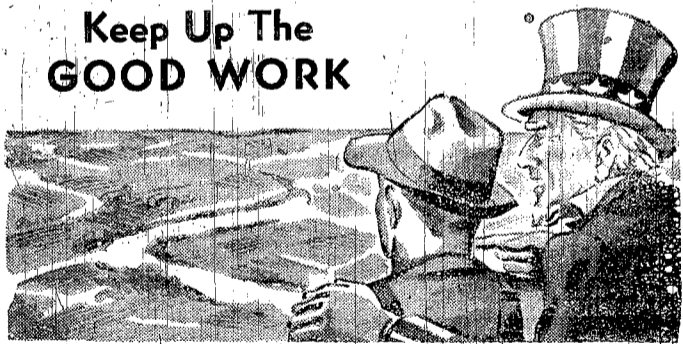

Rites Conducted In Church Here

William Johnson Passes in Wayne Sunday After Short Illness.

William Johnson, who entered a Wayne hospital Saturday, died Sunday, January 31, aged 61. He had been in fair health until recently.

Funeral rites were conducted Wednesday at 2 from Concordia Lutheran church with Rev. W. T. Chell officiating. Interment was in Concord cemetery.

Carl John William Johnson was born at Andover, Ill., August 31, 1881. At the age of 5 he came with his parents to Nebraska and located south of Concord. Two years later they moved west of Concord on a farm in Cedar county, the home place of the Johnsons. Since deceased had been in Concord since 1929 with his sister, Almedia.

On coming to this vicinity in 1887 the family joined Concordia church. Deceased was confirmed here March 27, 1898, and he remained a faithful member.

**Converting Stamps To Bonds Urged**

Only when defense stamp books are converted into bonds is the government immediately able to use the money for war needs, according to a letter received Friday by Mrs. S. A. Lutgen, women's war saving chairman. For this reason men, women and children are urged to finish war stamp books started and convert them into bonds. 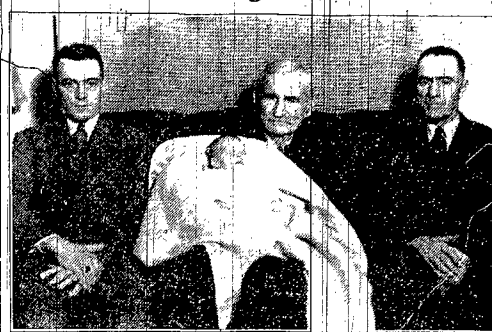
**Undergoes Operation.**
