

He described Calcutta, India, as a place of disease, pestilence, stench and poverty. Water is polluted and many die of cholero and typhus. He complimented Lt. Col. F. V. Peterson who speaks here this Thursday evening. He said Lt. Col. Peterson had an opportunity to learn India well.

Col. McDermott did some flying in China and noted that because of the few bases in that nation, it is well to reach the destination sought. China, with its miserable huts, is, he stated, a land of poverty.

ment of death should be committed to control of a world government, but that its secret should not be revealed to the united nations organization. The scientist thinks a world government should be organized under the leadership of the United States, Great Britain and Russia with a constitution duly prepared. He does not believe rule by a minority in Russia is a threat to world peace. He is convinced that the three leading powers should fashion a world government and then invite other nations, big or small, to join. The plan would not be to dictate forms of government, but to force the rule of liberty and prevent aggression. In conclusion Einstein says: "Since I do not foresee that atomic energy is to be a great boon for a long time, I have to say that for the present it is a menace. Perhaps it is well that it should be. It may intimidate the human race into bringing order into its international affairs, which, without the pressure of fear, it would not do."
