

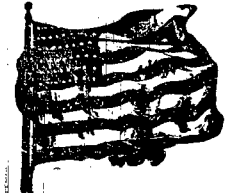
Overlooking A Recent Magazine

Winning at the polls in November will be made easier if rivals for nominations prevent show of personal bitterness, and this seems understood by all sides to pre-primary contests. Founders' day is an interest rouser. Leaders will absorb ideas, and later engage in a helpful exchange. Republicans must have learned from years of experience not to be directly and narrowly selfish. They must have their minds fixed on state and national welfare, and then, secondarily, if official lightning strikes them, accept and try to win even if the future would be personally more profitable and secure in defeat.

At a special election Tuesday of last week, Central City voted 610 to 22 to grant a franchise for natural gas. Active opposition made supporters of the movement doubtful. The latter worked hard, and scored a record expression. The comparatively few opponents showed clearly how Central City feels, that city follows its gas victory by a petition for a new school auditorium. Central City shows strong symptoms of an awakening. That is an essential in any town that wants to keep out of the clutches of the undertaker.

A story from inner administration circles quotes gingersly Secretary Harold Ickes with saying he was "embarrassed" over a question of veracity between the secretary and Edwin D. Pauley, aspiring to a place in the navy department. Pauley says Ickes misquoted him. Then the latter confessed "embarrassment," a state of mind no one who knows him would conceive possible. That is the part of the story that bears real news value.

The record shows that George Franklin Ashby, who succeeds William Jeffers as president of the Union Pacific railroad, reached his office on time more days in the last twenty years than any other employee. And such prompt observance of duty no doubt reflected qualities that landed him in the highest position within the gift of the world's greatest railway system.

General Dwight D. Eisenhower, army chief of staff, says the United States must learn to regard military strength "not as a threat, but as a necessity." He was speaking at Boston University, and he emphasized education as a means to peace fulfillment. He insists that this country must cooperate to insure peace and world order.

Lady Astor may be right in thinking more women should take an active hand in managing public affairs. At least it would seem wise to permit a more nearly equal division between men and women in exercising judgment with relation to national and international policies. It is plain that women could not bungle worse than men.

LONGEVITY.

A current magazine story reveals that science has discovered a way to lengthen human life to 150 years, and to keep a fellow that long in a state of mental and physical vigor. Anyone with a yearning to extend life beyond the usual should find out the plan and put it into effect. Another writer suggests that if one is regarded too old to do a certain thing, he should do it, anyway. The idea would seem to be to defy the threat of helpless old age. Science appears to have found something that will help something to actuate brain cells, clear eyes, put vim into feeble muscles and head off hardening arteries. The 150-year old would see a lot of changes and accumulate much experience. What will the next 75 years bring about? Will people become more and more dependent on the government and see nationalization of industry and business? Or will the country have had such a distasteful overdose of socialism or communism by 2020 that it will return to some wholesome fundamentals and rebuild on a basis of individual initiative?

ALCOHOLISM.

The Omaha World-Herald calls approving attention to "The Lost Weekend," book and motion picture as a force to lead society to consider alcoholism a disease rather than just a bad habit. Many seem able to imbibe alcoholic stimulants moderately and without visible harm. Many others can't, and they are the ones who are driven to helpless surrender and often utter ruin. Many cures have been offered, and encouraging headway has been made. For the easily inflamed appetite, the safest policy is to leave high-voltage and spirits strictly alone. Says the World-Herald: "Until fairly recently, alcoholism was usually a male problem. There were women alcoholics, true enough, but not many. Now, according to an article in the American Mercury by Alton Jesse Smith, alcoholism is becoming increasingly a female problem, too. Arrests of women for drunkenness have increased five times in a little more than 10 years. Alcoholism is not a moral, but a psychiatric problem. All the exhortations in the world do the alcoholic little good. He needs, not lectures, but help to rid himself of whatever tension drives him to drink. Various methods of curing alcoholism have been found, and while they do not always work (the results are increasingly encouraging, 'The Lost Weekend' may do more than a thousand textbooks to focus attention upon the tragedy of alcoholism and to lead people to deal with it sensibly.
