The most thrilling thing about introduction of 1944 is the prediction voiced by high military leaders and other informed sources, that Nazi enemies will be compelled to surrender before the end of the year.

But as emphasized by all war prophets, Nazi surrender may be postponed by relaxing efforts. It may be hastened by increased and redoubled contributions entering into prosecution of the war.

As to Japan, the opinion generally expressed is that it will last be defeated of the Nazis. The Rising Sun is beginning to set, but its forces are scattered and still strong, and more time may be required to seal its doom.

Thus, we enter the new year with confidence, expecting startling events, some notable changes, no doubt numerous hardships, but coveted victory and a program of enduring peace.

Postwar Plans. In line with the sound policy of revitalizing communities and institutions in the period following restoration of peace, Dr. J. T. Anderson, president of the Wayne State Teachers college, has appointed a planning committee headed by Prof. O. R. Bowen.

Mr. James congratulated Prof. Bowen and the local club on the new office brought to Wayne. Year Is Crucial. The year of 1944 will likely go down as the most crucial in history, stated Mr. James who foresees victory in the European theatre in this period.

Live communities and institutions everywhere are doing this same thing. They are getting ready to answer the sharp demands of the peace-time period.

To Discuss Profiles. Town Hall of the Air, scheduled for every Thursday evening, will start the new year by discussing political parties and policies, and Governor Dwight Griswold of Nebraska, who will be one of the speakers on January 13.

Balmly Elements. The new year came in with mild elements and freedom from snow. Whether it is an advantage or disadvantage to have snow is a question involving differences of opinion.

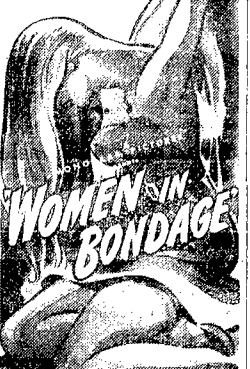

At Peace Table THE peace that follows this global war must be global in scope in order to make it enduring. As party lines are not drawn in prosecuting the war, they should not be considered in arranging terms of settlement that will insure simple justice to all nations.

It is therefore hoped statesmen of sound and far-seeing judgment will be drawn to the peace table—not men spurred by revenge or persuaded by fancy, not men led by a world-girdling idea of free handouts without thought of developing vital self-reliance.

To the peace table should be invited men who are not bound by partisan prejudice or dwarfed by narrow nationalism, men who can see far enough and act wisely enough to cooperate with other nations without setting up WPA projects or underwriting their sundry quirks of judgment.

Utmost wisdom will be essential on the part of this government in dealing with other nations in postwar days. It will be important to deal fairly without coddling and without allowing everybody to ride on uncle's back and kick him in the ribs when he falters under his load.

Generosity without over-indulgence is the spirit that will promote the independence and solidarity of nations. A friendly and helpful interest does not presuppose a steady flow of benevolences without obligation or evidence of self-improvement.

Making adjustments incident to permanent peace will be the most delicate and exacting task undertaken by this government in more than 150 years of its existence, and no mistake should be made in selecting men to be held responsible for results.

Is Justly Resentful THE World-Herald resents the renewed charge, this time in a book called "Assignment: U. S. A.," that the middle west is complacent, that stopping here after visiting the coasts was like passing from "the line of battle to the rest billet behind the lines."

The World-Herald notes the farmer working from 50 to 70 hours a week with help shortage to produce ample food for fighting men and for home consumption, and notes the surpassing record of the middle west in bond buying and other war helps.

There are fewer war perils in the middle west because of its comparative inaccessibility, but it does not lack war services nor is it behind in deep concern over intense prosecution, and hastened victory. The World-Herald makes this concluding remark:

"Why, when such facts as these are available, the midwest must continually defend its war record, is hard to understand. Are we becoming 'typed' for this particular role of whipping boy?"

