Ill, blind and virtually penniless, the founder of Mother's Day, Miss Anna Jarvis, now in her 83rd year, is confined to a sanitarium at West Chester, Pa., under the friendly protectorate of a group of Philadelphia citizens who learned of her plight.

Money the aged spinster inherited from her mother was exhausted long ago. She used it to perpetuate the day she sought to have celebrated "in every civilized country in the world."

Independent in thought and action, Miss Jarvis was embittered in later years over what she termed the "commercialization" of Mother's Day. She founded the day in memory of her own mother, Mrs. Anna Reeves Jarvis, on May 9, 1905.

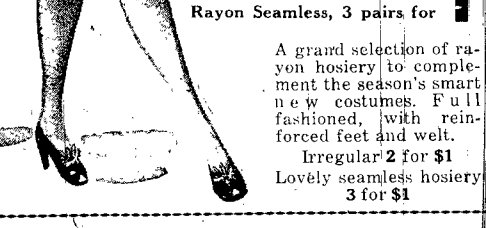
