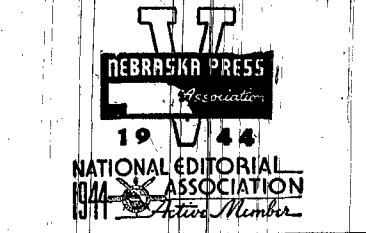

Touching Russia
 The second and final installment of William L. White's condensed "Report on the Russians" appears in the January Reader's Digest. Americans are glad the Russians are helping defeat the Nazi enemy, and the Russians may well be just as glad the Americans are helping bring about the same end. Russia is fighting to safeguard itself against future invasion and conquest. America is fighting to protect itself and to insure the self-determination of nations. It wants other nations to behave themselves and not interfere with one another.

In ideologies, Russia and the United States are far apart, as pointed out by Writer White. He corroborates other observers in stories of few liberties, inadequate food and distinctions of rank within the soviet union. Everybody lives for the state, and no criticism of the state is permitted. Heavy penalties for small offenses teach subjects to be careful. Censorship is iron-clad. If the truth is considered unwise, it is concealed or distorted. Russian newspapers do not like White's account of his experiences.

So, after peace, ticklish questions of future national relationships will come up. America's huge part in winning the war and in restoring orderly processes to Europe will entitle it to a large voice at the peace table. And its sense of justice and its ideas of future security will be vital to the liberty and welfare of all nations.

Reluctantly Yields
 IT IS noted that President Roosevelt has signed the bill to freeze social security at one per cent which he is said to have done reluctantly. Threatened overriding of a veto likely proved persuasive. Confining the social security plan without stepping up the rate, as originally intended, will satisfy most small town businesses and employees who are already overburdened by taxes.

The president accompanied his approval with a statement that he would ask for an extension of the law. As a matter of fact, according to reports, the large cash surplus invested in social security has been used for other purposes, and therefore the proposed increase was not needed. As a further matter of fact, the social security law is a nightmare to small institutions and their workers, and during its existence has shown no appreciable qualities of usefulness. So far as rural communities are involved, no one would be worse off if the plan were abandoned, and protection were left to private initiative.

School Minutes
 THE epicameral convenes and gets up steam early in January, and it promises to have plenty to do to keep it busy in meeting legislative needs. One thing that is being pushed forward for favorable attention is a law to compel school boards to publish their proceedings. Such a law makes so much sense and is so closely in line with the public

interest that it is surprising it had not found its way into the state's statutes long ago.
 The public has a right to know how its tax money is being spent. It should be apprised of how school affairs are being managed. County and city units are required to set forth their doings at regular intervals. School districts should do the same thing. Board members ought to be hearty in favor of the move, but if not, they should come out in front and explain why they are against it.

Custom decrees suspension of usual activities on New Year's day, though there would seem no good reason for doing so. The ancients had a long-drawn-out celebration beginning with the feast of Saturn on December 17 and lasting until after the winter solstice and after proof was had that daylight would lengthen and a season of sunshine and harvest would return. Saturn was the god of seed-time and plenty and peace, and so it was distinguished in December's short days for its amiable qualities. Benighted natives of the ancient world felt licensed by friendly Saturn to get pickled and stay that way until a new year had been properly installed.

A new note involving food supplies was sounded in Washington the first of the week. It seems food piles have been disappearing too fast for safety, and as a consequence rationing rules had to be tightened. People will have to do more skimping on rationed items and substitute more of the things that are free. Stepped-up war demands require persons on the home front to be more careful in restricting their daily habits, and they will be glad to do it in support of their conquering boys abroad.

Time magazine reports the early retirement of Madam Frances Perkins as secretary of labor. She is the fourth person to hold the office since it was created in 1913, and so she has served neither better nor worse than many. In her twelve years at the head of the labor department she has stuck close to the "left." If Henry Wallace is appointed to succeed her, as mentioned, he will not permit the "left" to suffer any aching void by reason of the change. His public record testifies to that.

