Val Peterson Is In Governor Race

Former Resident of Wayne Files for State Position After Army Service



Val Peterson, former lieutenant colonel in the army air forces and publisher of the Elgin Review, today filed for the republican nomination for governor.

The stocky, 42-year-old World War II veteran filed at Neligh, county seat of Antelope county, and at the secretary of state's office at Lincoln.

Peterson is not a newcomer to Nebraska politics. He was manager of Senator Hugh Butler's successful primary and general election campaigns in 1940 and was secretary to Governor Dwight Griswold in 1941 and 1942.

The candidate resigned as Griswold's secretary in May, 1942, to enter the army air forces. He spent 44 months in the air forces, 24 of which were in the China-India-Burma theatre.

Peterson was born to Henry C. and Herminda Swanberg Peterson at Oakland, Neb., on July 18, 1903. He was christened Frederick Valdemar Erastus Peterson, but has been known since childhood as "Val."

Peterson attended high school at Wayne and was graduated from Nebraska State Teachers college at Wayne in 1927 with an A. B. degree. He received a master of arts degree from the University of Nebraska in 1931.

Peterson worked his way through high school and college carrying the load, plowing corn and one summer cooked on a Northwestern railroad bridge gang.

Peterson was active in civic affairs in cities where he taught and was a one-time president of district three of the state teachers' association. He has been secretary and president of the Elgin Commercial club and a director of the Nebraska Association of Commercial Organization secretaries.

Peterson has married in 1929 to Elizabeth Bjork, a native of Omaha. Mrs. Peterson lived in Omaha during her husband's military service.

Funeral rites were conducted New Year's day at 2:30 from Christ Lutheran church in Norfolk and burial was in that city.

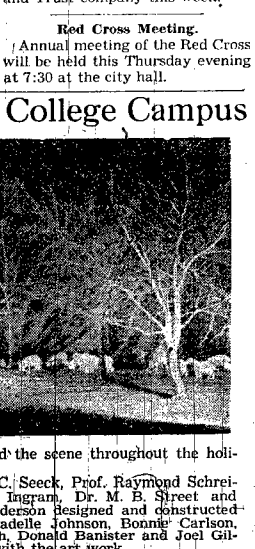
Varied Opinion Found Valuable

Which WILL DURANT well-known philosopher, writes on "What is Civilization?" for a current magazine, and from his diagnosis, we judge it will grow better or worse according to the foresight and stamina of the people. It would seem up to cultural forces to insure improvement. "If education should cease for a century," says Durant, "civilization would disappear; our grandchildren would be letterless, skill-less, lawless savages." But that will not happen. Speaking of western civilization, Durant says: "Good men and good women abound, all news to the contrary notwithstanding; and in this decade we have seen such heroism and statesmanship as may reconcile us to our bloody age. The white man's leadership was challenged, his decadence was asserted, he suspected it himself; suddenly, by leadership and strategy as excellent as any in history, he is again on the top of the world. Democracy was challenged; liberty was mugged at; great deeds, we were told, required mass obedience to supermen; but again the individualistic, law-respecting, government-denoouncing, rollicking, profane Yankee has emerged with flying colors from the most gigantic struggle in history. Our industries have won the war by indefatigable invention, skillful labor and intelligent management; our youth, which not long since ate goldfish and phonograph records, has proved its discipline, courage, ability and stamina, and has all the while retained its genial humanity. This demonstration of American vitality, this resolute resurrection of Britain, must renew and strengthen democracy. Here and in Britain and in Russia—which fought the most unstinted fight of all—victory will surely stimulate literature and art, inspiring men and women with something of the spirit of Greece after Marathon, or Rome after Actium."

Politics MAJOR candidates are appearing on the political horizon within republican ranks. Governor Dwight Griswold has entered the hustings to wrest the senatorial toga from Senator Hugh Butler who has filed for a second term. Valdemar Peterson, recently returned from army service overseas, has set out to capture the governorship, filing as a candidate on the republican ticket. Governor Griswold is winding up his third term, and his record as chief executive has given general satisfaction. Instead of being content with reasonable assurance of another term as governor, he doubtless feels an inner urge to light in the national field where more and bigger things are happening. Thus he just wants the senatorship, and to gratify that wish, he is eager to displace the present incumbent whose friends, however, reviewing his sound record, will resist the idea. The filing of Val Peterson for governor is of special interest to northeast Nebraska. He started as a youngster in Wayne, attended school and college here, now calls Elgin his home. If he wins, he will be the first person in this part of the state ever

to land in the governor's chair. Northeast Nebraska will feel entitled to a turn. Val is just a common fellow with uncommonly fine intelligence and high objectives. His feet are on the ground. The campaign promises to be lively and interesting, and if leaders avoid bitterness, the masses will relish the experience rather than develop a coolness for the republican party in which pre-primary rivalries exist.

What we plebes have long thought as a cure for quarreling Europe is now taking firm root in the minds of many leaders on that continent. An article in a current magazine sets forth the advantages of a United States of Europe. The plan as outlined would not include Russia. One area in Europe produces minerals and another foodstuffs, one coal and another timber. Orderly and sensible exchange, obedient to an impartial central government, could insure distribution according to demand. California supplies the midwest with citrus fruits, and the midwest reciprocates with necessary beef and pork. The exchange is carried on without unnecessary restraints. Why not do the same in Europe? Let the different nationalities of Europe bury their hatchets, and survive and flourish by permitting mutual advantages. Close business and social contacts would create understanding and solve most problems.

