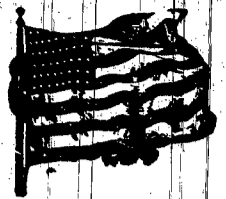

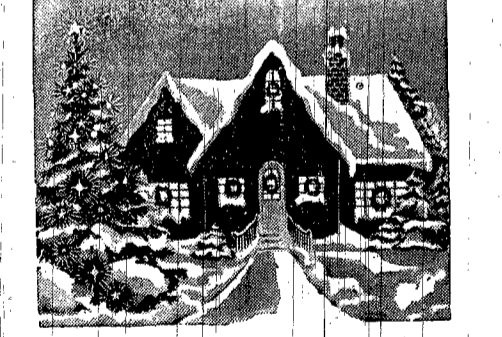

CHRISTMAS SWEETS.
The sugar shortage is often a problem during the holiday season, but molasses, honey, corn syrup and some dried fruits which are point-free may be used to make a little Christmas candy.
These are a few examples of sweets which may be made with little or no sugar.
Peanut Clusters: Mix together 1/2 cup dark corn syrup, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1 tablespoon vinegar. Cook to 240° F. (or until small quantity in water forms a soft ball). Add 2 tablespoons table fat, pour over 2 1/2 cups shelled roasted peanuts. Mix quickly. Drop by tablespoons on greased surface. Makes 20.
Fruit Balls: Wash and dry 1 cup prunes and 1 1/2 cups raisins. (If prunes are extra dry, soften slightly in water.) Grind through meat chopper, using medium knife. Add 1/2 cup chopped nut meats if desired. Mix well with 1 tablespoon lemon juice and a few grains salt. Make into balls, 1 rounded tablespoon mixture to a ball, and roll in sugar. Store in a tin box or tight jar. If available other dried fruits—figs, apricots or dates—may be substituted for part or all of the prunes or raisins. This is a popular confection for children.

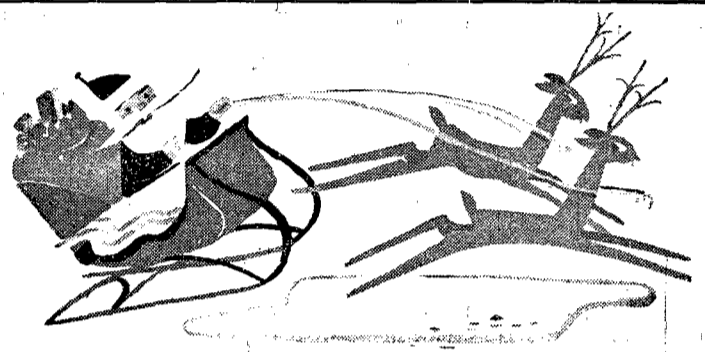

Heroic Advance of Glider Infantry In Holland Told

The heroic advance of the 365th glider infantry regiment, of the 82nd airborne division of the 3rd army during the day and night of the battle of Mook, Holland, in October, is described in the Paraglide, an army newspaper published in Holland and sent by Pfc. Willis G. Lessmann, son of Mrs. Amelia Lessmann of Wayne.

The village of Mook lay on the other side of a hill. Behind were the green forests of Holland with droplets of rain shining like diamonds on the trees and dancing from the pines to the ground. Mook, the small Dutch canal town, lay ahead.

"Front lines were straight ahead, just beyond the village and across the field," writes J. C. Reynolds. "Nature was playing a trick on the men, a trick that Jerry was fully aware of and prepared to play along with. Low, dense fog, behind which our men advanced. Suddenly, as though swept away by a huge hand, the fog lifted within five minutes and the troops lay startlingly exposed to the enemy. The company on the flank

bore the brunt of this weather phenomenon, as the handful of men still alive could attest to."

One powerfully-built officer remarked that he had lived seven lives since morning. "I met lonely, scared men, almost childlike in expression, with great effort stumbling to the medical stations in the rear," Reynolds writes.

"Attack ready! I was just in time. Several British tanks stood along the road with engines idling like a far distant thunder storm. A column of men silently moved along a hedgerow to the road and climbed on the rear of the armored giants. One of the young soldiers determinedly took his place aloft the front of the first tank. Bearded faces, looked up, broke into smiles and spoke friendly jibes at the youth on the first tank. It worked, for a slow smile appeared on his face and developed into a grin. He was still grinning as the steel tanks rolled forward."

"I fell in with the forward moving column. I turned and joined the others as they dashed toward the enemy-built trench along the banks of the canal. I saw one boy make a lightning dash for the trench. I watched him disappear over the side. I didn't have time to look away before I was startled by a terrific explosion and the sight of that boy flying out of the trench as though seized by powerful hands and tossed up onto the ground. He lay motionless in the midst of the clearing smoke. In search of protection he had chosen the one spot in a hundred yards where a mine had been placed.

"Still forward. Then it came! All hell broke loose. The air screamed with death tokens. My head started to pound as though it was a huge anvil continually striking under the powerful blows of a mighty hammer.

"With night came silence. I retreated waiting and fatigued. I returned to the churchyard, propped against the wall, weary. I thought of the men I had seen, of the things they had done in battle, of the enemy back of the chaplain I had talked to who was more convinced of a divine being than ever before.

"Ambulances and jeeps were speeding along the roads evacuating the wounded. Medics were working at a feverish pace in a small Dutch house. The litter squads had gone five days without rest. There were no wasted moments or moments there. I became conscious of faces peering from the depths of those rooms—the resting wounded awaiting evacuation to the hospital.

"At dawn I turned and walked back up the hill. There was Mook last night's battle ground from which the Germans had retreated and through which our troops had advanced. Yes, Mook literally lay there, a town without a single person, a town of broken glass, bricks and smouldering ruins. There was

the canal flowing as always. Beyond the city were the valiant men of that heroic 325th glider regiment. They had fought hard, lost many, but gained their objective. They were weary and exhausted but victorious. They had beaten the enemy and accomplished their mission.

"Before lay the green forests of Holland, where everything was in peace, and the droplets of rain shown like diamonds as they gaily danced from the pine trees to the ground."

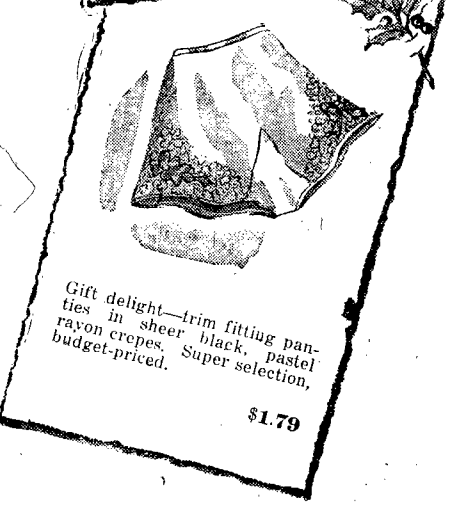
