the fuel supply and peered in the openings which served as windows.

Many schools did not have requisite equipment. Teachers' chairs were nail legs; desks were made of unplanned planks or of old organs; floors were dirt and blackboards were breadboards painted black. The chalk used to write on these rude blackboards was soft white rock found in the gullees. Ink was poked weed berries steeped in water until a liquid of purple was formed.

Early stoves were crude affairs that gave out more smoke than heat. It was not uncommon to have the chimney merely a stovpipe sticking out a window. Wood and corn were the most popular fuels used, coal being then unheard of.

Today teachers are forbidden to teach unless they have at least one year of college work. In the early years it is reported that a teacher in Gage county had gone through only two grades in school herself. Little time was spent on child psychology, the teacher's outlook on the whole question being expressed in the following quotation, "Likin' and Larmin' go together."

The life of the early teacher was often far from pleasant. Usually the sod home of the family keeping her was so crowded that the teacher was forced to sleep with one of the children. A teacher in Custer county recalls that at one time he had so much difficulty in finding a place to sleep that at times he thought he would be forced to sleep in the open. At one soddie he shared a bed with two boys with chickens roosting at the foot and pigeons in the rafters overhead. Food was another problem. A teacher in Saunders county spoke of being fed nothing but milk and parched wheat in the home.

The Combined Skills of Three.

Sam, age 20, was arraigned before the court upon a criminal complaint, charging in substance that he had stopped and annoyed a 13-year-old girl. Foreign-born and unemployed, he exhibited a low degree of intelligence and had a bad record, having served one reformatory and one jail sentence. He pleaded guilty to the charge. Should the court send him to jail, let him pay his debt to society, and upon his release return to commit similar or more serious offenses against other women and girls? It seemed important to know how best to protect society from his future activities.

It was concluded that under the circumstances of this case a psychiatrist's examination was advisable. The written report stated that Sam was suffering from a dangerous mental disease, and upon this finding he was committed to an institution for the insane.

Had he been treated only on a legal basis, a jail sentence

would have been imposed, and society would have been protected only temporarily. The action taken in this case probably spared some innocent women from being the victims of his depravity.

There is nothing in the law that compels physical and mental examinations of offenders, and consequently lazy judges find it easier to commit them to penal institutions and then to forget that these menaces to society exist, little realizing that in a short span of time they will be released to prey again upon humanity.

The legislature should pass laws making physical and mental examinations mandatory in all criminal cases before sentences are imposed. A judge alone does not possess the knowledge or trained skill to make proper disposition of criminal cases. He needs the wise assistance of the physician and psychiatrist.

A FARM PLAN TO PAY FOR WHAT'S GROWN

During the progress of the presidential campaign, Wheeler McMillen, editor in chief of "Farm Journal," sent to all candidates for congress an outline of a new farm plan, which he calls the "incentive payment plan."

American agricultural imports amount to about one and one-half billion dollars a year. Practically all of that could be raised in this country if the farmers were encouraged to do so.

Mr. McMillen's idea is to pay farmers for raising the things we now import, instead of paying them for not raising products of which we have a surplus. For example, we import large quantities of castor beans and castor bean oil. Castor beans can be raised in practically all sections of the United States. Mr. McMillen would offer farmers an incentive by paying them for each acre of castor beans they plant and assure them the American market for their product.

He knows such a positive program would appeal to farmers more than the present negative one of paying for not doing things.

Our agricultural imports cover a wide range, including such items as vegetable oils, flax, hemp, coarse wools, wool, pulp, sugar, etc. With the incentive payments, Mr. McMillen also proposes to pay farmers for farm and soil improvements.

Such incentive payments, while greatly reducing the cost to the government, would add materially to the present farm income and would appeal to farmers. It would remove all semblance of farm regimentation.

Wheeler McMillen knows farming—dirt farming. He has spread manure and guided the plow over his own acres in Indiana, Ohio and New Jersey. He knows farm people. He knew them as the editor of an Indiana country weekly newspaper, and as editor of "Farm Journal," numbers his farm friends by the thousands. As organizer and president of the American Chemurgic conference, he knows the application of farm products to industry. It would be well for any political party to listen to this man when he talks of farm and farming. He can give them pointers on castor beans and other possible farm crops, and on what the farmer thinks about.

Machines come first, not men and machines, are the component parts of the army of today.

Machines come first, they are the first essential. Without machines—guns, tanks, motorized transport, planes—men are helpless and defenseless.

Man all the Atlantic seacoast with men only and they could not prevent the landing of an invading force prepared with both machines and men.

We will not stop enemy airplane raids with pieces of stovepipe anti-aircraft guns. Our infantry will be worthless if equipped with pieces of gas pipe, instead of rifles.

Our artillery cannot prevent the enemy's advance with logs mounted on wheels, instead of modern cannon. Walls without modern guns behind them are not worth much as fortifications.

To be effective, the soldier of today needs accurate and complete knowledge of the mechanized equipment with which he is to fight, more than to execute four-

right or four's left. He must know how to aim a rifle. He will not learn that with a piece of gas pipe. He must know the mechanism and operation of an anti-aircraft gun. He will not learn that with a piece of stovepipe.

To assemble an army of a million or more men into whose hands we cannot place the modern equipment that is needed in today's warfare, is putting the cart before the horse.

To put an army of a million men into camp and maintain it for a year will cost at least a billion dollars. Why not put that billion dollars into equipment and when we have it, then call that million or more men into camp to teach them how to use it? Our first job is to provide the machines of war for our men to use.
