

At Pearl FAILURE to have been apprised of the approach of attacking Japs at Pearl Harbor is blamed on lurking fifth columnists. It is reported to have been the worst example of sabotage during World war No. 2 with the possible exception of the betrayal of Norway. An investigation which is soon to be instituted, will undoubtedly reveal the facts and establish responsibility.

Once aroused to meet the lemergency, Sequetary Knox, who visited the scene of the disaster, says the naval forces at Pearl Harbor behaved with amazing bravery. The men displayed characteristic American initiative with their dauntless courage. The secretary says the treacherous Japs made a surprise attack on all the lisland possessions of the United States in the Pacific simultaneously, planning to win the war before it had been declared. In this attempt they were frustrated, and American forces set out at once to meet the enemy with deserved retaliation.




