**Ventilators Assist  
In Preventing Loss**

Ventilators may prevent or at least aid in reducing damage which may result from picking corn before it is dry. Due to shortage of labor, many may start picking early. Agent W. R. Harder urges that ventilators should be located and repaired, if necessary, before the corn picking season opens. This will permit construction of additional ventilators, if such are needed. Ventilators will help avoid the damage to corn being cured in open ricks or piles. Every bushel of corn that has been raised and picked should be properly stored to produce good quality for feeding or market.

Is Filed in Case**

To Open at Pierce**

**Football Prospects Show  
Promise for Team to  
Play on Friday.**

Wayne high school football players will open their 1942 season against a non-conference team Friday, September 18, when they will meet Pierce high school team at Pierce.

Coach Henry Menke, starting his first season as Wayne high's tutor, begins with a squad that is small, but in lots of respects, select. His boys are fairly big, rangy and know football. They have an inspiration in Bob Stull, who may be the number one football star of the newly formed conference, of which Wayne is a member. Last year as a junior, he scored about 75 per cent of Wayne's touchdowns and assisted in the making of the remainder. Along with Stull, Menke has a squad of other fine backs; Murray, last year's regular right halfback, was recognized as one of the best blockers in the northeast Nebraska high school circles, and he should be even better this year; Lessman, a senior, earned recognition as a sophomore for his kicking and passing, and should add a lot to Menke's backfield; Ellis, a sophomore, playing his first year of varsity ball, is coming along fast and should fill the gap left by the graduation of Joe Kessler, last year's fullback.

The line situation isn't quite so rosy, although it is by no means gloomy. At guard and end, all of last year's regulars are gone, but Coach Menke has a few new recruits that he thinks will fill the bill. One tabbed as a starter next Friday is Bareiman, who never has played a game of football but who looms as a natural. Tackle positions will be taken care of by two veterans, Bierman and Jensen. Line, at center, should be one of the best in the conference this year. Strahan is a carry-over from last year's first string at end while the other end position is still wide open with the nod probably going to Helgren, a reserve back from last year's team.

New players include: Ends, Harrison, Kibrit; tackle, Lass; guards, Pospisil, Bareiman; Gundersleeve and Powers; center, Allen; backs, Bahe, Hogan, Asay.

**Circulars Available.**

"Trench Silos" and "Silage, Harvesting, Storing and Feeding" are names of circulars available at the extension office. Agent W. R. Harder advises that all surplus roughage produced this year should be stored as silage or cured hay. It will be cheaper to pay for storage this year than next when labor may be even more difficult to secure. If roughage can be stored on the farm this fall, it may reduce the acres of forage crops needed for 1943. Proper harvesting and storing of forage crops can turn a loss on production into a profit.

**West Point Editor  
Passes in Omaha**

**Rites for E. M. VonSeggern  
Are Conducted Monday  
By Masonic Lodge.**

Emil M. VonSeggern, 60, former legislator and publisher of the West Point Republican, died early Saturday in an Omaha hospital where he had undergone a major frontal sinus operation September 3. Funeral rites were conducted at 4 Monday at the home with the Masonic lodge in charge.

After serving in the last bicameral and the first two terms of the unicameral legislature, Mr. VonSeggern refused to seek election in 1940, saying that one cannot do two jobs well and his newspaper came first.

Deceased started his newspaper career in 1903 when he published the Nebraska Volksblatt, a German language newspaper, at West Point. He suspended this in 1917 and took over the Republican.

Mr. VonSeggern leaves his wife, the former Margaret Romberg, whom he married in 1918, and three sons, Boyd, associated with him in the newspaper, Marvin, an army engineer at Mobile, Ala., and Robert, West Point. He also leaves three sisters.