Louis Bromfield, columnist, virtually charges Murray and Reuther, labor union czars, with motives far exceeding demands for higher wages. They appear bent on impairing democracy and destroying free enterprise. Bromfield reminds Murray and Reuther that labor union forces are far outnumbered by farmers, and that they would not stand a ghost of a chance under the combined opposition of those engaged in agriculture and those dependent on it and allied with it.

Too little attention to thrift is emphasized by the editor of Pathfinder magazine. Living within one's income, saving for the proverbial "rainy day" and avoiding dependence on the government are too seldom practiced. Says the editor in conclusion: "To prevent disaster, the sense of thrift, in public and private life, must be restored. And thrift in government is far the most important."

The attempt to discredit General MacArthur, in supreme command of the south Pacific, will not in the least detract from the high appraisal of a great general and a great leader by a public, uninfluenced by jealousies or selfish considerations. It is unfortunate that one who is doing outstanding public service is often made the victim of verbal attacks by small-minded self-seekers.

The future state of man cannot reasonably be less satisfactory than that which the most hopeful finite mind can conceive. It is not probable the force fashioning qualities capable of reasoning would kick over and destroy everything at the point of dissolution.

Communists would be more consistent if they would refuse to accept help from a democracy which they would reduce to the same unhappy economic boat in which they find themselves.

Telling the truth relieves a listener from the task of separating facts from fiction. Manufacturing a story that clearly doesn't add up invariably reverts as a boom-rang.

FOR WORLD CAPITAL. Indecision in choosing a location for the proposed United Nations capital leads the Lincoln Journal to propose its city for consideration. It appears that Europe is out of the race and that some city in the United States is certain to be selected. In this country San Francisco is opposed as too far west, Boston and New York are too far east, Lincoln is centrally and thus favorably located. In addition to its location, it has sufficient size and adequate cultural advantages. Of supreme importance, we would say, is the fact that Lincoln is situated in an area—the middle west—free from alien taints and militantly firm in adhering to the best in American traditions. Lincoln is representative of sturdy, independent citizenship, and that is vital in a world whose civilization to survive needs more backbone and less make-believe. We are in favor of Lincoln.

It is neither decadent nor afraid, and it knows that there's hard work ahead. It is willing, eager, to work, to make its own security. It rises to each new day with hope, and it watches the sun set with belief in tomorrow."

Veterans' Corner

Emergency Hospitalization. Under certain conditions, emergency hospitalization is granted, but before proceeding to a veterans' administration facility, the veteran or someone acting for him, should communicate with the nearest facility by telephone or telegraph and request authority for the admission and also for transportation if necessary. Prior authority is necessary before a person may be reimbursed for any expenses incurred. Nearest facility to Wayne county: Veterans Hospital, care of Officer of the Day, Lincoln 1, Neb.

Self-Employed Veterans. A veteran who meets with the eligibility requirements and who is residing in the United States is self-employed for profit in an independent establishment, trade, business, profession, or other vocation, upon showing that he has been fully engaged in self-employment and that his net earnings in a trade, business, profession, or vocation have been less than \$100 in the previous calendar month, is entitled to receive, subject to the limitations as to time and amount, the difference (adjusted to the next highest multiple of \$1) between \$100 and the net earnings for such month. Payment to such veterans will be made by the administrator at the same time and same manner other payments are made directly to the veterans by the administrator.

Finance Forms 1382 and 1387 are available through the U. S. Employment Service, 432 Norfolk avenue, Norfolk, Neb., Tracy Leadam, veterans' employment representative.

Q.—What are the main differences between education and training under the Servicemen's Readjustment act of 1944 (G. I. Bill) and vocational rehabilitation training under Public Law 16 (Act of March 1943) which provides for the rehabilitation of disabled veterans?

A.—Briefly stated, vocational rehabilitation training is available to veterans having a service-connected, pensionable disability resulting in a vocational handicap for which training is needed to restore employability, and regardless of the length of the veteran's service, he, if deemed necessary, he given four years (48 months) of training without regard to his age at the time of entrance into service or his educational status at the time.

Education or training is available to all veterans having the required period of service and type of discharge, but may be contingent upon the veteran's education having been interrupted as a result of his entrance into the service, and the amount of active service on or subsequent to September 16, 1940, and before the termination of time devoted to the pursuit of certain courses while in the service.

LIBRARY NOTES

"The world has learned again that nations, like individuals, must know the truth if they would be free—must read and hear the truth, learn and teach the truth. We must set up an effective agency for constant and thorough interchange of thought and ideas. For there lies the road to a better and more tolerant understanding among nations and among peoples."—Harry S. Truman's address to the United Nations Conference at San Francisco, June 26, 1945. We now have in book form Modern Man Is Obsolete, by Norman Cousins. This first appeared in the form of an editorial in the Saturday Review of Literature and created such comment that it was printed in book form. The Ministerial association has

purchased several new books for the library and among them are Christ and the Fine Arts, by Maus, and The Westminster Historical Atlas of the Bible; 'The King's General, by Daphne Du Maurier, author of Rebecca and Frenchman's Creek, is here. It is another of those romantic, mysterious novels of court life. Another new novel is Ever After, by Elavith Thune. This is going to be well liked as a good entertaining story with the background of the times in England and the United States, especially the south at the time of the Spanish American war. Some of the scenes are of the fighting in Cuba and a large southern family makes up a rather involved plot.

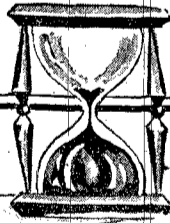

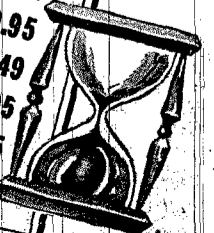
