This is true not only in the European countries but also in American institutions of learning.

The question now is not of improving democracy but of saving it. Both meetings' chief concern was what schools can do to promote national defense. Wayne's aviation program is an example of some of the ways of helping.

Speakers at the meetings were labor leaders, governors, senators besides educators. Dr. Anderson spoke at one of the sessions.

**Gets Radio Contact With Leigh Party**

The thrill of a lifeline came to Kenneth Petersen, Wayne 19 youth with the Leigh party exploring off northwest Mexico, when he picked up code signals of Gerald Wright's sending set in Wayne February 11. "It was swell to know he was talking to me direct," writes Kenneth. "I sure had the urge to talk back via radio but that's impossible because the power is too low for the antenna." Mr. Leigh has written to Washington, D. C., to send messages to Gerald for quick transmission to the Leigh party. Gerald expects to put his transmitter on radiotelephone so that Mrs. C. C. Petersen can talk to her son.

The captain of the party receives signals regularly for use in navigation. The time must be correct to one-tenth of a second. A deviation of one second from mountain time gives a deviation of one mile longitude and latitude, and accuracy is essential to safe sailing. Kenneth has a radio station in Washington. A series of dials and dials begins five minutes before the hour and ends exactly on the hour.

May Seek Training As Aviation Cadets

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The members of the board, Erigson T. H. Jenkins, a naval aviator, and Lt. F. A. Soper, medical corps, will be at Wayne college at 9 a. m. that day to show films on aviation training and Pensacola.

A flying student in the navy receives one month's training at one of the 16 reserve air bases in the United States and is then sent to one of the advanced navy training centers on the Gulf of Mexico.

Upon completion of the training, he is commissioned an ensign in the reserve and spends three or more years as an officer and pilot in one of the aviation squadrons operating with the fleets.

Each year several hundred reserve naval officers are selected for permanent commissions in the navy and can expect to make naval aviation a lifetime career.

After several years with the fleet, a flyer is returned to civil life with a cash bonus of \$500 for each year of commissioned service, and he has the technical knowledge and experience to step into a lucrative position in commercial aviation.

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Erosion Control Is Saving Land

Example in Cooperation Is Demonstrated in Texas Over Large Area.

Erosion is an American problem and one which can be solved through cooperation. The present crop land area of the United States is about 415 million acres.

A fine example of community cooperation in control of erosion comes from Elm Creek area near Temple, Texas.

One significant feature of the Texas job is the comparatively low cost. By building terraces across farm boundaries, farmers have been able to eliminate many of the terrace outlets that would have been necessary if each farm had been treated separately.

The spirit of mutual helpfulness has developed the Texas watershed into an unbroken pattern of protected fields in a vast area.

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War Is Developing New Farm Problem

Participation in the farm program and adequate marketing controls are the two big problems facing AAA, according to Harry N. Schooler.

War is developing a new set of farm problems and still another set of them will follow when the war ends, explained Mr. Schooler.

Legislation creating the present farm program provides for quota limiting the amount of corn or wheat which may be marketed when supplies of these become excessive.

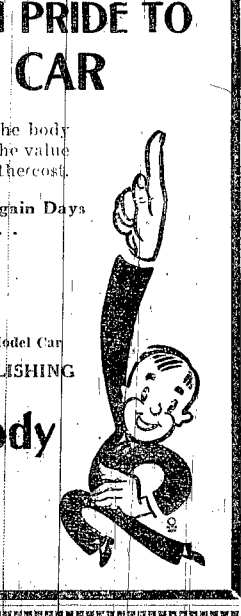
