

Accident Is Fatal To Ano Johnson

Graduate of Wayne College Loses Life Tuesday in Western City.

An automobile accident in Oakland, Cal., early Tuesday morning proved fatal to Miss Ano LaJune Johnson, 24, of Moorhead, Ia. A Wayne college graduate. Though no details were given in the telegram coming to the R. B. Standleys, it is presumed that the accident occurred when Miss Johnson was enroute to her work as stenographer for the Sherwin-Williams Paint Co.

The body will arrive in Moorhead Friday evening for funeral rites. Miss Ano Johnson, who was in the west with her sister, will accompany it.

Ano LaJune Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Johnson, was born on a farm near Moorhead June 26, 1919. She was graduated from Moorhead high school in May, 1936, and came to Wayne to enroll at college in the fall of 1938. She stayed in the Prof. Albert G. Carlson home a year and afterward in the R. B. Standley home. She was employed for a time in the Nites store and also in the H. D. Addison law office.

Deceased received her A. B. degree in education in August, 1942. She was a member of Phi Omega Pi, national honorary commercial fraternity, and was vice president of the local chapter in her senior year. She also affiliated with Sigma Tau Delta, honorary English fraternity, and was active in the Commercial club and Y. W. C. A. She was an attendant to the homecoming queen in 1942.

Miss Johnson taught in Anita, Ia., during 1942-43. She and her sister accompanied the R. B. Standleys to California last spring and the girls remained in the west.

Surviving Miss Johnson are her father, her step mother, her sister, Ita, and four brothers, Raymond who is in the marines and who is probably in the Gilbert islands, Carroll who is an official for the United Airways, and two brothers who are farming near Moorhead.

Pfc. Dolores McNatt is being transferred to Pacific Coast in Work. Pfc. Dolores McNatt, United States marine corps, arrived last week Wednesday from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, to spend a seven-day furlough with her parents, the L. W. McNatts. She is enroute to El Toro, Cal., to assume her new duties as radio operator at that base.

Pfc. McNatt took her boot training at Hunter college, New York. While there the young women lived in apartments and were under military regulations of the navy. They were issued week-end passes, which were used by the Wayne woman to become better acquainted with the city. Among the many impressive sights seen were the stage show, "Oklahoma," Times square, Radio City and Statue of Liberty.

SUGGESTED HELPS FOR INJURED BOYS AT CRITICAL TIME

ART THOMAS, manager of WJAG, Norfolk, has launched a crusade to relieve disabled veterans of the year during a time between their discharge from hospitals and their ability to resume normal civilian life. He mentions that several bills are before congress to make due provision, and he urges speed in enacting proper legislation. Mr. Thomas mentions a resolution introduced in the house looking to the ends proposed, and these services are suggested. "Grant a discharged veteran a furlough of about three months, with pay and allowance, during which he may arrange his affairs and prepare to return to normal civilian life. Give the government time to assemble his service and medical records and have them available for use at time and point of discharge. Return him at end of furlough to a point where all his records have been assembled, so that he may receive his final discharge examination, and receive proper clerical and technical assistance in filing applications and claims. Provide that the veteran's administration process and adjudicate claims before final discharge."

Paper Collection Drive Concluded

S. S. Cushing participated.

From pre-flight they enter primary training for nine weeks and get about 60 hours of flying, including solo work in a 120-horsepower machine. Next the youths go to basic and fly bigger ships, the BT13 with 450-horsepower motor. Advanced training follows with 60 hours of flying. Pursuit pilots learn to use the single-engine fast ships and bomber pilots use twin-engine planes. In this phase the youth is graduated and commissioned.

Navigators and bombardiers receive specialized training for 33 weeks and finally they and the pilots are organized into crews at transition school. The groups of 10 for each ship fly 1,000 hours. The unit is then ready to go out as a fighting squadron.

works a minute was necessary for successful completion of this course and all but two or three of the original group were graduated at the end of the five months. This short course was equal to a two-year course in college.

The women marines at Madison lived on the campus. They had no passes during the week and were free from 1:30 Saturday afternoon until 12:30 that night and from reveille until 9:00 Sunday evenings. Most of the school time was spent in classes of code and radio theory. One hour a day was devoted to physical education and another hour to drill.

