Church Takes Form To Serve Humanity

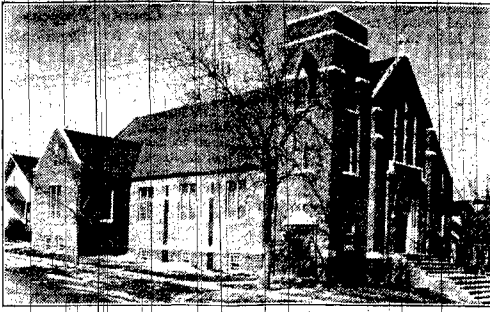
Symbols of Christian Faith Are Embodied in Grace Lutheran Edifice.

Brick and stone speak a varied language when put into architectural form. Lay them in the four walls of a dwelling and they tell

the story of all that the word "home" means in human life. Lay them in another form and the services of a bank or store result. Dispose of them in another way and an educational institution rings with the voices of children anxious to learn. Lay them accord-

ing to still another design and a church takes form. When so arranged, brick and stone preach a sermon that all may read. To every passer-by a church says, "Here is a place where friends meet in happy Christian fellowship; here man and God may meet face to face." In a church, brick and stone every day of the week emphasize the eternal things that abide forever.

"Pause here in your journey; come inside and worship." Responding to such an invitation the passer-by entering new Grace Lutheran church, finds the front doors signifying two natures of

Christ, the divine and the human, A heavy stone arch spans the two doors, uniting them into one just as the two natures of Christ are merged in one person. It is through Christ, the God-man, that one enters the holy Christian church.

Over the entrance three art glass windows with three symbols represent the three means of grace. In the center is the open Bible, representing the Word of God. On one side is the baptismal font, signifying holy baptism. And on the other side is the chalice, representing the Lord's supper.

Above the altar, which is of simple design, are three beautiful art glass windows with three symbols representing the Holy Trinity. The hand represents the Father, the lamb the Son and the dove the Holy Ghost. The pulpit and lectern, both of solid oak, are outside the chancel, to give full view of the altar. The communion rail is open in the center to indicate the fact that the way to the altar is not closed to those who fellowship there. The baptismal font, also of oak, stands outside the chancel to indicate that when children are baptized they are brought to Jesus. The ceiling is open to indicate the heaven which welcomes all believers in Christ Jesus.

80 feet long overall, 41 feet in width across the nave and 53 feet at the widest point. The chancel is 16 feet wide and 12 feet deep. The nave is 38 feet wide and 37 long. The narthex is 18 feet wide and 8 1/2 feet deep. This has a tile floor as do the side and rear entrances. The mother's room is 10 feet square. The balcony measures 38 by 18 feet. The tower is 10 by 10 feet. The side walls of the nave measure 13 feet. They are light cream plaster above the four-foot base of variegated glazed tile. The open ceiling is about 35 feet above the floor which is of oak blocks. The main auditorium, the chancel and the transept are amply lighted with fluorescent fixtures. The entire church edifice is heavily insulated, and storm windows have been installed throughout.

rooms, two storage rooms and furnace room equipped with two 300,000 B.T.U. capacity gas furnaces. The entire structure is air-conditioned.

Exterior Brick and Tile.
The church is of brick and tile construction, known commercially as Farrington. The exterior is of variegated shades of medium brick with trim of Silverdale stone. The roof is covered with asbestos shingles. The tower houses a bell weighing 1,680 pounds.
With completion of the church, Grace Lutheran congregation provides Wayne and community with one of the outstanding houses of worship in this part of the state. "The immense labor involved in the edifice has been undertaken in the spirit of love, and gifts have been freely offered in the mood of generous sacrifice."

The organ and choir are placed to the left of the chancel in the transept. Thus the organist and choir members appear as the leaders in worshipful music and song rather than as performers in a sacred concert. By this arrangement nothing stands between the worshiper and the point where interest centers, the chancel. The new organ is a new two-manual Everett Orgatron.

Accommodates Many.
Seating capacity in the pews and balcony is 450. By using chairs in aisles, the capacity may be increased to 500 without crowding.

The upper structure has a study for the pastor and a meeting room for officers of the church. The basement is 38 by 80 feet and in addition to the auditorium 38 by 57 feet, has a kitchen, two rest

Edifice to Meet Needs of Increasing Congregation

Growth Is Rapid In Grace Church

Congregation Building Has Start in 1925 with Five As Charter Members.

Grace Lutheran church, organized with five charter members in 1925 and now one of the largest congregations in the community, reaches another important milestone in its history Sunday when its new edifice at 9th and Logan will be dedicated.

Frank Erxleben, Carl F. Meyer, George Berres, sr., Wm. Rachenbamer and George Lessmann met in 1925 and formed the new congregation. The first three are still officers in the organization.

For a period of years pastors from neighboring congregations came to Wayne and conducted services. Among these were Rev. H. Bornemann and Rev. F. W. Kaul.

In 1925 the synodical officials decided that a resident pastor should come to Wayne. Rev. H. Hopmann of Lovell, Wyo., was called and he was installed January 10, 1926. The congregation then included 35 communicant members. For the first year or so services were held in the city hall or Beckenhauer chapel. To answer a desire for a building to serve religious purposes exclusively, the congregation in 1927 built a bungalow chapel at the west side of the lot at 9th and Logan. From that time on the congregation grew rapidly. The last parochial report showed the church to have 367 souls, 251 communicants, 48 voters, 99 in the Sunday school, 10 teachers, 42 in Saturday school, 36 in young people's society, 45 in Ladies' Aid, 18 in Men's club and 19 in the choir.

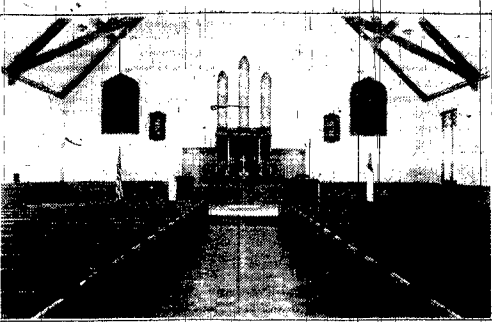

Rev. Hopmann was called to York in September, 1936, and Rev. Walter Brackensick then of Lindsay, was called to succeed him. The latter is still serving as pastor.

For some time the congregation has felt the need for a larger house of worship. In May, 1941, a meeting of all communicants resulted in a survey to consider the feasibility of launching a building program. The committee reported in June and it was decided to proceed with erection of a new church. In July a building committee was elected, and this group soon had plans and specifications ready.

Ground-breaking ceremony was held August 11, and six weeks later, September 28, the cornerstone for the new church was laid. The new church is now a reality.

The edifice represents an investment of \$27,000. Members of the congregation supplied thousands of hours of labor and this enabled the congregation to realize a structure that ordinarily would cost about \$40,000. About 80 have presented gifts to the church, and

Meyer is secretary, Roy Langemeier treasurer and George Berres, jr., assistant treasurer.

Frank Erxleben, Elmer Meyer, Robert Frahm, George Berres, sr., Raymond Langemeier, Fred Victor and Rev. Brackensick comprise the building committee. Karl Otte is
