Biddle's ORDER by Attorney-General Biddle's Communist Biddle for the deportation of Harry Bridges, communist leader, is consistent with the task to preserve democracy, but it is not easily reconcled with the president's recent pardon of Earl Browder, another high-up communist. Biddle acted on the ground that the communist program includes violent overthrow of the capitalist system—a system of free enterprise as practiced in America. It was a courageous step for the attorney-general to take, but it may find barriers of appeal in the way of execution. The president's release of Browder and the attorney-general's action would seem in conflict as appraised by the radical communist mind. However, it is doubtful if many former communist radicals will now, in view of the present struggle with alien enemies, wish to destroy America's long established system of human rights. We are helping Russia defeat a monster aggressor, and obligations would appear reciprocal. After the warf we will not try to force our form of government on Russia no more than we will accept the form of government adopted in Russia. We will only insist on the self-determination of nations with prevalence of peaceful relations and the arbitrary domination of none over others. That is the way we interpret the spirit of America, and that is the national and individual guarantee of freedom for which this country is making glant sacrifices in a mighty conflict.


