





Inspires THE story of President Confidence Harry Truman's humble Gunther, inspires confidence in the man to whom has fallen the task of national leadership at a critical time. It appears that the president came up the hard way, often had to struggle to make ends meet, and he was therefore deeply imbued with the necessity of toil and economy. The fact that he did not waste either time or earnings in his personal experience naturally makes him heedful of similarly sound policies in directing and guarding the world's largest public trust.

The report says he highly prizes truth and consistency, and warmly dislikes "stuffed shirts." He enjoyed being senator, but he had no ambition to be vice president or president, though he was thrust into the former and fate landed him in the latter. He is bent on surrounding himself with competent helpers, and he does not expect, unnecessarily to interfere with them. He does not feel superior, but he is going to use his best judgment, assisted by persons the thinks knows. He will no doubt make mistakes, but it is believed he cannot often go far wrong under the influence of good intentions.

Richest CONSCIOUSNESS of having Reward done a noble and generous Reward deed is one's best compensation. Boys who have gone through the out-Shermaned hell of modern warfare cannot be adequately repaid. Anxiety for their safe return and unflagging endeavor to meet war's demands but feebly match the hardships of actual conflict. Grateful acknowledgments cannot restore the maimed nor bring back those who have been lost. No matter how profoundly home people may feel, they cannot cure the ills of those who have suffered the brunt of battle. However great the government's substantial considerations may be, it cannot remove the scars left on its faithful fighting sons. The people and their government will do their best to modify hurts and losses, but the soldier's knowledge of having contributed self to the limit is after all his richest reward.


