

Of Totalitarian Tyrants Must Be Accomplished They Are Certain to Fall Before the Organized Might of Free Peoples — Leaving Farms Adequately Manned — Speeding Air and Bus Service.

The task of defeating ugly and arbitrary totalitarianism is in hand and must be accomplished. Its supremacy would strangle liberty everywhere. Without boasting, without discounting the size of the undertaking or the hardships and losses involved, the job will be done and done effectively and conclusively.

We are better prepared than we were for the war twenty years ago. Many of the mistakes of that war will be avoided. There is less fanaticism now. People have accepted the grim ordeal with quiet and orderly determination.

In the titanic struggle ahead, people should lend every possible aid to cracking down on the country's "loved enemies" — enemies that have openly declared intentions to crush self-determining nations including America. But production and business at home should be as far as possible carried on as usual.

Government authorities will take into captivity suspected fifth columnists, but they will also protect innocents against false accusations. Keeping the home fires burning and helping men at the front with the necessities of war should keep everybody too busy to engage in impugning a neighbor's motives or loyalty.

Like "Remember the Alamo" and "Remember the Maine," that stirred Americans to utmost unity and action in the past, so "Remember Pearl Harbor" fires every American on the globe — on the high seas, in shore quarters or back home — to put down enemies and lift the iron heel of oppression from enslaved nations.

With modern means of transportation and communication, it is evident this country cannot practice absolute aloofness from other lands. The isolationist theory of Washington could not and did not comprehend the shrinking of remotely separated parts of the earth into easily accessible and definitely interdependent neighborhoods.

We must trade with other nations. We have what they need. They produce what we need. Narrow selfishness invites failure. We can take an unselfish position, according to strength, and grow stronger as we grow more useful and more helpful.

It looks to this writer that the appeal in the isolationist policy has been extinguished by the brutal attack from sources bent on aggression and world conquest. Totalitarian tyrants, who have shown their ruthless march with misery and bad faith, cannot win against the bid wars of truth and noble purposes.

Essential Agriculture. Agriculture and live stock growing are indispensable in prosecuting war, and therefore the government will be careful to see that farms are not stripped of working forces by the draft.

Transportation Changes. More and better airplane and bus service will necessarily grow in supplementing railway passenger accommodations which are voluntarily withdrawn from branch lines on account of lack of patronage.

War Relief Fund Drive Launched

Red Cross Plans Its Annual Meeting to Stimulate Emergency Work.

The campaign to raise Wayne county's quota of \$1,800 for war relief was launched Tuesday evening when the Red Cross council chose Prof. K. N. Parke to head this drive.

By next week Prof. Parke will designate a number of places throughout the county for receiving contributions. Until that time money may be left at banks, with Wm. Beckenhauer or J. C. Carhart or at the Wayne Herald office.

Prof. Parke and Mr. Beckenhauer, roll call chairman this year, attended a Red Cross meeting at West Point Tuesday when Clinton Denison, field representative, explained the needs of the war emergency to representatives from 11 chapters.

Mr. Denison explained that \$15,000 was spent in 23 Nebraska counties for disaster relief this year. The major need was at Beatrice during the fall flood.

The field man showed that Red Cross workers who devote their entire time to this work are paid from an endowment. All other services are voluntary, and all contributions to Red Cross are used entirely for welfare work.

Wm. Beckenhauer reported a total of \$1,215.30 from the membership drive, and the board expressed its appreciation.

Governor Dwight Griswold issued a call for all car license plates of previous years. Car owners are asked to turn in their old plates at the time they get new ones.

Civil Pilot Training Courses Are Coordinated With Armed Forces

Civil pilot training courses in colleges of the country will perform a valuable service in national defense and the training will be linked with the army and navy programs, according to recommendations made at a meeting of representatives of 71 colleges from seven states at Kansas City Saturday.

Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado and South Dakota have 76 colleges with such courses and 71 were represented. The purpose was to devise means of coordinating the C. P. T. courses of colleges with army and navy training for greatest effectiveness.

It was recommended that physical and preliminary education requirements be coordinated so that trainees in the college flying courses might progress directly into military service.

