CONTRAST BETWEEN SEASON'S WEATHER NOW AND YEAR AGO

THERE is sharp contrast between the December weather this year and that of a year ago. Five weeks after the Armistice day blizzard of 1940, snow fell to a depth varying from eight to 12 inches. The storm started Saturday, December 14, and continued all day Sunday. Travel was interrupted Monday while plows and shovels cleared the highways. That day rural mail carriers were able to serve their routes only partially. Rural schools were not in session Monday. Starting November 11 and emphasized December 14, 1940, people were early and rudely awakened to the fact that winter had arrived. As one shook off the snow and shivered in the cold, he was reminded that the moisture was good for the ground. Corn picking was delayed, some of it beyond the December storm. This season the weather has been comparatively mild, usually above freezing, and little snow has fallen.

Appeal Is Filed In Estate Case

Claim With Nels Dullerud Settlement Is Denied In County Court.

A \$9,000 claim filed by the Wayne hospital against the estate of Nels Dullerud, disallowed in county court, was this week taken to district court for Dr. S. A. Lutgen by his attorney, Fred S. Berry. The will of Mr. Dullerud designated that all obligations incident to deceased's illness and funeral expenses should be paid and that the remainder of his estate be left to his only sister, Miss Ellen Dullerud. The instrument also made Miss Dullerud executor. Miss Dullerud declined to serve as executor and asked that Herman Lundberg be appointed to do so.

As executor, Mr. Lundberg objected to the court's allowing claims of \$9,000 to the Wayne hospital, this including two checks, one for \$2,000 and the other for \$7,000.

Three Rural Mail Routes Are Kept

Proposal to Consolidate Wayne Carrier Service Dropped at Capitol.

Wayne's three rural mail routes will be maintained as they are, according to word received by Postmaster J. M. Strahan Monday from the postal department in Washington. When Albert Bastian, carrier on route three, was retired the first of December, on reaching the age limit of 65, a federal inspector proposed that the three routes be consolidated into two. Numerous objections were filed with the federal department.

Route one, with F. A. Midler carrier, is 40 miles long; route two, with W. J. Thielman carrier, is 44 miles long; and route three, with Wm. Weber substitute carrier, is 44 1/2 miles long. The proposal was to make two routes of about 65 miles each. Many objected to the possibility of delayed service under such a plan because very few roads are hard-surfaced in this vicinity.

Wm. Weber, who has been substitute carrier on route three since Mr. Bastian retired, will continue until an appointment is based on civil service examinations. Announcement of the tests will be made soon. They will probably be set for January or February. Applicants between the ages of 18 and 45 may take these. But candidates should not file until notice of the examinations is published.

Early Promise of Gain at Wayne Post Office Cut When War Starts.

The amount of money taken in by the post office in Wayne for the holiday season is very little above that taken in last year, according to J. M. Strahan, postmaster. Early in the season indications were that business done would be far above that of other years, but because the war occurred people curtailed their spending, causing a lull for a few days and cutting down the average for Christmas month.

Holiday Season Mail Is Normal

The volume of mail for each individual day this week has been above that of other years. Saturday mail was the heaviest of any single day since J. M. Strahan has been postmaster. That day 13,000 cards were run through the cancelling machine.

Washington, D. C., December 16, 1941. Federal housing in war time will be a colossal job. New legislation for federal housing authorizing many millions has been passed. Fritz Lanham, chairman of the house committee on buildings and grounds, assures members that these facilities will be available to all communities where there is defense activity.

The state department advises members that it has determined that organizations in this country representing so-called free governments must be made up of citizens of those foreign countries and no American citizen should be on the boards of those foreign organizations.

The general impression here is that in war we must give up much of what we call freedom and pray that it will come back to us when the war is over.

There was no joint session of the house and senate on the war resolutions regarding Germany and Italy. Each house held separate meetings and the president's message was read by clerks of both houses.

