Heavy Rain Causes Loss of Property

Long Beach had only three rains this winter until the last week in January when six inches fell, writes Miss Laura E. Lyons of that city. Some wind caused big trees to fall and five homes on Belmont Shore were undermined and drifted out to sea, in a very short time being scattered along the shore as driftwood.

A free recording booth for "voice letters" to be reproduced is popular in the victory stand, writes Miss Lyons. "The recordings are made on indestructible acetate discs. Rationing is necessary because those in the armed forces and those producing war supplies must be well fed. The plan is also designed to enable civilians to have fair shares.

Mrs. America must remember that coffee substitutes require one ration coupon per pound just as real coffee does. A new fertilizer for Victory gardens will soon be on the market. It will be obtainable in 5 to 100-pound packages. Mrs. America should take extra care of her China ware. Although it is being produced at a faster rate than ever, a shortage is due to demands of the army and navy. Eggs are expected to bring the Nebraska farmer a minimum average of 30 cents a dozen for 1943. Hand clothes wringers are again being manufactured in a limited number, having been taken off of the prohibited list. No shortage of canned baby foods exists but it is being rationed so that it will be used for the purpose intended.

Since February 1, 1943, all men between the ages of 18 and 45, who are subject to classification, are required to carry classification as well as registration cards at all times. As commercial canned foods will be reduced by about one-fourth, every housewife is urged to can more fruits and vegetables this year.

All requests for emergency gasoline must be approved by the local board. The government is planning information programs so that every nook and corner in America will thoroughly understand the new point rationing books. The War Production Board is urging the mid-west farmer to raise more soy beans as they are a source of vitally needed oils and food products and are used extensively for the making of plastics in production of war goods. OPA suggests that drivers look ahead in regard to commercial vehicles and be satisfied with recap tires instead of new ones so that vitally needed trucks may be kept on the move. A car owner should have only one gasoline sticker on his windshield, according to government regulations. If one has an "E" or a "C" as well as an "A," be sure the largest one is there.

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"TRAILER VAGABOND"

PHOENIX, ARIZ. THE LOST DUTCHMAN MINE

If you have a thirst for adventure and a banking for gold in huge quantities, both of your desires can be satisfied just 35 miles east of this capital city of Arizona if you are lucky. Within an hour's ride of this busy metropolis is a gold mine finders keepers - rich beyond the treasure of Captain Kidd. Thousands have tried their luck looking for the buried treasure and at least six have died in their attempt, but you may be the lucky person.

In every western state that produces gold it is an easy matter to pick up a story of a lost gold mine, but usually when the tale is investigated it is found to be just another story cooked up for the benefit of eastern visitors. But "The Lost Dutchman" near this city is founded on fact - its history is a tale of massacre, thievery, earthquake and murder.

In 1845 one Miguel Peralte journeyed into this then unexplored area in search for gold. After numerous small finds he became convinced that somewhere in the Superstition Mountains there was wealth in untold quantities. Returning to his home in Chihuahua City, Mexico, he organized a party of six and placed it under the command of his three sons, Pedro, Ramon and Manuel. In 1846 this party re-entered the territory and discovered a rich placer mine at the present site of Mormon Flat. While the rich bonanza, Pedro mined this rich bonanza, Pedro went further into the mountains in search of the source of the placer gold. He discovered not one, but eight rich veins.

In the winter of 1946-47 the three brothers returned to Mexico.