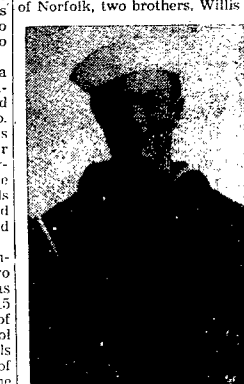

Physical Standards In Navy Relaxed

Because of a relaxation of physical standards for enlistments in the U. S. navy and naval reserve, many men who sought to enlist a few months ago and who were rejected by minor physical defects will now be able to enter the service. Applicants with varicose veins, hydrocele or hernia will be accepted and corrections provided for them at the training stations. Those with hay fever, with nasal deformities or with dental defects will be accepted, and corrections will be provided while they are in training. Any applicant who was rejected because of the mentioned defects is urged to apply again. Needed physical care will be provided along with instruction.

State Commission Expected To Render Decision in About Two Months.

Decision of the Nebraska state railway commission on the application of the Q. St. P. M. & O. for permission to cut off passengers City and Norfolk, on which a hearing was held at the court house in Wayne Friday and Saturday, is expected within two or three months. Numerous other similar requests and also the applications of about 80 towns for permission to raise telephone rates have imposed unusually heavy duties on the commission. Protests have been allowed until January 1 to file their brief which will be prepared and presented by R. W. Bartels.

F. A. Good, Duane Swanson and Richard Larson, the entire railway commission, were in Wayne for the hearing which opened Friday at 10 and continued until 6 p. m., then resumed Saturday morning at 9 and was concluded at 10:30. Mr. Swanson presided. Mrs. Powell and Miss Wuster, reporters for the commission, were in attendance.

J. J. Mealey of St. James, Minn., superintendent of the railroad division, C. O'Hearn of St. Paul, auditor of passenger accounts at St. Paul, L. A. Thomas of Sioux City, general agent, and Wymor Dressler of Omaha, attorney for the Northwestern railroad, represented the line.

Figures on operation. Mr. O'Hearn presented figures and exhibits on the costs and revenue for operation of the 72-mile passenger service between Sioux City and Norfolk. He told that steam equipment was discontinued in August, 1940. The 14 months since that time gas-electric equipment has been used and the loss for the period is \$7,852. Revenue totaled \$26,584 and expenses were \$34,436 for the 14 months.

Figures showed that 125 passenger tickets were sold in November on train No. 4, this being an average of 4.2 per trip. For the

same month 71 tickets were sold on train No. 5. About half of the tickets on each train were for the full length of the run.

Mr. Thomas and Mr. Mealey also served as witnesses for the railroad's interests which were handled by Mr. Dressler.

Dr. Tighe, R. F. Demme and Mr. Lamp of Emerson, Mr. Dahlberg, Mr. McCoy and Dwight Havens of Norfolk, Rev. C. P. Hall and another from Wakefield, Mr. Berger of South Sioux City, Robert Frahm, Mrs. Chris Tietgen, D. Hall, Myron Coison, R. L. Larson and L. E. Brown of Wayne, were witnesses for the opposition. Also present to protest were Mr. Wigdorn of the traffic bureau, Mr. Marriott of the grain exchange, D. H. Cunningham of the stock exchange and E. A. Lund of the traffic department of Johnson Biscuit company, all of Sioux City. Winside and Hoskins asked to be represented in the protest.

Protest Is Expressed. Mr. Bartels, who represented the protesters, explained that costs presented were figured on an estimate for the entire line. He claimed that the actual expenses on the designated line would be more fair basis for figures. He stated that Diesel equipment could furnish the service at much lower cost.

The present train schedule gives points on the line the best mail service they have ever had and this branch of income has increased for the line, according to Mr. Bartels.

Equipment used on the line is old and is laid up for repairs from five to 19 days a month, resulting in the need for expensive steam equipment as a stand-by. Repair of such equipment is also costly, Mr. Bartels stated.

It was pointed out that little effort is made to acquaint the public with train service available and its use is not promoted.

Mr. Bartels pointed out the inconvenience that would result to farmers, morticians, hatters and others by reason of discontinued service.

Another point brought out was that Nebraska is now emerging

from depressed conditions due to drouth and grasshopper damage and that prospects for greater use of merchandise should be reflected in more revenue for the railroad's transportation facilities.

The line which the company asks to discontinue represents the last railroad connection between northeast Nebraska, parts of Wyoming and South Dakota with Sioux City, Chicago, Twin Cities and other points east. It will force all traffic through Omaha, resulting in a loss to Sioux City and other communities served. Mr. Bartels concluded his appeal to keep the service with the statement that the trains are needed for the convenience and necessity of the public as there is no other service to replace them.

