Back to THE bill in the legislature to require school boards to publish their proceedings has been returned to sleep by the committee in charge, and we are advised that revival on the floor would result in defeat. We cannot understand the manner of thinking that would deny school patrons the information to which they are plainly entitled.

Perhaps the legislative mind, accustomed to sparring with politicians and other self-seekers, is misled into believing newspapers are for the proposed law on purely selfish grounds. As a matter of truth, the average country publisher could walk backwards through his business district and collect more revenue in ten minutes than publishing school board proceedings would amount to in a year.

Editors believe school business should be made public the same as municipal and

Editors believe school business should be made public the same as municipal and county affairs—convinced that publicity is a powerful influence in behalf of careful management and economical expenditures. The report that school boards are generally against the proposed law is quite inconceivable. They should be openly and firmly for it.

"We want none of it here to cut the very

eagle-eyed scrutiny to keep our well-intentioned but ill-informed statesmen from blundering
into the most serious of blunders."

To End A Sioux City Journal editorial Wars expresses the firm belief that by avoiding mistakes of the past and by exercising sound statesmanship now, future wars may be prevented. Nations are sickened by loss of men and treasure through conflict, and they will welcome any movement to insure permanent peace. The pessimistic notion that

wars are inevitable does not help. It hinders. The Journal comments in conclusion:
"Now of all times in our history we need and must have statesmanship, courage and determination of high quality if we, as divilized peoples, are to succeed in this greatest of all movements in behalf of organized society, the world over. Let us not think at the outset that we necessarily must fail. Instead, let us believe we shall succeed because we must. War can be outlawed. Let humanity resolve to do it, and let all strengthen their powers in achieving it by first believing in it. We can do nothing if we lack faith at the outset."

A bill reported under consideration in the legislature provides for altering school district boundaries on approval of voters. We supposed they already had that right. Perhaps this proposed law would facilitate the proceeding in behalf of fewer and larger districts. Due to easy transportation, bigger school units are deemed desirable in the interest of economy and efficiency. Maintaining a school with two or three pupils is an extravagance that shouts for relief. Perhaps the pending legislation expects to furnish it.

A magazine reports that Henry Wallace learned some Spanish, Russian and Chinese for convenience while serving as vice president, and now in his new job as comerce secretary he proposes to learn to fly in order to know more about private aviation that will come within his sphere of official action. A fellow who is up in the air ideologically so much of the time, will readily adjust himself to going, up in a machine.

By a majority of one vote the national house decided to retain in the agricultural department appropriation bill a provision authorizing \$50,000,000 for a school lunch program. Those opposed protested on the ground that families were able to furnish lunches for their children and that the appropriation was not necessary.

Former President Herbert Hoover has been giving advice concerning the Dumbarton Oaks peace plans to be considered further next month in San Francisco. It is hoped prejudiced opponents of the former president will be persuaded to heed his warnings in view of the crucial world situation involved.