Dangers of the road are increased by winter's snow and ice, and motorists are urged to exercise utmost care. Too many accidents are charged to reckless driving, to taking unnecessary risks on treacherous highways. Permanent injuries may be avoided and untimely deaths prevented by observing rules of the road. Liquor is responsible for many fatal wrecks, and no one with alcoholic tanglefoot aboard should be allowed to steer a high-powered car.

While events of recent years show we are not overly civilized, we still have developed and stuck to some customs that suggest refined sensibilities. Time was when parents took Christmas gifts for their children to favorite churches for distribution and display. The practice caused heartaches among youngsters who received little. Its cruel heathenishness dawned on leaders after too long a time, and the custom was squelched.

The report that 650,000 veterans of the war will at the end of hostilities enroll in American colleges shows worthy ambition and encourages the expectations of many educational institutions that are planning post-war courses. The expressed desire for higher training promises much for future citizenship.

People who work because they like to work, and who have high standards of production in mind rather than how much they can realize from the least effort or most indifferent planning, deserve to be encouraged. They constitute the great middle class on which largely depends future stability.

The customary "Merry Christmas" was more perfunctory than ever this year because of the continued horrors of war. It is hoped it will be restored to its old-time meaning a year hence.

LOOK OUT.

An article by Frank Brock in a current magazine warns relatives of service men to look out for fake charities. The writer charges that Americans are swindled out of millions every year on pretenses to help worthy causes. All kinds of schemes are reported worked to fleece the unsophisticated. Highly wrought emotions become easy prey of unscrupulous slickers. These suggestions are offered: "Say no to all telephone solicitations from unknown persons. Refuse books, posters or gadgets which salesman or letters assure you will benefit a national, veteran or charitable organization. Frequently little, if any, of your gift will reach those for whom it is intended. Never assume that impressive names on a letterhead assure an organization's honesty or effectiveness. Some prominent people lend their names to any high-sounding organization without bothering to know what it is all about. Also, racketeers often use honest citizens' names without permission. Before you give money to any appeal you are not certain is legitimate, ask your Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce whether the cause is worthy and its promoters honest."

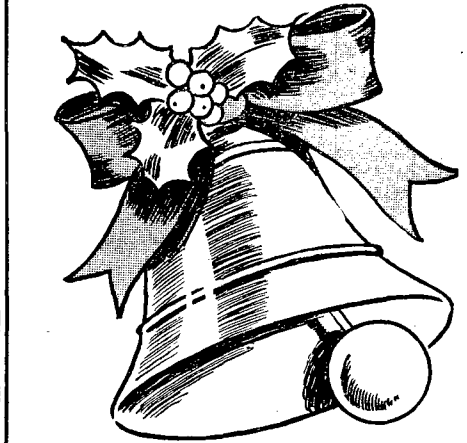

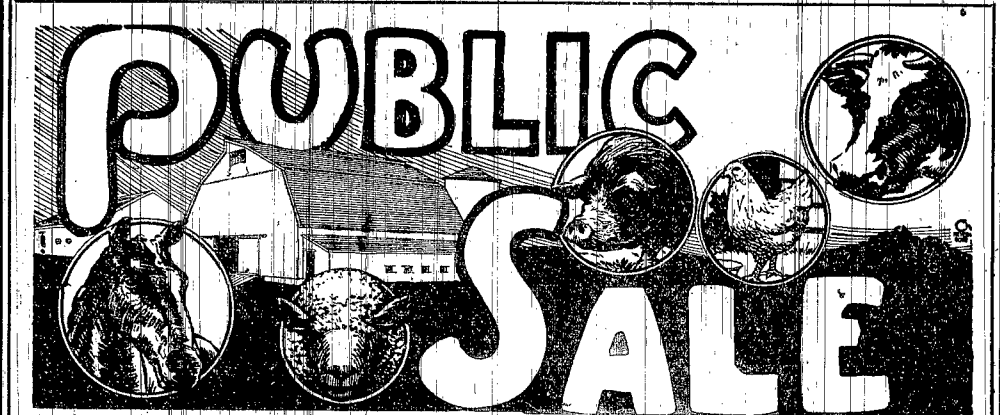

Wayne McMaster on the Anzio beach line in Italy March 3, came. Lt. D. Sgt. Roy Hintz was killed in France. Dixon county held a big fair at Concord, Miss. Arnold Gerleman, reported missing in France, was found to have lost his life. Wayne college was approved for rehabilitation training for service men. K. N. Parke resigned from the college staff to enter the insurance business, and Miss Lettie Scott retired from the college staff, each having served more than 20 years. Navy Instructor Stanley Johnson died.