Members of the republican state central committee will meet in Grand Island today, and among other business will choose a successor to Bert Carpenter who resigned as national committeeman. A contest has developed between Ira Beynon of Lincoln, and Chas. S. Reed of Omaha, rival candidates for the place. Governor Griswold favors Beynon, and acknowledges the latter would be effective in helping direct the republican national convention Nebraska-ward when it gets to the business of picking candidates.

Speaking of a group of lawyers in Omaha last week, District Judge Herbert Rhoades of the Douglas county juvenile court indicated his belief that crime is a disease and is not often cured by punishment. He thinks many boys brought into court are sick and need physical defects corrected.

Gallup, noted poll taker, finds by a recent survey that political parties are quite in agreement over foreign policies. Sharp differences exist over ways of solving domestic problems, and thus will party lines be drawn in the coming presidential campaign.

If labor leaders could sense war obligations as deeply as farm communities they would not strike and slow up essential production.



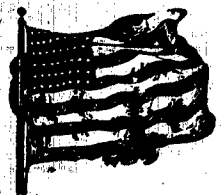

**Need for Nurses  
Becomes Urgent**

Mrs. Madge Bardsley has been named recruitment nurse for Wayne county Red Cross chapter. Steady allied offensives on all fronts have increased the need for graduate nurses of the ages of 21 to 46 to care for American wounded. As volunteer recruiting officer, Mrs. Bardsley's duty will be to contact all nurses in the chapter jurisdiction and check on their availability for the armed services or for replacing those who can go into army and navy corps for the duration. The need for nurses is urgent. Any who are nurses or who know of trained nurses are asked to contact Mrs. Bardsley.

**Stress Importance  
Of Hog Equipment**

Hog raisers will probably find that their equipment has never been as important as it will be next spring when they start a race against time to beat a reduction in the hog support price. Prof. Wm. J. Loeffel, chairman of the department of animal husbandry at the University of Nebraska said today. The government has indicated that, on certain weights, hog prices will not go below a floor of \$13.75 on a Chicago basis. This floor is to remain in effect until October 1, 1944, when the support price will be reduced to \$12.50 per 100. Every hogman will try to get under the wire, and it will take all the knowledge and skill the hogman possesses to market his pigs before the \$1.25 reduction per 100 goes into effect.

Most likely to win the race is the early farrowed pig that is well started. The pig that has suffered setbacks through inadequate housing or deficient equipment has two strikes on him before he starts. "E a 1-y-farrowing necessitates good housing," Prof. Loeffel said. "Now is the time to check up on this. A good house does not need to be an imposing or costly one. In fact, it may only be an A-house snugly banked with straw, located in a well drained spot and protected from drifting snow."

He also recommended using electric pig brooders to reduce baby pig mortality where electricity is available. "Intelligent self-feeding will play a large part in the race against the October 1 deadline," Loeffel explained. "Hog troughs, hurdles, creep and other pieces of equipment should be made ready now, and old self feeders should be repaired or replaced."

"Hogmen will have to improvise a great deal and order supplies early to avoid the hazards of scarcity," Loeffel concluded. "A general who would undertake a battle without a carefully checked supply system would be foolish, but no more negligent than the man who produces a crop of pigs next spring and leaves his equipment to chance."

The army and navy have bought 10,000,000 books for off-duty reading, and are planning to buy as many as 35,000,000 more. Magazines are sent regularly to every company overseas. When the men cannot come to libraries, the libraries come to them. Traveling libraries follow the men almost to the front lines, and books and magazines are delivered to isolated bases by parachute, or in water-tight boxes. The men appreciate these books perhaps more than we at home who only have to walk a block or two to the library to get all the books we want.

A very interesting new book received this week is called The Ten Commandments. This book contains 10 short novels of Hitler's war against the moral code. The preface of the book is written by Herman Raushning. The 10 parts are as follows: 1. Thou shalt have no other gods before me, by Thomas Mann; 2. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, by Rebecca West; 3. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain, by Franz Werfel; 4. Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy, by John Erskine; 5. Honour thy father and thy mother, by Bruno Frank; 6. Thou shalt not kill, by Jules Romains; 7.