While in Madison Pfc. McNatt participated in three major parades. The first was in honor of Admiral Downs of the Ninth naval district, the second in celebration of navy day and the third for the marines' 168th birthday.

The young woman was thrilled by the number of interesting people one meets while in service. She says civilians are very thoughtful and kind to all marine women and will do anything to make their stay in cities and communities happy.

Many noted entertainers have visited the camps where Miss McNatt has been. Judy Garland and Alex Templeton were at Hunter and while at Madison a group of talented men from Great Lakes put on a show which was broadcast over the Hallmark navy program.

Women in this branch of service have two winter uniforms of forest green, two dress white uniforms made of cotton gabardine and with short sleeves, trimmed in gold buttons and emblems. The hats to go with these uniforms are green with white cord. The fatigue uniforms are green and white striped seersucker with matching hats.

South America FUSE into South Americans self-reliance through example and training is the suggestion of the York Republican. Dishing out donations without making recipients self-supporting does not contribute permanent values.

We like Senator Hugh Butler's statement in the Farm Journal that the best way for this country to help our South American neighbors is to place our technical advice at the disposal of their agriculture and train their youth here in the methods that have achieved pre-eminence for our own country.

To the Farm SOME one has proposed opening an easy way for boys in the armed forces to engage in farming after the war. Back to the soil for those who left it in answer to their country's call, and accepting agriculture and stock-growing by those so inclined, will serve vital needs and help solve future problems of employment.

The Norfolk Daily News mentions Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt's nose rubbing with a guide in New Zealand as her idea of a sanitary salutation. She is said to have explained that members of her father's family adopted the custom in preference to kissing in order to safeguard against disease germs, and she rather favors it.

Lincoln's municipal light department has put the spirit of Christmas giving into practice by cancelling December bills. The gift amounts to \$28,000 to 6,000 customers, making a 9 per cent reduction in consumer cost for the year.

The latest Gallup poll concerning republican presidential possibilities shows Governor Tom Dewey in the lead and gain-

ing popularity, with Wendell Willkie and General MacArthur slipping somewhat. Bricker, Stassen, Taft, Saltonstall, Warren and Johnson trail in the order named. Changes in popular standing may take place during the next few months. The least considered now may spring to victory in the convention hopper.

How near is an allied invasion of Europe is unknown to people outside commanding heads. However, it is known that huge resources of men and equipment are being assembled on different fronts, and that the greatest assaulting force in the world's experience impends. If enemies had the sensible foresight to surrender in advance of the signal to invade, many precious lives would be saved.

The first day of winter which came Tuesday, marked the solstice period, the shortest day, the time when the sun seems to stop and change directions. Now days will slowly lengthen, and in a few more months robins will nest and other harbingers of spring will appear. In the meantime people will work and plan and hope for a mild winter and an early end of the war.

Adjournment of congress Tuesday for the holidays will enable members to circulate among constituents and absorb reactions to past and pending legislation. Sessions will resume January 10, and the country will then learn by congressional trends how preponderant opinions on the home front stack up.

In urging the need of observing constitutional restraints and limitations, the Saturday Evening Post concludes: "The poll tax is trivial compared to the threat to all liberty if congress continues to treat some temporary hue and cry as of more importance than the instrument which assures us our freedom."

A railroad employees' strike, as threatened, would be very unfortunate at this time, when demands are far in excess of facilities to handle them. Requirements of the war have added greatly to the burden on transportation lines. A tie-up would be a serious blow to an already congested system.

Christmas expressions of good will were never more numerous and, we believe, never more sincere. Distress reaches the soul's depths and reacts in feelings of cordial fellowship. The season imparts courage as it dissolves vanity and develops humility. The trial of war encourages closer and more unselfish relationships.

The problem of disposing of billions of dollars worth of war supplies when hostilities cease has begun to engage the attention of official Washington. Easing up on restrictions as soon as possible would seem a way to reduce surplus stock and modify postwar headaches.

Conversations overheard by clerks in Wayne recently are very complimentary to local merchandise and service—a fact which doubtless accounts for largely increased trade from farther areas.