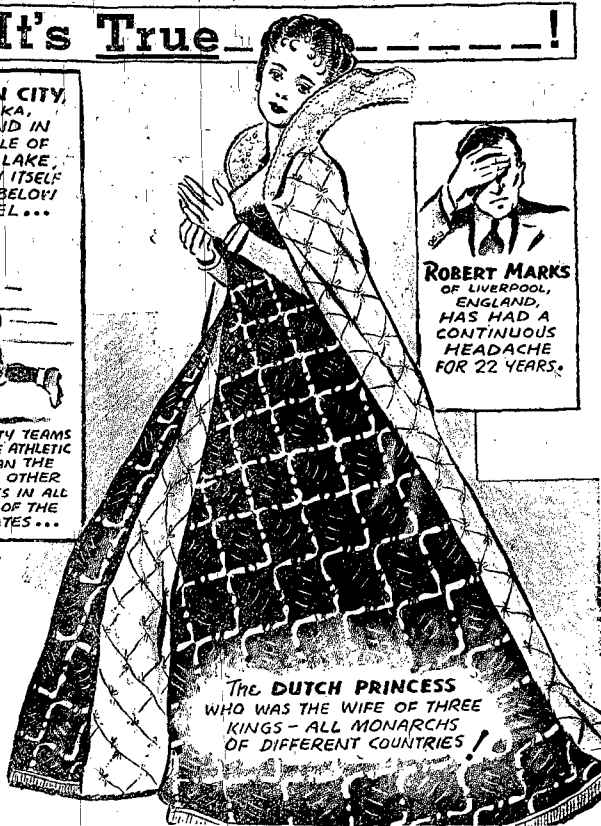

Garwood who writes from San Rafael. "Everybody out here really means business and all figure on 'blacking out' the Rising Sun permanently."

San Rafael is just north of the Golden Gate bridge, between San Francisco and Hamilton air field. Blackouts have been practiced and have been followed according to printed instructions distributed.

Air raid warning instructions distributed by the Marin County Civil Defense council are as follows:

1. A one-minute blast on siren or designated signal in your area—after nightfall—is signal for complete blackout of all domestic lights. This signal indicates possible approach of enemy aircraft.
2. Two one-minute blasts on siren or designated signal—day or night—is warning of presence of enemy aircraft in your immediate vicinity.
3. Immediately on hearing either

of above signals you must turn out or completely screen from outside visibility all lights.

4. Remain indoors at home unless official duty or service requires your leaving.
5. Obey all orders from authorized civil defense officers.
6. Do not use telephone or public roads unless absolutely necessary.
7. If you are in your automobile at night when warning sounds—pull to the side of the road—put out lights—remove keys from car and seek shelter.
8. A series of short blasts is the all clear signal and permits resumption of normal activities.

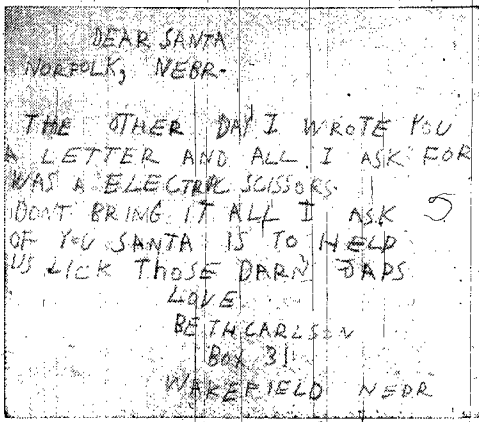
In Student Work Plan.

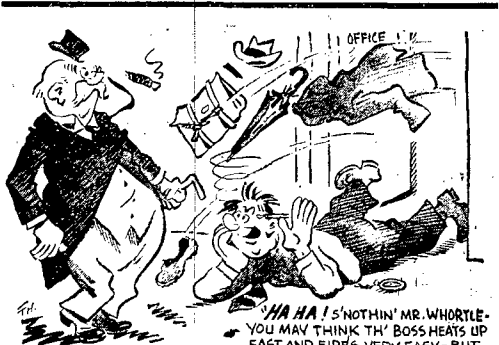

A large front room, 32 by 40 feet, in the 150-foot structure will be used as a main office and sales room. A modern rest room has been added. Unloading doors are located on the west side of the building. Separate doors for delivering cream and poultry and for loading feed are located here. The yard adjoining the doors has been graveled and lighted.

Lloyd Fitch began his poultry business on Main street, where Baker's cafe now is. Then when the World War broke out Mr. Fitch abandoned his business for two years to serve in the army. Returning, he located where the Wayne News is now situated.

For the past nine years Mr. Fitch has been doing business on West 2nd street. Passage of time has been marked by notable changes in the poultry business as everywhere else.
