County Gets Sum From State Racing

Wayne county is one of the state's 88 counties which conducted fair's of 4-H shows this year and received financial help for their premiums as a result of the first distribution of racing funds by the Nebraska State Racing commission since Omaha's Ak-Sar-Ben called a war-time halt in 1942.

As a result of some \$34,892.65 collected in taxes and license fees at the Ak-Sar-Ben meeting this year, the commission was able to appropriate \$344.65 for each of the counties which qualified under the law.

Retail Merchant Gets Consideration

The retail merchant has so often been the forgotten man, both during wartime and reconversion planning. Nebraska's senior United States Senator Hugh Butler related in a special statement to the retailers of his state through their official publication, The Nebraska Retailer.
"While the government and its economists authorized and made the laws regarding consumer buying activities, it was the hometown or city retailer who was forced to put in the many extra hours of payless over-time work and to do the policing for such policies and edicts. At the same time, the retailer had to face his customers with explanations regarding the lack of war-scarce goods and products, thus making him the middle man, or the 'shock absorber,' between two demanding groups. These are and were most trying conditions under which the retail merchant must and did go beyond the call of duty.
"In many instances, the blameless merchant also bore the brunt of any mistakes or changes made by governmental administrators and their occasional refusal to make good on promises, such as the long-remembered 'sugar scandal'. While faced with an almost constant barrage of directives from various governmental agencies, it was the merchant who was chastis-

ed for a slight ceiling price differential or some such alteration. Our state is to be thankful for the many retail merchants who did not choose the easier route of suspending their business for the duration rather than face the headaches of hampered and restricted conditions of wartime.
"For this, the retail merchants of the state of Nebraska are to be highly commended, and to be ever thanked by both the government and the buying public. Few will ever realize the importance or the hours of extra work of the local retail merchant. He should be remembered for his devotion to duty as an American citizen."
The senator further declared his every effort will be to oppose any continued rigid control of business which is contrary to American principles. He forecast a return to pre-war business conditions, insofar as restrictions are concerned, as very soon as possible.

Seeds Are Tested By State Service

Seed germination and purity tests are made without charge on five samples for each farmer by the state seed laboratory, states County Agent Walter R. Harder.

Farmers are urged to submit samples of oats, barley, legumes, broom or other farm seeds that they expect to plant or sell in order to avoid low yields due to poor germination and to avoid scattering noxious or other weed seeds to new farms. A state law prohibits the sale of crop seeds containing noxious substances unless they are processed to kill the viability of all weed seeds.

Farmers may leave grain samples at the county agent's office at Wayne court house where they will be forwarded without charge to the state laboratory. A laboratory charge is made after five samples, however. Tests are returned in about 10 days for oats and barley. Later, during the rush

period, 15 to 20 days may be required.