The gap between rationalism and irrationalism is so narrow that one has to guard his mental ballast with careful regard for sufficiency to keep from losing control and becoming an egregious nuisance.

We recall that Edison once said success in any undertaking depends largely on hard work and little on special genius. We think Henry Ford and other notable successes would agree.

The flu epidemic which is running its diabolical course, victimizing one after another, is reported less severe so far than the one which scourged humanity 25 years ago.

OUT OF ACCORD. As congress gets ready for a holiday vacation it finds itself more and more out of harmony with the president on domestic issues. Southern democrats, sticklers for state's rights, are hankering more and more at centralized control. Their teaming up with republicans disturbs administration leaders. Time magazine sums up disagreements in this paragraph: "The plain fact is that, without any necessity for an imagined conspiracy between Joe Pew and Harry Byrd, mutual opposition to the president unites the republicans and the dissident democrats who now control congress. Everywhere—on taxes, on subsidies, on price and wage control—the administration has been battered and defeated. Led by Assistant President Jimmy Byrnes, the president's lieutenants are frantically trying to stem the tide. But one and all agree that only one man can succeed: The president himself. And even he may be too late, or too busy with the war. For the nation, the tragedy is twofold: 1) The president needs all his mind and energy for the war; 2) congress, vigorous in obstruction, lacks the organization and leadership to initiate its own program."

Washington, D. C. December 16, 1943. Margaret K. Stewart, formerly secretary of the Columbus Chamber of Commerce, is now assistant director of the Urban Land Institute with headquarters in Washington.

Members are told that production of powder and certain types of bombs and shells is far ahead of requirements. Accordingly, it is rumored that some plants of this type may be closed during the coming year.

A. C. Anderson, president of the Anderson Equipment company of Omaha, has been in Washington consulting members of the Nebraska delegation regarding proposed war contract re-negotiation legislation. He represented other equipment concerns in Nebraska.

Members are told that small business which has sub-contracts for war material may be hit first when the war work begins to recede. For that reason, the board of economic adjustment is working in most of our towns and cities urging business to start early in planning for the post-war period.

The Lea bill to amend the civil aeronautics act is tied up in the rules committee. This legislation which would set up a separate department for air is highly controversial. Railroads and the commercial air lines are well represented here. The railroads are opposing the bill. Indications are that the bill will come up for consideration early next year.

CHRISTMAS. Perhaps as the kindly Nazarine looks down on a troubled world at this Christmas season He will visualize a more largely Christianized social order as a result of the present fiery ordeal. Scouring may check indifference to responsibilities. It may separate the gold from the dross in character, and lift humanity to a higher plain of service. Breathing the spirit of the peace-loving Carpenter of Nazareth seems out of harmony at a time of war. It might seem unsuitable to exchange holiday greetings while grim battles wage. But what we are fighting for and into to win may justify inspire expressions of good will and good wishes. Out of the crucible of trial may come a permanent uplift in human qualities. Fighting to liberate shackled nations and prevent enslavement of free peoples would seem to tally with the Christmas spirit. As we reflect on the noble life that proceeded from Bethlehem's hallowed manger, we are hoping war's end will bring a deepened sense of justice. Thoughts of good cheer go out to America's armed forces everywhere. A burning wish is that another Christmas will find guns silenced, a victorious peace established and the boys returned to their loved ones.

Eradication Work Done by District

Chlorate and Salt Used in Ridding Out Weeds in Wayne County.

Annual report of the Wayne county noxious weed district shows that Wayne county has 861 farms with some bindweed or other noxious weeds, or 2,350 acres of infestation. Of this number 75 acres on 45 of the farms have had the eradication work completed. Now 1,412 acres of noxious weeds are being eradicated on 784 farms in the weed district.

This district had 85 weed eradication machines in 1943. Chemicals used were 110,000 pounds of sodium chlorate, 225 tons of salt.

Since the district was organized two years ago, 300,000 pounds of sodium chlorate, 325 tons of salt, and 5,000 pounds of atfacide have been used.

Estimates of chemicals needed in 1944 are 150,000 pounds of sodium chlorate and 300 tons of salt.

