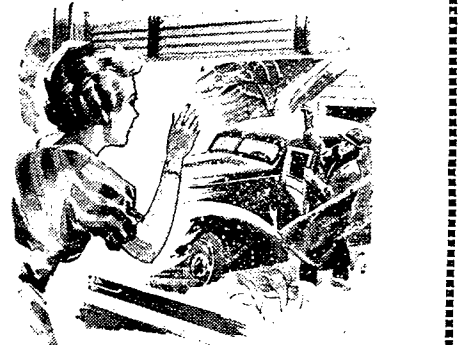

Warning Sounded By Calvin Coolidge

Improvements Scheduled By City Council Here in Early Day Period

From Wayne Herald for November 26, 1925.

President Calvin Coolidge gave an address in 1925 in which a few of his statements were as follows: "The government has no justification for taking private property except for a public purpose; the power over the purse is the power over liberty; it has always been our policy to retire our debts; our economy must be constructive; economy is the method by which we prepare today to afford the improvements of tomorrow; the policy of our foreign relations rests solely on the foundation of peace, good will and good works; it seems clear that it is the reduction of armies rather than of navies that is of first importance to the world at present; agriculture is a very complex industry and does not consist of one but several problems; a strike in modern industry has many of the aspects of war in the modern world; labor can make no permanent gains at the cost of the general welfare; all victories won by organized labor in the past generation have been through the support of public opinion."

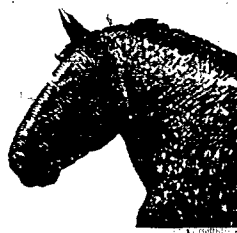

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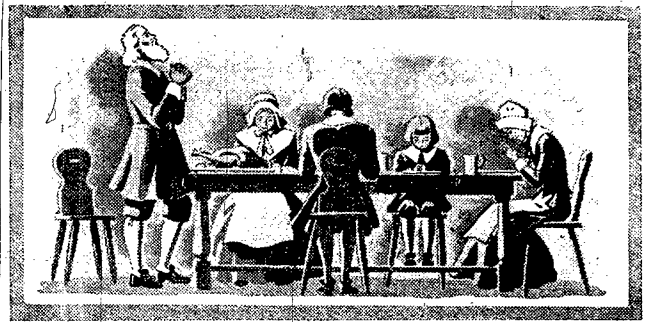
