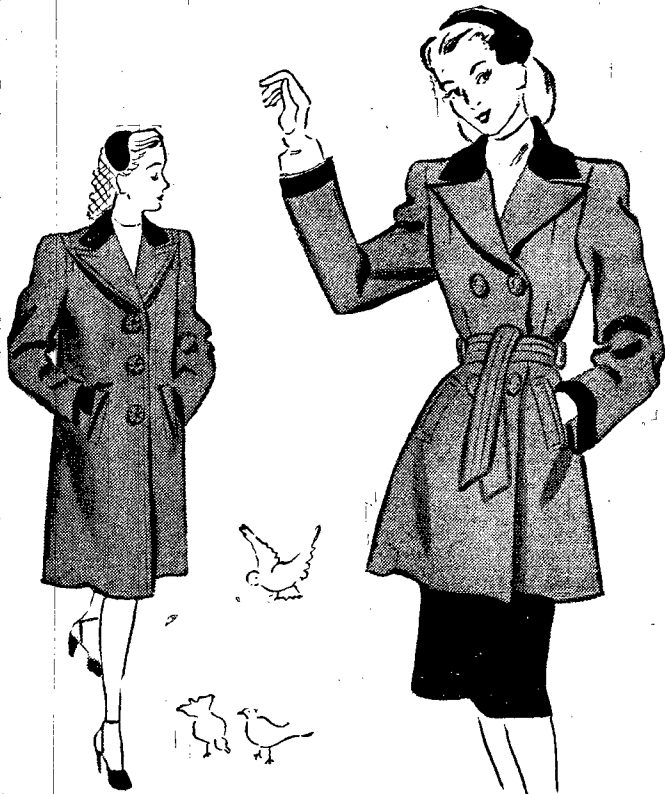
After the ceremony, four-course dinner was served to the bridal party and guests. Placecards were of pink and white hearts held together by four-leaf clovers.

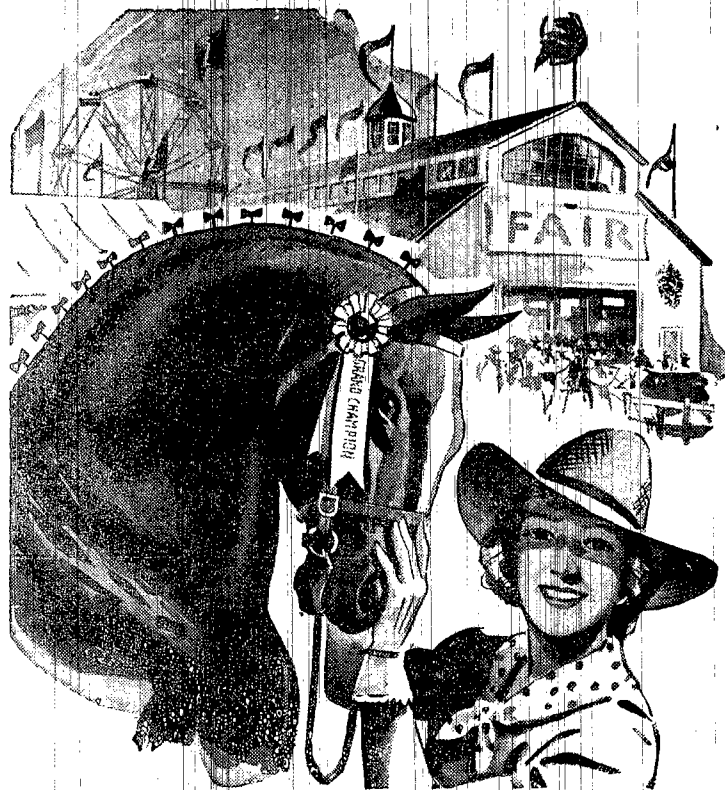
