J. Francis McDermott Urges Planning for Future As Need After War.

Plan for the future to preserve the American way of life. This challenge was presented Thursday evening at a large number at Wayne auditorium by J. Failure of the economic system had led many a nation to fall, Mr. McDermott continued. The Legion has always advocated adequate preparedness for America. In addition this group is now also urging preparedness to meet the post-war economic struggle. Founders of this nation did not need to think of future economic because they had the advantage of natural increase in values.

"What we need to do today is to widen the wealth circle for the average citizen," the speaker stressed. "The reason the Germans followed Hitler was that he promised them a livelihood—security."

Mr. McDermott challenged Legionnaires and others to find an economic policy that will help America in the future.

"Are the sacrifices for war in vain?" America is the ideal of our forefathers. This ideal is now at stake and can only be preserved by patriotism and production. The American way will live on," concluded the commander.
