

The state department of public instruction, in its new report just compiled, shows, a decline of 20,000 in number of children of ischool age in interpaska the past two years. These from 5 to 21 years of age totabed 376,909 in 1998-39, to 369,153 in 1930-40 and 354,787 in 1940-41.

Enrollment in schools has also slumped from 282,102 two years ago to 267,103 the bast year. City schools had grade enrollment of 126,130 two years ago and 120,070 the past year. Rural schools reported 71,492 and 64,145 respectively. High school enrollment totaled 84,480 tyor years ago and 82,288 the past year.

Regarding salaries of teachers, men in city schools had an average of \$1,128,077 two years.

Regarding salaries of teachers, men in city schools had an average of \$1,128,06" two years ago and \$1,162,60 last year; women in cities had \$975,71 and \$990.33 respectively. In rural districts, men's salaries were \$13,20 two years ago and \$528,22 the past year; women's were \$497,22 and \$488,16. The state had 5,831 rural schools two years ago and now has 5,669. There were 750 high schools two years ago and there are now 741.


