



For the past two weeks we have been stressing children's books but during that time several new books have come in for the adults. Some new reference tools added to the library collection have been The Giant Workshop Manual, put out by the staff of the Popular Science Monthly and Webster's Biographical Dictionary. The Giant Workshop Manual gives complete plans for making anything anyone could ever think of. The Biographical Dictionary contains 40,000 concise biographies of noteworthy persons, with name pronunciations. Another fine book added to the collection is a Treasury of Science, edited by Harlow Shapley. This is not purely a reference tool as it also makes interesting reading. This is an over-all picture of modern science, seen through the eyes of the greatest scientific writers.

For new novels we have The Promise, by Pearl Buck, and Indigo, by Christine Weston. The latter was the Literary Guild selection for the month.

A good new collection of stories by P. G. Wodehouse is entitled Nothing But Wodehouse. This volume is edited by Ogden Nash and is three volumes in one with 1,000 pages and 1,000 laughs.

We also have the new Best Plays of 1942-43, by Burns Mantle, and a collection by Alexander Woolcott entitled Long, Long Ago.

Two very amusing new titles are Love at First Flight by two air cadets and We Followed Our Hearts to Hollywood, by Emily Kimbrough. Miss Kimbrough will be remembered as the co-author of Our Hearts Were Young and Gay and this new book is the story of how she and Cornelia Otis Skinner went to Hollywood to see their book filmed. The illustrations are by Helen Hokinson who draws for the New Yorker.

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



Thanksgiving Observance

The Pilgrim Fathers who landed from the Mayflower in 1620, came to America primarily to gain religious freedom. They established themselves at Plymouth, first New England settlement. They arrived in December, and they endured innumerable physical hardships in trying to satisfy necessities from a raw wilderness, but they were so relieved in spirit that they followed the next year's harvest and livable creations with a mass expression of gratitude.

The liberty which the Pilgrims found, has sometimes been abused, sometimes threatened. Intolerance that centered in the Salem witchcraft outrages, passed with enlightenment. The Revolution which forged national independence, is now accepted by Great Britain which then fought on the losing side, as a source of its subsequent salvation. The Civil war removed the blot of human slavery. The Spanish-American war kicked Spain out of Cuba and the Philippines. The present conflict contemplates the self-determination of nations that failed to follow World War I.

Freedom's pattern, fashioned in the minds of the Pilgrims, has been generally followed, and there is ground for hope that the current war in which sharply disagreeing ideologies are involved, will result in reinforcing democratic principles and extending them to hitherto enslaved peoples. The strength of America in every crisis, as in the present one, proceeds from the free spirit which inspired the Pilgrims, and which has been kept alive by succeeding generations. For this spirit which has brought confidence and security, we have sound reason for thanksgiving.

Dewey Warns

FREE enterprise, based on the spirit that leads men to create business, produce goods and provide employment, must not be stifled after

the war, warned Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York before a CIO convention. Dewey is now a CIO convention in New York City from the mid-west. Dewey fought racketeers and smashed rackets. He fought prosecuting attorney to governor, and is now a popular candidate for the presidency. He is quoted as telling the convention these things among others:

"Once the principles of a free society are abandoned, we will have turned our backs upon the very things for which Americans are laying down their lives today.

"The simple truth is that we must make up our minds that we are going to have a free society here in these United States and resolutely set out to create the conditions under which it can exist."

Announcement from Washington that the war department is turning back thirteen billion dollars to the budget bureau and that the navy may refund five billion is an encouraging sign. Dismissal of unnecessary government employees and reduction of useless bureaus will also help. With production apparently meeting war needs, retrenchment wherever practical and within bounds of safety will stimulate confidence.

Thanksgiving feasts remind one of the surpassing endurance of the human stomach. It is a marvel of construction, and its frequent abuse, incited by an unduly pressing appetite, is usually overcome without revolt. Hats off to the courage and stability of the stomach as it lines up again to prove equal to an extraordinary assault!

The North Platte city council proposes an amendment to its curfew ordinance to penalize parents of children who are found on streets after prescribed hours. It might also be advisable to require parents to be on hand to greet their youngsters on the sound of the curfew.

Secretary Hull's speech, based on the recent Moscow conference, emphasized America's duty to cooperate with other nations to insure future peace and security. He made plain a responsibility that cannot be sidestepped.

To gain the confidence and support of the people, political parties must say what they mean and mean what they say. They cannot expect to win or hold favor by dodging issues or failing to live up to pledges.

If the nazis were forced to see the wisdom of unconditional surrender by Christmas, they would contribute the richest possible gift to themselves and to the rest of the world.

Of course, children should obey their parents, but parents should develop sound sense to entitle them to obedience.

It is expected the first thing on the post-war shopping list will be a new car. Other essentials will follow.

AFTER THE WAR.

Discussing the Moscow conference, the Christian Science Monitor points out the wisdom of settling boundary questions when the war ends. Like employing a community's fire fighting equipment to control a conflagration and meet the threats of destruction, the Monitor urges understanding and adequate machinery, used collectively, to check militarism, and to shield nations against future wars. The idea is to supply means with which to insure postwar collaboration among peacefully inclined peoples. "Peace-making must begin with setting up the machinery and the atmosphere of good will necessary for a world of law and order," says the Monitor. "Then there will be some hope of applying peaceful procedures to smaller problems."

cut the request down to 10 billion. The committee cut it to a little over two billion, figuring the congress can cut expenditures, and departments can save the rest by reducing unnecessary expenses.

Bob Doughton of North Carolina, chairman of the house committee on ways and means which handles revenue legislation, was 89 years old the other day. He got a big ovation from his colleagues. The federal civilian payroll is around 650 million dollars a month. There are over three million of these civilian employees. Washington has about 300,000 of them. Congress is trying hard to cut this number down and save a little money for the taxpayers.

