





Students may thus get a new set of ideas, prompted by experience, which they could accept or reject, as reasoning would sug-gest. As a member of the original new deal inner circle, Tugwell was a master plan-ner of things that were impractical and wouldn't work.

ner of things that were impractical and wouldn't work. A young lad stirring around to capture a job peddling bills contrasted with a too prevailing habit to want to be coaxed to work. We are reminded of how the night-mare of threatened unemployment mocks immediate labor scarcity and decreased production. Indifference to jobs at high wages, closely tagged by fear of idle armies, hungry bread lines and free soup kitchens, does not harmonize with the winning American habit of industry. Look-ing for snaps, big pay, least possible work and no responsibility needs to be jolted into an appreciation of real values. A boy on the alert to grab a job is a hopeful sign. The Dickens, Neb., preacher, whose re-cent topic was "Why All Preachers Should Be Arrested and Sent to Hell for Fiye Minutes," became so excited over the nation-wide publicity that followed that he proposed to repeat the sermon. Why preachers should be consigned to hell for any length of time is not made clear. And where the preacher would find more hell than the world has experienced in recent years is a question. Both preachers and laymen could find plenty of galling hell almost anywhere on earth without much looking.

The Case bill to curb strikes is making headway in congress. It imposes labor-management responsibility, provides for mediation boards, a cooling off period, more and easier anti-picketing injunctions and no union control over supervisory employes. The measure is the result of growing public sentiment. People are over-fed on slowed production at a time when reconversion should have the right of way. Needed production is stifled and the public is outraged.

Albert S. Goss, master of the National Grange, has issued a statement in which he charges labor-management disputes with utter disregard for the public wel-fare. He says: "Neither labor nor industry has recognized its responsibility to the pub-lic." He suggests that if labor is adequate-ly rewarded and capital is making too much, consumers should benefit by lower prices. Anyway, the innocent public should not be punished.

IN recent tests on a large dairy herd, a two-man team machine-milked 54 cows in an hour. That's just about a cow a minute. They were using the new correct milking method which often cuts milk-ing time in half. Time and labor are saved, more milk is obtained, herd profits are increased, and the danger of mastitis is lessened. The new method can be used on herds of any size, whether machine or hand-milked. nd-milked.

or hand-milked. To prepare your cows for a quick letdown of milk, first massage the udder vigorously for 20 seconds with a very warm cloth (130° F.), wrung out of a chorine (250 parts per million) solution. Second, draw two or three streams from each manta into a tria on which errorate mills of dorine to three streams from each of a strip cup—which removes milk of what count and permits inspection for milk indicating mastitis. These two ulate the cow's milk glands and cause the cow's milk glands. Milking steps stimulate the cow's milk gladds and cause her to let down in about 40 seconds. Milking should be started within a minute after udder massage and finished within four minutes, includ-ing brief stripping either by hand or machine. It is good practice to sterilize teat cups in a chlorine solution after each cow is milked. Most cow's respond to this correct milking meth-od. Giving heifers an occasional udder massage before they freshen helps develop them into fast milkers. In the case of cows mot pretviously trained

In the case of cows not previously trained f fast milking, most of them will respond to ster milking if milking time is shortened gradu-y to from three to four minutes.
