### Farmers, Dealers or Truckers Selling or Transporting Grain or Any Other Material Containing Bindweed Seed

(1) May a farmer sell grain or other ma terial containing Bindweed seed?

No seed, feed, grain or material containing Bindweed or other noxious weed seed shall be sold within this state unless processed or sold for the purpose of such processing as will destroy the viability of such weed seed.

(2) How may a farmer dispose of his sur plus grain containing noxious weed seed if it is impossible to process it on his own farm?

Grain containing Bindweed or other noxious weed seed must be declared as such when sold or offered for sale. The purchaser then assumes responsibility for processing or selling such grain.

What precautions must be taken by farmers, truckers or common carriers in transporting grain or other material containing Bindweed or other noxious

No seed, grain, screenings, feed or other material containing Bindweed or other noxious weed seed shall be transported over any road or highway unless the same is carried in such vehicles or containers as will prevent leaking, scattering or wind blowing.