The past year 160 tons of salt and 3,000 pounds of chlorate were used on the roads.

The Bindweed Eradicator, publication of the state association, tells of Wayne county's use of 100,000 pounds of chlorate since March. Supervisors apportioned 225 tons of salt on roads, staking off patches and using a map as a guide in locating infestations. Eight men with four trucks easily unloaded one car a day. To shorten hauling distances, one car was shipped to Carroll and the other to Wayne. Cost of distributing the salt is estimated at \$1.50 per ton.

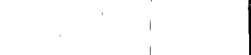

Warning Is Issued On Taking Up Jobs

Proper Steps Should Be Taken by Farm Group In Other Work.

To avoid loss of their agricultural deferments, farmers who plan to engage in essential work other than farming during the winter months must have written permission from their selective service local boards before leaving the farm. Brig. Gen. Guy N. Henninger, state director for selective service, warned.

The officer said selective service local boards have orders to cancel the deferments of farmers who leave the farm without permission. The general explained that selective service encourages farmers who have completed their own work to take temporary jobs in such essential activities as meat packing, manufacturing of war materials, construction and transportation, but that care must be taken to assure the return of irreplaceable farmers to the farm in the spring.

Farmers who are between the ages of 18 and 45 and who want to work off the farm during the winter, should take these steps: First, obtain permission to leave the farm from the county agent; second, take the county agent's statement to the selective service local board and seek the board's permission to leave the farm. This step protects the farmer's agricultural deferment; third, report to the local office of the United States Employment Service for clearance.

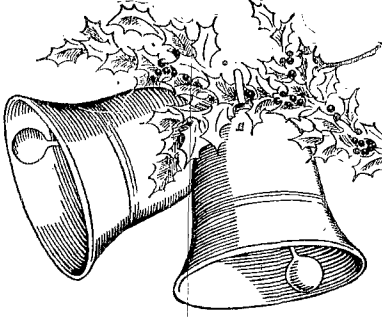

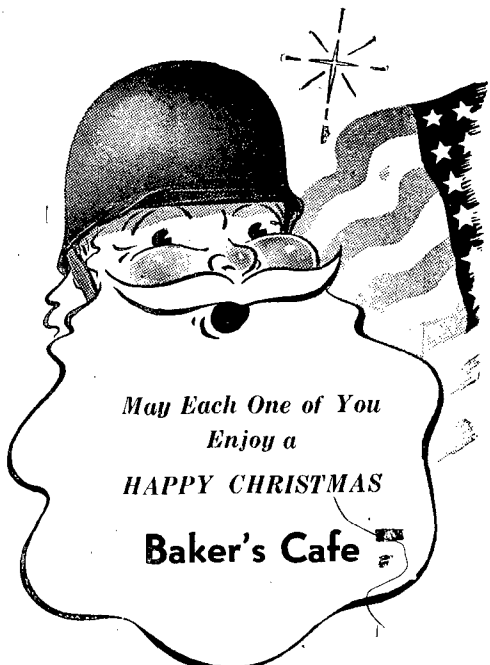



May He surround your home with His love and blessings; may He love and protect those whom you love." The card carries a picture of the three wise men, Jesus in a manger, angels and the guiding star.

Prisoner Thought Former Student

A recent issue of Newsweek carried a picture of a few members of the American air force who are prisoners in Germany. The picture was released to show how the prisoners occupy their time, this particular group having formed an orchestra.

This picture was called to the attention of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Stricker of Karon, Ia., and after careful study it is believed one in the picture is their son, 1st Lt. Tom, who was reported missing in action over Germany last March. The Strickers have had no word

from their son since the message from the war department. E. Stricker was graduated from Wayne college in 1940.

Hindu Waif Given Care by American Youths in India

Little Hindu waifs have attracted the sympathy and interest of many American soldiers stationed in India. S. Sgt. Arvid Hamer, writing to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Hamer, and brother, Dave, tells that about 100 of these lads of near teen age live off of food left by boys in camp. Each has a tin can and takes scraps in this, scrambling off to the bushes to warm the food and eat it. Seven boys with whom the Wayne young man is associated have "adopted" one of the Hindu children. The men made the lad a suit from pieces of their worn clothing, and they take turns giving him shower baths. The lad is fast learning American habits and the English language.

