

If enemies had the sensible foresight to surrender in advance of the signal to invade, many precious lives would be saved.

Of this number 75 acres on 45 of the farms have had the eradication work completed. Now 1,412 acres of noxious weeds are being eradicated on 784 farms in the weed district.
