War shorthages made it impossible to get bids on improving the road south of Wayne in June. Automobiles began to carry tax stamps then. Registration for youths 18 to 20 was set by selective service for June.

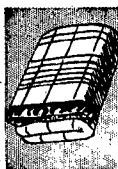

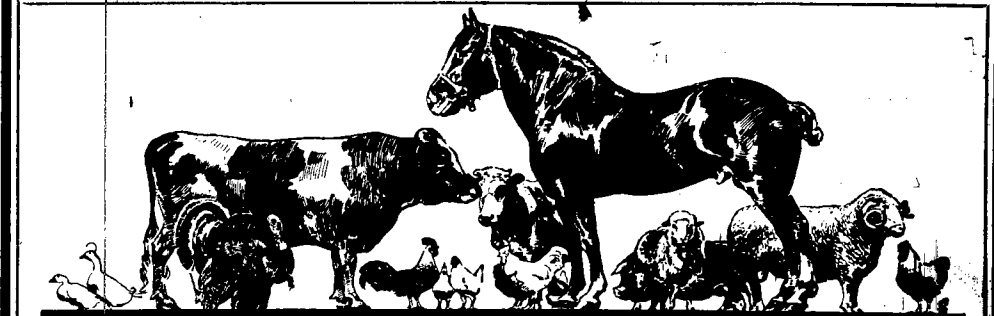