McKin Maas, a congressman from Minnesota, who has just returned from England, says that England has kept enemy planes from her shores with unusually, fire bearing devices. Surface aircraft can be heard from 13 to 20 miles away. Surface craft can be heard as far as the horizon.

Some members of the military affairs committee say Nebraska and other middle-western states should be selected for more defense projects because of the safety element, Pearl Harbor has suddenly made Nebraska important in the eyes of those who have the responsibility of defending America.

Washington is now a combination of a war town and a boom town. The city is filled with anti-aircraft guns; soldiers with fixed bayonets and crowds of people from every state in the union who figure they can get some defense business, now that we are in the war. Writers here refer to these "business getters" as "locusts."

It is believed here that important new rules will come to civilian pilots. Soon they may be uniformed. That the army will rule civilian aviation is almost a certainty. Wing Commander Packard of Nebraska has been several days conferring on civilian air patrol problems. Civilian pilot training which has fed over 10,000 pilots into our various services in the past will be continued under some war-time basis.

Hundreds of letters and telegrams have come from anxious parents and relatives of men in Hawaii and the Philippines. The navy and war departments notify the Third district office to tell parents and relatives of these men that they will be notified by wire in case of fatalities or serious injuries. No lists are published. Parents and relatives are asked to communicate with their men by commercial facilities such as radio or cable. In some cases telephone communication is available to Honolulu, but censorship is absolutely necessary.

Five congressmen have returned from London where they inspected British defense. On their return trip on the clipper they were forced to fly via Africa and South America. The chief radio operator on this clipper was R. C. Lanik of Wahoo, Neb., who sends Christmas and New Years greetings to the "ham" operators at the WJAG radio school of 1929.

We now are at war with Japan, Germany and Italy. It may be a long war. There were many in congress and millions in the country who hoped that our country might remain out of such a world conflict. The murderous, treacherous assault by Japan ended such hope. It united, our nation and soothed us as one in the determination that the war can and must end only in victory over the aggressors, a victory thorough and complete. Regardless of all else, our safety as a nation now and for generations to come must be protected and assured. Our country has won victory in every war that has been thrust upon us. It shall win this conflict.

War-time regulations now apply to all people who are not citizens of the United States. These war-time regulations are particularly strict regarding those who are citizens of enemy countries such as Germany, Italy and Japan. Naturalization machinery is held up except in a very few cases. Those who are here from enemy countries and who are now listed as "enemy-alien" should call on the clerks of various courts regarding their naturalization status, and those who want information regarding "conduct of enemy aliens" during war-time should get their information from either FBI agents or any agent of the department of justice. The war rules on enemy aliens went into effect following the president's proclamation on December 10, 1941.

The registering of all aliens in our country some months ago came at an opportune time.

