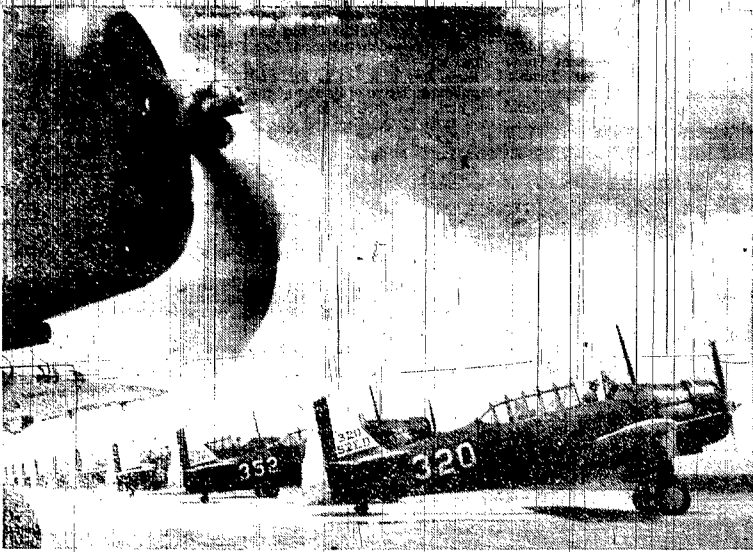

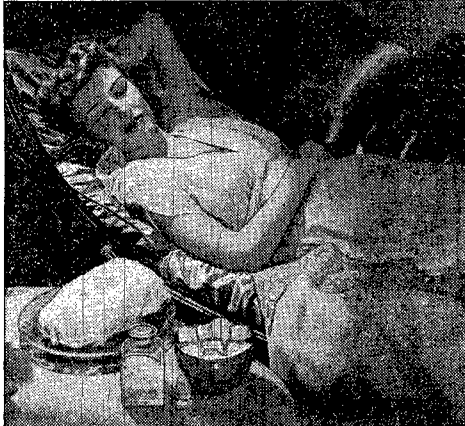

Soak pads of cotton in a good quality witch hazel, lay them on your eyes to shut out all errant rays of light, cool your eyes and your head.

After twenty minutes, if you're still awake, try this physical relaxer. Flat on your back, with your arms at your sides, concentrate on one part of your anatomy at a time. Tense the muscles, tight, thinking consciously of how it feels, then relax doll-like.

If you don't relax into sleep after that, don't torture yourself. Get up, get a drink of cold, not iced water, read a little until you get sleepy, then stroll back, put fresh cool witch hazel pads on your eyes—and go off to sleep. 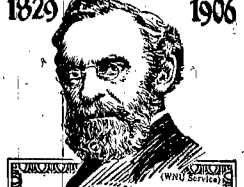

Eight Wayne county rural schools do not yet have teachers for the coming term.

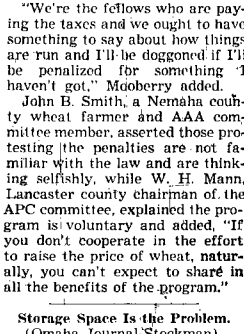

Douglas Canning Finishes Course

Wayne Youth Will Receive Commission in Flying Corps This Fall.



Douglas Canning, son of W. P. Canning of Wayne, was one of three Nebraska men graduated from the 'West Point of the Air' at Randolph field, Texas, July 12. Douglas, Robert Bray of Ponca, and Marvin Frum of South Sioux City, entered the enormous south Texas basic training school May 2, after having logged some 65 hours of flying time in a 10-week preliminary course. They have now completed the biggest two-thirds of their journey to becoming full-fledged army pilots.

From Randolph field the youths go to advanced schools where they will specialize in either single or multi-motored equipment, preparatory to taking their place with the newly-created air force combat command. In September, Douglas, and the 300 members of his class, will be commissioned as second lieutenants in the air corps reserve. Flying cadets now receive a \$10,000 life insurance policy in effect during training, and \$75 a month, plus uniforms and living costs. Young officers are given a \$150 uniform allowance at graduation and a salary of \$205, plus costs.

Eugene Gailey Was Eldest Resident of Elgin at Time of Death.

Rural School News

Census Figures Show Slight Cut

Annual School Report for Wayne County Districts Just Compiled.

The annual county report of Supt. F. B. Deckly shows the school census figure in Wayne county for the year 1910-1941 to be 2,731, a small drop from the 2,816 of last year. The census total is quite evenly divided between the rural and town areas, there being 1,605 of school age in the country and 1,126 in towns. There are 851 rural boys of school age and 754 girls. The total enrollment for town and country schools is 2,027. The 1,444 enrolled in grade schools of the county include 748 boys and 696 girls. There are 29 boys and 24 girls in kindergarten; 91 boys, 88 girls in 1st grade; 80 boys, 78 girls in 2nd grade; 88 boys, 95 girls in 3rd grade; 107 boys, 87 girls in 4th grade; 104 boys, 87 girls in 5th grade; 98 boys, 89 girls in 6th grade; and 75 boys, 71 girls in 7th grade. The high schools also show more boys than girls; the ratio being 303 to 280. Included are 70 boys, 80 girls in the 9th grade; 77 boys, 71 girls in 10th grade; 84 boys, 71 girls in 11th grade; and 72 boys, 56 girls in the 12th grade.

Wayne county had 133 teachers, 20 men and 113 women. Of the 88 rural teachers, three were men and 74 women. Total wages earned by the rural men teachers was \$1,575; by the rural women teachers, \$37,482.50. Average man teacher's salary was \$58.33, woman's \$55.53. Total days taught by men was 537, by women 13,380.

Town schools had 38 women teachers and 17 men. The women received a total of \$24,625 in salaries and the men \$20,152. Average woman's salary was \$82.22, average man's \$122.74. This includes superintendents and teachers except those of the training school. The women taught a total of 4,996 days; the men a total of 2,856 days.

Balance Is Increased.

The rural school balance for the year is \$8,058.33 compared with \$7,220.30 of last year. Receipts total \$62,272.91 and expenditures \$54,456.58. The schools received \$108,218.60 from the district mill tax and \$6,376.76 from the state apportionment. Tuition from other districts amounted to \$141; tuition paid to other counties amounted to \$249; return from sale of property was \$19.03; and all other sources of income totaled \$267.18.

The amount paid out for school board salaries was \$2,563.22 and for teachers' salaries, \$39,098.60. Janitor and other employees' salaries totaled \$692.07. Costs for upkeep and maintenance of schools were itemized as follows: \$1,030 for text books, \$2,306.74 for supplies, \$4,210.73 for fuel, \$153.60 for janitor supplies, \$1,710.43 for repair of buildings and upkeep of grounds, \$842.50 for repair and replacement of equipment, \$308.47 for library books, \$129.83 for lunch and playground equipment, \$108.61 for rent, \$551.60 for insurance, \$51.11 for new buildings, \$53.29 for alteration of old buildings and \$187.33 for new equipment. Interest payment amounted to \$9.79; warrants outstanding, \$240; and all other expenses totaled \$199.65.

Rural school property is valued at \$131,457, with buildings estimated at \$95,890, sites at \$7,

Tuition Students Increase in Year

Wayne county has 370 applications for free high school tuition as compared with the 355 of last year. The 86 who passed 8th-grade examinations this spring were eligible as well as those who passed in previous years. A sum of \$29,970 will be collected in taxes to pay for this tuition.
