

Demonstrate Food Preservation Here

Miss May Stanek Conducts Refresher Course for Women of County.

Wayne county food preservation program was started last Thursday when Miss May Stanek, state food specialist of the state extension service, Lincoln, gave a one-day refresher course on food preservation to 17 Wayne county women at the auditorium.

Members attending the food preservation school were selected by the Wayne County Women's home project clubs at their achievement last meeting, chairman of the nutrition committee of the civilian defense committee and Miss Martha Dee Wallace, home economics instructor of the Wayne Teachers' college. Mrs. Thomas P. Roberts, Winside, is county chairman of the home project clubs in Wayne county, and Mrs. Ralph Carhart, Wayne, is county chairman of the nutrition committee of the Wayne county office civilian defense committee. Mrs. Julia Hefferman, home management supervisor of the R. S. A., is also assisting in planning a refresher course.

The refresher course included discussions on canning, freezing, drying and blanching as means of food preservation. Miss Stanek demonstrated the use of pressure cookers and the boiling water bath in canning fruits and vegetables. The open kettle, oven and steamer methods of canning were discussed. She also exhibited several drying racks for drying fruits and vegetables in the open air and by artificial heat.

It is planned to hold the food preservation demonstrations in every community that desires them. There will be canning and preservation of more different kinds of fruits and vegetables in Wayne county this year than usual. Most victory gardens are being planted with a variety of vegetables. The surplus should be stored. This means that new varieties will be canned, dried or frozen in 1943 that have not been in the past.

been remodeled, modernized and repainted. This includes rebuilding of side hanging racks and designing tables according to latest methods of merchandising. This department will have two fitting rooms. All tables and fixtures are refurnished in a tan and brown color combination, this being carried out throughout the store.

The men's wear department, in the northwest portion of the store, has new fixtures with three short modernized tables and two large tables. This has one fitting room with a large alcove mirror.

The shoe department is located in the center of the store. All new shoe bars have been built around a center island display. This department has been refurnished to blend with others of the store.

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Fixtures from the regular department of Gamble's have been utilized in the hardware department with two large table displays added. All shelving and tables have been rearranged to meet wartime merchandising conditions.

A large six-foot convenient angle stairway makes the furniture store in the basement very accessible. This portion of the building has been completely rebuilt. Walls have been refinished with plaster, and the ceiling has been finished with insulate. Walls are a light cream color and the ceiling is ivory. This department is illuminated with flush type fluorescent lighting. The entire store, including display windows, has fluorescent lighting.

No major changes have been made in the display windows in the new location as these can be utilized to show merchandise of various departments.

The store staff will include from eight to 12 full-time employees. The personnel at present includes Kenneth Vandenberg, Don Beeks and Miss Bannell Grier who will be in the hardware and furniture departments. Miss Grier is also general office girl for the entire store. In the ready-to-wear and men's department are J. J. Ahern, Mrs. Herbert Reuter, Miss Kathleen McGowan and Miss Pauline Meyer. Mr. Ahern will also assist in the furniture and other departments of the store. During this week Rawley Karel, assistant manager from the McPherson, Kan., Gamble store, is helping Ed. Meese in getting the store ready for the opening.

Large parking space is provided at the rear of the store for the convenience of patrons.

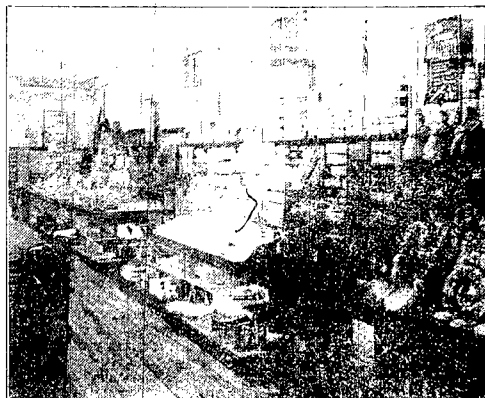

Third Big Scrap Drive Is Opening



Governor Dwight Griswold Urges Nebraskans to Keep Up Record.

Nebraska's third big scrap drive opens May 2 and closes May 15. In announcing this, Governor Dwight Griswold urges residents of the state to "make another war record for which all will feel proud."

In a letter to P. L. March, county salvage chairman, the governor pointed out that Nebraska had in 1942 collected 111 per cent of her quota to stand in 14th position in the nation. However, this scrap has collected only 28 per cent of its 80,000-ton quota set for the first six months of 1943 and ranks 32nd among states in this respect.

In the first two scrap drives Nebraska showed the nation how the job should be done and was first to meet the quotas.

Plans in each county are being arranged by the local chairman. "The job must be done. The steel mills must be kept operating at top speed to assure weapons for our fighting men," writes the governor.

State Supt. Wayne O. Reed has promised the cooperation of schools in this drive. Field representatives of farm equipment companies have also been asked to lend their assistance.
