Strikes

IT IS A RELIEF to know that coal miners have returned to work after a week's strike, and that questions involved are to be submitted to a board of arbitration. Doubtless the relief is as great to most miners as it is to defense industries and the general public. Radical leaders who haggle over demands that mean nothing in pay or hours of work, but rather that seek greaten control over employers' supervision, are largely responsible for the trouble. No one man in free America should have the power which John L. Lewis would arrogate to himself. Settlement of threatened railroad and telephone strikes is a reassuring foretaste of needed unity. Now if the government will pass a law with sharp teeth, to make all strikes in defense works unlawful, referring disagreements to an impartial body, nothing would seem to stand in the way of fortifying democracy against totalitarian aggression. Strikes IT IS A RELIEF to know that

Workers in defense industries are not complaining about lack of pay or too long hours. They are generally satisfied with their jobs. They are dominated by arrogant leaders who seem to forget that labourganizations depend on the strength of the nation.

Worthy THE WEST POINT Republican is 71 years old, and the editor and proprietor. Emil Yon Seggern, former state senator, deserves to be congratulated over his successful leadership through many of the latter years of that long period. Editor Yon Seggern mentions that the Republican's service has been uninterrupted during nearly three-quarters of a century, and that the publication has survived five major depressions—those of 1878, 1893, 1907, 1920 and 1929. He adds that readjustments to periodic emergencies have been necessary in the newspaper business as they are in other activities, and he is now planning to meet the defense emergency by requiring all subscription payments to be made strictly in advance.


