Prof. O. R. Bowen Speaks On Great Emancipator At Convocation.

Lincoln stands out as the greatest American, stated Prof. O. R. Bowen in speaking at college convocation on the life of the great emancipator. Lincoln, who was born in Kentucky 137 years ago, emerged from poverty and pioneer environment and stands without a peer. H. G. Wells in about 1915 selected Lincoln as this nation's greatest. He achieved this distinction.

To be great one must do something unique. Prof. Bowen mentioned that three prominent Americans of Lincoln's time have not stood out as Lincoln, California because he advocated nullification, Clay because he was a compromiser and Webster because he wavered on his March 7 speech. Lincoln stands in a class by himself. Lincoln was one of the youngest presidents, only 52 when he took office. He was a master of diplomacy, of the English language in spite of poor schooling, a man of great wisdom, a typical American and a man who loved peace but led his nation through war.

Lincoln gave his life that this nation might have a "new birth of freedom" and that "government of the people, by the people and for the people might not perish from the earth."