"We are figuring out how to build mouse traps," writes S. Sgt. Hamer. "We were putting around and listening to a British radio program when a cook from another outfit wandered in. We let him listen to our music. Then after a while he brought us some ice and a loaf of bread. So we put some tomato juice in a bucket of water and ice to cool. We had an old electric heater so we took it apart and made a stove by putting a mess kit lid on the element to toast bread. One fellow had a two-pound can of cheese so we had toasted cheese sandwiches and juice. Sure was fun and tasted good too. Then two fellows started to build a mouse trap, using cheese for bait. They set it up and then decided to fix up one of the fellows. They arranged a bucket of ice water on a box by the door. Then they jacked his bed up with a car jack. I slept through it but it all worked out pretty well. The mouse trap didn't work so well because the bait was gone by morning. Tonight they are trying to figure out another kind."

"They have a Red Cross canteen run by Indians near our mess hall and they make pretty good hamburgers. Their tea and coffee are horrible though. They make excellent French fried potatoes. "I've seen the Taj Mahal. It's very pretty, even though we only got an aerial view of it. Hope to be able to look it over more closely sometime."

"The other day I saw some unusual birds. They were as large as American eagles and on the ground resembled turkeys in size and coloring. They are protected by a \$50 fine (150 rupees which is a pile of dough in India). These had a wing spread of at least 12 feet. They are scavengers and were eating a dead dog."

"I am sending a rupee note which is worth about 30 cents. It has its value written on it in the eight official languages of India: Hindustani, Urdu, Bengali, Arabic, and the others."

"We have everything pretty nice here but nothing like home. I'm doing the kind of work I like and have real stuff to work with. The food is excellent. We had steak, potatoes and gravy today. Our barracks are comfortable. I have a rug by my bunk, a bearer who does our cleaning, shines shoes and makes our bunk, electric lights, a radio and comfortable climate so

far. It doesn't seem like any sea-son is acquainted with. It's hot in the day (like and cool at night), becoming chilly by morning. Seems odd to know it's winter back home."

"One of the fellows bought a monkey for about \$1.50. It's a cute little brown fellow with big ears and a mind of its own. The fellows tried to give him a bath but when they'd lower him into a bucket of water, he'd just keep climbing up the rope they had around his neck. So they dumped buckets of water over him. You should see him eat chewing gum. He unwraps it carefully so as not to lose a bit, then tucks it away in a pocket in his cheeks and chews it a bit at a time. When they gave him a piece of bread just after a stick of gum, he got the two all mixed up and had quite a foot long, and lots of fun to watch."

"They use ox carts to haul things here quite a bit. Just now it's harvest time for rice and the farmers are busy. They use a sickle, cut a handful, set it aside and continue. When a field is cut, they go over it, tie each bundle and set it out in rows. Then they gather it together and if they are well enough off load it on their ox carts and take it home where it is staked up. If they have no ox cart, they carry it home on their heads."

"The other day we had a bunch of coolies digging a ditch for us when a 'song-wallah' wandered over. He was a character—about 60 to 80 years old—with his face painted with white and red marks, a dirty rag for a turban. He carried a small drum, several sets of rattles and an instrument with one string. The base was shaped like a bucket with a drum head stretched over the small end, two sticks attached to opposite sides of the other end extending in a V-shape and meeting about two feet from the bucket. A string ran from the apex of the V to the center of the drum head. This thing gave forth one note only and he plucked it continuously, emitting disconsolate howls. He was singing to his own accompaniment. It was terrible."

"This is a poor section of India. The huts, clothes and possessions of the Indians are poor. The country around here seems rich enough. It is peculiar but they use iron ore to pave roads and it works pretty well. Across a pond from our barracks is a very crude irrigation system. It seems to consist of several long troughs, pivoted in the middle which is dipped into the water, then raised and the water flows out of the other end into a small reservoir in which another similar trough is used to raise it to a higher level. Each field is surrounded by a mud fence which also serves as a dyke and a foot path. Their plows are ancient affairs pulled by oxen."

"India is quite a place!"

Ration Mission For Texas Flier
