Touching THE second and final installment of William L. White's condensed "Report on the Russians" appears in the January Reader's Digest. Americans are glad the Russians are helping defeat the Nazi enemy, and the Russians may well be just as glad the Americans are helping bring about the same end. Russia is fighting to safeguard itself against future invision and conquest. America is fighting to protect itself and to insure the self-determination of nations. It wants other nations to behave themselves and not interfere with one another.

In ideologies, Russia and the United States are far apart, us pointed out by Writer White. He corroborates other poservers in stories of few liberties, inadequate food and distinctions of rank within the soviet union. Everybody lives for the state, and no criticism of the state is permitted. Heavy penalties for small offenses teach subjects to be careful. Censorship is iron-clad. If the truth is considered unwise, it is conjealed or distorted. Russian newspapers do not like White's account of his experiences.

So, after peace, ticklish questions of ti-

so, after peace, ticklish questions of future national relationships will come up.
America's huge part in winning the war and in restoring orderly processes to Europe will entitle it to a large voice at the peace table. And its sense bf justice and its ideas of tuture security will be vital to the liberty and welfare of all nations.

Reluctantly IT IS noted that President Roosevelt has signed the bill to freeze social security at one per cent which he is said to have done reluctantly. Threatened overridate that whether the president procedure and president is a second or seco mave done refuctantly. Threatened overriding of a veto likely proved persuasive. Continuing the social security plan without stepping up the rate, as originally intended, will satisfy most small-town businesses and employes who are already overburdened by taxes.

The president accompanied his approval with a statement that he would ask for an extension of the law. As a matter of fact, according to reports, the large cash surplus invested in social security has been used for other purposes, and therefore the proposed increase was not needed. As a further matter of fact, the social security law is a nightmare to small institutions and their workers, and during its existence has shown no appreciable qualities of usefulness. So far as rural communities are involved, no one would be worse off if the plan were abandoned, and protection were left to private initiative.

School THE unicameral convenes and Minutes and it promises to have plenty to do to keep it busy in meeting legislative needs. One thing that is being pushed forward for favorable attention is a law to compel school boards to publish their proceedings. Such a law makes so much sense and is so closely in line with the public

interest that it is surprising it had not found its way into the state's statutes long

The public has a right to know how its tax money is being spent. It should be kert apprised of how school affairs are being managed. (County and city units are required to set forth their doings at regular intervals. School districts should do the same thing. Board members ought to be heatfuly in favor of the move, but if not, they should come out in front and explain why they are against it.

The accients had a long-drawn-out celebration beginning with the feast of Saturn on December 17 and lasting until after the winter solstice and after proof was had that daylight would lengthen and a season of sunshine and harvest would return. Saturn was the gol of seed-time and plenty and peace, and so it was distinguished in December's short days for its amiable qualities. Benighted natives of the ancient world felt licensed by friendly Saturn to get pickled and stay that way until a new year had been properly installed.

It seems food piles have been disappearing too fast for safety, and as a consequence rationing rules had to be tightened. People will have to do more skimping on rationed items and substitute more of the things that are free. Steppedup war demands require persons on the home front to be more careful in restricting their daily habits, and they will be glad to do it in support of their conquering boys abroad.

Time magazine reports the early retirement of Madam Frances Perkins as secretary of labor. \$he is the fourth person to hold the office since it was created in 1913, and so she has served neither better nor worse than many. In her twelve years at the head of the labor department she has stuck close to the "left." If Henry Wallace is appointed to succeed her, as mentioned, he will not permit the "left." to affer any aching void by reason of the change. His public record testifies to that.

Dangers of the road are increased by winter's snow and ide, and motorists are urged to exercise uthost care. Too many accidents are charged to reckless driving, to taking unnecessary risks on treacherous highways. Permanent injuries may be avoided and unitimely deaths prevented by observing rules of the road. Liquor is responsible for many fatal wrecks, and no one with alcoholic tanglefoot aboard should be allowed to steer a high-powered car.

While events of recent years show we are not overly civilized, we still have developed and stack to some customs that suggest refined sensibilities. Time was when parents took Christmas gifts for their children to favorite churches for discussional despias. The practice caused neartaches among youngsters who received little. Its cruel heather hishness dawned on leadless after to long a time and the conleaders after too long a time, and the custom was squelched.

The report that 650,000 veterans of the war will at the end of hostilities enroll in American colleges shows worthy ambition and encourages the expectations of many educational institutions that are planning post-war courses. The expressed desire for higher training promises much for future citizenship.

People who work because they like to work, and who have high standards of production in mind rather than how much they can realize from the least effort or most indifferent planning, deserve to be encouraged. They constitute the great middle class on which largely depends future stability.

The customary "Merry Christmas" was more perfunctory than ever this year be-cause of the continued horrors of war. It is hoped it will be restored to its old-time meaning a year hence,