Wayne county held a successful fair in September. Dean Meyer's calf was champion. Eastern Star held a district meeting in Wayne. Rev. T. J. C. Schult came from Nebraska City to serve St. Paul church, and Rev. D. Theophilus came from Iowa to Theophilus church, Norman Lubberstedt, Don Meyer and Delores Heithold took high awards on calves at the state fair in Lincoln. J. J. Steele was appointed Wayne postmaster. Sgt. Robert Conrad was reported missing over Germany and later found to be a prisoner. Floyd Conger bought the interest of his partner, Wm. Mellor, in a grocery. S. Sgt. Robert Heylman was missing over Italy and later learned to be a prisoner. An election was called to vote on bonds for buying the airport site. Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Johnson of Wakefield, celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. Mrs. M. P. Ahern, one of Wayne's earliest merchants, died. Pfc. Irvin Martinson of Wakefield, was reported missing and later found to be a prisoner. Wayne county lost three young men in France in one week. Sgt. Dale Frink, Pvt. Ralph Hachmeyer and Pvt. Walter Meyer. Pfc. Harold Sweigard was also killed in that area. Walter Heiderman was accorded the W. G. Skelly award for "outstanding achievement" in his farming operations.

October opened with news that the 6th war loan would run through November and December with this county's quota \$418,100, which is nearly realized as the year closes. Dean Meyer took grand championship on his calf at Omaha Ak-Sar-Ben, this being the fifth year Wayne county youths have scored this success, and he received \$445 a pound for the beef, a total of \$4,984. By vote of 358 to 160, Wayne residents decided to issue \$17,000 in bonds for buying the airport. Lt. John Macklin and Lt. Kenneth Okeson were killed in Europe. Supt. John Hansen of Fremont, Wayne alumnus, was chosen governor of Kiwanis in Nebraska-Iowa district. Dr. H. D. Kemper resigned his college position to go to Wichita, Kan. Lt. Ed. Hesse, reported missing, was later found to have lost his life.

Decide on Honor Roll.
In early November War Dads decided to erect an honor roll bearing names of all in service. Pvt. Roy Stender of Winde, was missing in Germany. Pfc. Harold Tiedtke died in New Guinea. President Roosevelt was reelected for a fourth term, though Nebraska and Wayne county piled up big republican majorities. County Judge J. M. Cherry and Senator W. A. Crossland were reelected. The Logan ditch proposal was defeated by 1,337 to 961. Pfc. Howard Fleetwood was reported missing. Carl Anderson was injured in a tractor-car-pickup mishap south of Wakefield. Winside board tabled the request that residents be required to use electric current from the local power plant. Pfc. Marvin Storm was killed in Germany, and Wm. Schaffel in China. Kiwanians elected R. K. Kirkman president. Bids were asked on the new college stadium. The war fund drive for \$5,200 was conducted.

Place New Sign.
Chamber of Commerce in December erected a new illuminated sign advertising Wayne at the intersection south of town. The organization elected as new directors W. R. Bressler, Walden Felber, Dr. E. L. Harvey, E. G. Fuelber, Elmer Mayer, E. A. Jensen, W. P. Thomas and Clarence Sorenson. Miss Anna Clute of the college, resigned to go to Oregon. Wayne airport site was approved by federal officials, and the sum of \$95,000 was earmarked as possibly available for improving a local port. S. Sgt. Vincent Malloy was killed in Germany. W. R. Ellis resigned as court reporter after serving 30 years. S. Sgt. Clayton Gries lost his life in France, and Cpl. Donald Sieckman in Germany.
Pvt. Earl Hurlbert was reported missing in Germany. Pvt. John Einung, reported missing in Germany, returned to his outfit and cabled home folks of his safety. J. W. Litherland resigned as head of the local school to go to Lincoln in the state superintendent's office, and Stewart Baller of Omaha was picked to succeed him. F. B. 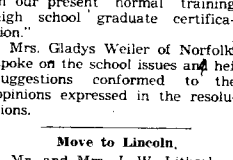

