



After a succession of owners, F. D. They is sued the wonderfully comprehensive birthday edition of 1933, Within the past year the Hartington Herald suspended publication for the duration of the war on account of the anbearable help problem.

Then we rescured from threats of the incherator copies of the Norfolk Daily News of February, 1933, explaining the daily broadcasts then instituted by the Wayne literald over WJAG to serve this area. It was an interesting and helpful experience, but after a few years in the presence of drouth and depression, shrinking business and too little help, it was discontinued Results at the time did not justify overburdening inadequate help.

If the future warrants addition of radio service to the production of rural weeklies a department should be specially staffed for the purpose. In fecognizing the venture in early 1933, G. H. of the Daily News made this concluding and stimulating observation: "Do you know any reason why Norfolk and Wayne and everyone in this territory shouldn't be working with each other? We all want to help this part of Nebraska."