Tells Reactions In Western City At Start of War

Though war time has resulted in changes on the west coast, very quiet, the most part have been very quiet, according to Mrs. O. M. Tyler of Long Beach, Mrs. Tyler is the former Fay Dawson and is a daughter of the Jack Dawsons of Wayne. Beginning a description of events of the week, Mrs. Tyler told that the first complete blackout was Monday night, December 8. All windows were heavily covered. With this and rain clouds it was quite dark. Noon lights were still on down town as they were controlled by time clocks. Early in the evening radio stations went off the air except for one minute out of 15. Enemy planes were sighted about 20 miles off the bay stridge so the signing off of radio stations was merely a precautionary measure. Nothing happened. Another blackout was called Tuesday evening, December 9. Radio stations were off the air. From the number of people down town one would never know there is a war, writes Mrs. Tyler. Blue cellophane is selling like wild fire since all cars were to have dark covering on their lights. Mrs. Tyler tells that when a bus on which she was riding stopped, a Jap got off and a policeman tried to stop him. The Jap crawled under a nearby car but he was pulled out, maps showing locations of Long Beach oil fields and storage tanks were found in his pockets. A few Japs were at their stands at the farmers' market in Long Beach that day, Mrs. Tyler reported. All stores have been ordered closed at 4 o'clock. Radio stations went off the air Wednesday noon from 12 to 1 but the alarm proved false. That evening it was announced that a complete power and light blackout would be staged in the event of a raid. At 7:45 p. m. all stations along the coast and as far back as Las Vegas and Boulder City were ordered off the air with complete blackout immediately. At 8:00 lights were still on Long Beach was in no danger. The master switch was to be pulled in the event of a raid. The raid alarm sounded at 8:15 and all street lights and neon signs were off. There was no moon and only a few stars were visible. Nothing could be heard, no voices and not even cars. The air cleared sounded at 9:00. The signal for an air raid in Long Beach is the fire station siren sounding for three minutes with a 30-second pause between each minute. The all-clear is a siren for one minute. With so many police cars it is hard to distinguish the signals. The 10 o'clock news told that planes had been sighted near Los Angeles and the blackout would continue until these were identified. From the number of candles and kerosene lamps sold by stores, one might think it is the pre-Christmas age. For the most part people are calm and are confident America will win the war. It is interesting to note the different ways stores, post offices, cafes and others have blackout so that business can continue. Some stores have blue paint over all windows. Others have artistic designs of dark colors, and some have dark cloth covering all windows and doors. Residents have bought about all the dark cloth, candles, flashlights and blue cellophane available in town. Mrs. Tyler reported hearing from a New Orleans radio station the eye witness account of a blackout in Hollywood. No blackout was called for Thursday night except the usual precautionary action taken at 10:15 for the entire night. Mrs. Tyler explains that many people are providing their homes with two radios, one to be tuned to local stations for announcements and the other tuned to east-coast stations for network broadcasts. The first of the week, Mrs. Tyler explains, motorists were told to have black lights on their cars. This cost 50c. A few days later this was illegal, and it cost 35c to get the blackout paint of the lights. Soldiers stop all cars with blue lights and warn them of a \$500 fine if the coloring is not removed. So goes the first week of war as it affects civilians in Long Beach.

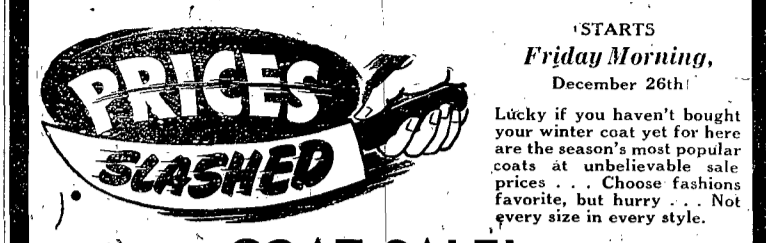

Mobilize Desert Resources Near Strategic Point

All of the desert's resources were mobilized for action following Japan's savage attack, according to a copy of a Barstow, Cal., newspaper sent by Mrs. L. E. Panabaker, formerly of Wayne. Being at the junction of two trans-continental railroads and two national highways, the city holds strategic location. Through Barstow also run high tension lines from Boulder dams to south thru California. To put these lines out of commission would mean the paralyzing of all defense industries in the Los Angeles area.

The regular army was moved to Barstow to protect strategic points and to guard the \$5,000,000 Mojave anti-aircraft firing range.

Two rings of guards have been stationed around the Barstow area. A third set of guards stands on duty 24 hours a day over the water, gas and electricity utilities at the camp. The road to Death Valley is closed. No one is allowed within the firing range.

Barstow and the desert area have practiced blackouts. All residents have been advised of blackout rulings. These are as follows: 1. The signal will be sirens on fire equipment and police equipment sounding sirens and driving back and forth across town. 2. When such signals are heard citizens will please, for the sake of their own safety and for the safety of others, put out all lights immediately, keep off the streets, refrain from using cars, cut off car lights if out at night, do not use telephone to call to find out what the trouble is, wait for the clear signal which will be the same as the warning signal.

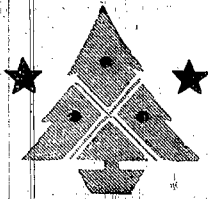