Fulton Lewis, jr., the radio news commentator, is a cousin of Chas. Nicodemus of Fremont. He visited the house of representatives the other day and attracted more attention than did Prime Minister Churchill.

The best guess is that by January 1, 1944, we will have 10 million men and women in the service. The army will have close to eight million and the navy and the marines around 2,300,000.

Horner Gruenther who was born at Platte Center, Neb., and was secretary to former Senator Ed. Burke, is now the official representative in Washington of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce. He also represents a Missouri car corporation.

Three synthetic rubber plants are operating in Canada. They are coordinated with the American government's synthetic rubber program. These Canadian plants are constructed and operated with Canadian money. All that they get from us free is the exchange of ideas.

Leroy Hines of Norfolk, Neb., who worked in Washington and studied law outside of working hours, is now one of the representatives of the Standard Oil Co., appearing before committees in connection with the Elk Hills oil lease matters.

Joy Elmer Morgan who was raised around Peru, Neb., is now editor of the Journal of the National Education association. He is interested in the passage of a bill that would give federal aid to education in the states. That legislation recently stalled in the senate after several days of debate.

Oleo boosters are starting a new campaign to eliminate taxation and restrictions on colored oleo. The legislation was temporarily defeated in the house committee on agriculture. The plan is now to get it into the tax bill when that bill gets to the senate.

The prohibition party met in national convention in Indianapolis, November 10-13, and nominated Claude A. Watson of Los Angeles for president, and Lloyd C. Carrier of Washington, D. Its platform, adopted at Indianapolis, declared for one six-year presidential term, and against centralization, bureaucracy and tendencies to totalitarianism. Continuation of the party organization and activity, though with no hope of victory, helps discover political frailties and suggests lines of constructive thinking. Running along 75 years without electing a candidate shows wonderful tenacity.

Washington, D. C. November 18, 1943

Quite a few Nebraskans have been in Washington during the week. Some of the members of the board of control on their way home from New York, were in town. manager of radio station WOW, was here in connection with FCC matters.

Almost unanimously the house passed the bill to provide an increase in monthly rates of compensation for disabled veterans for service incurred in disability and death compensation for widows and minors. When this bill is enacted into law, it will cost around 25 million dollars a year. However, that is much less than the increase in pay which was allowed to civilian federal employees recently. That bill will cost the taxpayers 600 million dollars a year.

The new tax bill that the house ways and means committee has prepared provides about two and one-half billion dollars in annual supplemental revenues. It will probably come into the house under a closed rule. That means that amendments will not be allowed. This also means that the new tax bill will not be finally written in the house, but much more of it will be written in the senate and in conference. The treasury first figured it would need about 16 billion dollars in new taxes. Then it

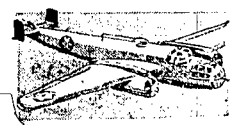

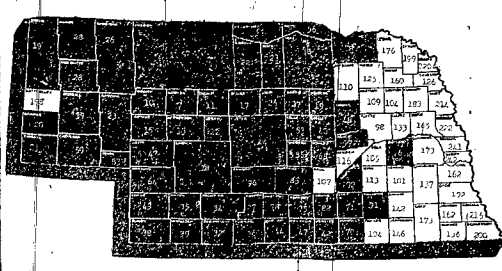

Type of Education Likely to Change

Supt. J. W. Litherland Is Speaker for Meeting Of Wayne Club.

"The Right Type of Education for a Democracy" was the topic of a message brought to Wayne Woman's club Friday in the club rooms by Supt. J. W. Litherland.

The speaker, introduced by Mrs. J. Gillespie, mentioned that the boys returning from the war will best explain the earmarks of pure democracy. They, perhaps better than any educators, will be able to tell the world "what we are fighting for." Some reports from these youths stress the need for more instruction in citizenship through grades and high school.

Supt. Litherland compared education in the United States with that in Germany, Italy, Russia and Japan. In each of the last four, education is controlled by the government for a definite objective. German youths learn to participate in an absolute militaristic government. In Russia the aim of education is to develop the nation industrially. In Italy children were taught under Mussolini to be subjects of the state, and united nations are having difficulty there to eradicate such ideas from their minds. Japanese education promotes cunning and craftiness. All these ways of training children must lead to a terrific readjustment after the war.

In this nation education is in a floundering state with some believing that training is to help make money, others that it is for cultural purposes, etc. Children of any nationality, stated Supt. Litherland, are trinities and schooling must provide for educating the soul, mind and body. The type of training given may be an asset or liability throughout their lives. For this reason, the kind of education and the type of teachers should be chosen with greatest care as they affect young folks for a lifetime.

The speaker stressed the need for educated people to assume responsibilities and to develop their own special talents. The finished product in educational institutions must be perfected so that it will be equal to or excel that of other systems to insure continuance of democracy.

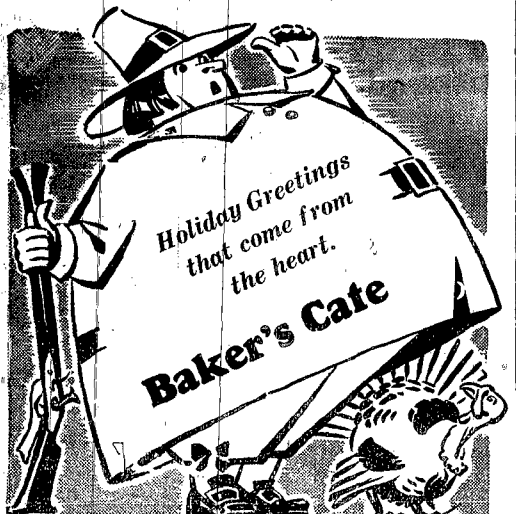