D-day, June 6, was the outstanding event of June with 11,000 planes, 4,000 ships and thousands of men invading the Normandy beaches of France. Wayne city tax levy was set in early June at 18 mills, 15 less than the year before. Prof. John R. Dean Jensen was reported missing, later said to have lost his life, still later found to be a prisoner and recently to have had an arm amputated. Congressman Karl Stearns spoke in Wayne for the War Dads, giving assurance that the "heart of America is in the middle west." Lt. Budd Bornhoff, who lost his ship in the Normandy invasion, returned safely. Lt. Ronald Anderson took part in the history-making first shuttle bombing flight over Europe.
Highway Is Resurfaced.
Resurfacing of highway No. 15 between Wayne and Laurel started in August. P. Sgt. Virgil Stelek, college student, was killed in action. W. E. Weggers was chosen head of the new county dairy association. Winside had the annual old settlers picnic. Joe Ringland of New York, was chosen vice president of a Minneapolis bank and Hays Main was named vice president of an Aurora, Ill., bank, both men being formerly of Wayne. Two men and a woman from Des Moines picked the wrong place when they attempted to rob the jewelry store of Paul Mines for the latter chased them. Later the trio was identified in Sioux City and tried on Iowa charges. Wayne county service list was published with more than 1,000 names included. R. S. Much Destroyed By Holiday Blaze

Valuable Improvements Made in Wayne During Early Period.

Thanksgiving night in 1891 is a memorable holiday for all who were early residents of Wayne for it was then that the business district suffered its worst fire loss in history. Citizens of Wayne were startled by the fire alarm and it was soon discovered that the Hoffman building was ablaze. The fire had originated in the second story of the structure and had evidently been burning for some time. Dr. Regan's office was in the front upstairs. Mrs. Hogue-wood had living quarters at the back and had been away all day. In a matter of minutes the building was enveloped in flames. With meagre means of fighting the fire it was concluded that efforts should be devoted to saving adjoining structures. One by one the buildings went down before the flames until the fire reached the alley. It was only by tearing down the Whittion building and covering the cell meat market with blankets, water, salt and flour, that fire fighters were able to keep the blaze from wiping out the entire west side of the business district. The losses are estimated as follows: O. A. Hoffman, building \$1,800; M. E. Regan, books and instruments \$2,000; S. L. Andrews, clothing \$4,000; G. F. Sebald, building \$1,000; Ferrebee & Gardner dry goods \$2,500; B. J. Kass, drug and building \$7,000; P. L. Miller, groceries and building \$5,000; C. A. Chace, building \$1,000; S. R. Theobald, dry goods \$4,000; Geo. Whittion, building \$1,000; T. Collinson, dry goods and clothing \$9,000; Frank Winters, household goods \$400; Mrs. Hoguewood, household goods \$300. It is expected that new brick structures will replace most of the frame business buildings destroyed.

Soldier Killed In German Area

Telegram Comes Tuesday To Father of Local Infantry Soldier.

Pvt. Earl R. Hurlbert, 21, was killed in Germany November 20, states a telegram received on December 26. Word came two weeks ago that he had been missing since that date. Last Thursday his father, Calvin M. Hurlbert, received from Acting Adjutant General Dunlap in Washington, D. C., a telegram which reads as follows: "The secretary of war asks that I assure you of his deep sympathy in the loss of your son, Pvt. Earl R. Hurlbert, who was previously reported missing in action November 20 in Germany. Letter follows."

Pvt. Hurlbert was born June 21, 1923. He spent most of his life in Carroll, entering service in April, 1943. He trained at Fort Benning, Ga., as a paratrooper and after suffering a leg injury was transferred to the infantry. He was here in the summer of 1943 just before his mother passed away and he came again last March. He went overseas in early fall.


