

Society's THERE is a good deal of anxiety over the country's drift in the direction of socialism, and even some who oppose that tendency, are apprehensive lest it cannot be stopped and redirected toward sound fundamentals. It has been the history of the American people that they are not long in correcting mistakes when they become evident. It is up to the people to say whether they want more or less government in private business, and whether they want to support them.

After the war when the country takes in hand the task of reconstruction, the people will be privileged to decide the way of private enterprise—whether it shall be nationalized, or whether it shall be returned to the pre-war status that brought prosperity and the highest possible standard of living through more than a century and a half.

Self-appointed seers of lugubrious bent are just as likely to err as optimists of less bulging brows. If people want traditional American liberties preserved with accustomed spur to initiative—and most of them do—they can be depended on to preserve them.

Saboteurs THE executed saboteurs—
Executed ped deliberately to blow up our vital war plants—were given the chance of an orderly hearing—an advantage denied prisoners in totalitarian countries. Utmost care was taken here to prove guilt before punishment was meted out. Under totalitarian rulers innocent persons have been ruthlessly killed as hostages or mere suspects. The difference between dictatorship and democracy is thus apparent.

dictatorship and democracy is thus apparent.

This country cannot tolerate designing and dangerous enemies within its borders while employing its resources of men and material to the limit to preserve its independence. It is hard enough to battle against monstrous war machines without enemy interference from within. Revolting as it is to take human life under any circumstances, it is unavoidable in the presence of infinite possibilities for evil. The healthiest thing for would-be saboteurs to do is to keep away from American shores.

The primary over, the pre-election campaign is now on with the finals scheduled for November 3. Rivally, between candidates will wisely stress ideologies rather

than personalties. Voters may well be persuaded by what a candidate's habits of thinking have been rather than by the way he shakes hands. Candidates for offices from the bottom up, with emphasis on congressional and senatorial seats, should not only breathe the spirit of Americanism, but should have a proved record of upholding democracy as expressed in our free institutions since the founding of the government.

Easy triumph of popular names in Tuesday's primary will lead many to conclude that Shakespeare veered from the right track when he exclaimed, "What's in a name!" The result will encourage the legislature to screw up its courage to consider the primary as fair nominating machinery, examine its delinquencies and then give up in desprair the task of repairing it. Many who would like to have seen the primary scrapped in its present form, will reluctantly admit they cannot let go of the system, or figure out any way to make practical and workable repairs.

It is probable we do not fully understand problems involving India. Dimly observing from a distant-point, it would seem the part of wisdom for England to get rid of an inflamed and discordant appendage. But the danger that independence would be turned to the advantage of Japan may make concession at this time inadvisable. Ghandi has the reputation of being crafty, odd in abbreviated habiliments and strange in threatening a fast as the means to victory. We wonder if his will to fast should not be obligingly granted.

Chet Walters who has resigned as county agent to enlist in a branch of the government service, demonstrated farm interest and understanding that made him very popular. He knew how to get things done for the betterment of agriculture and stock growing, and he invariably won the confidence of all with whom he worked. After the war and after the spirit of fight has been taken out of the world, perhaps he can be persuaded to come back.

L. W. Needham, county clerk, is probably the only office-holder in the world to refuse renomination for a second term. He would have been conceded a second term, but he knew when he had enough of harrowing details—decided to withdraw himself from the political arena. He may engage in agriculture and mingle with speechless farm animals rather than noisy politicians. We think he will let us help milk the cows and call the pigs.


