





Ickes Quits NCRIMINATIONS flew thick and fast in Washington the past week over the Ickes-Pauley inci-dent. The nomination of Edwin

Quits and fast in Washington the past dent. The nomination of Edwin W. Pauley as assistant secretary of the navy aroused Harold L. Ickes, then secre-tary of the interior, to testify before the senate naval committee that Pauley had approached him with the suggestion that \$300,000 in campaignfunds could be raised from oil men if the government would not press the tidelands oil title suit. Pauley said Ickes misunderstood and was mistak-en. The upshot was Ickes' resignation, and the retired secretary's sharply-worded ex-planation to the country. President Truman stood firm in his ap-pointmept, and hurried Ickes into retire-ment. The, president and Ickes contra-dicted leach other. The former secretary employed his' customary acid language in handling the crisis, and for the first time in his nublic career he was able, on account of the public interest involved, to gain popular support. Icke's says the president disclaimed need of an investigation by the justice de-partment of Pauley's senate committee testimony, as suggested by the retired secretary. It is doubtful if sufficient Tru-man support can be arrayed against the opposition to secure Pauley's confirmation. Perhaps the easiest way out for the presi-dent would have been to persuade Pauley to withdraw himself as a candidate. But evidently the president preferred to run the chance of defeat. The result is not re-assuring for the administration. It will increase difficulties which had already become tough. increase diffic become tough.

A recent Gallup poll sensing public opinion on congressional action to restrict unions and prevent strikes showed 74 per cent in favor of doing sp. It was found the country, is not against organized labor, but against a wholesale tie-up of industry, as has been experienced of late.

That's Nebraska — the state there is no place like which."







**Dodder** Is Found

A number of farmers have brought plant and grain samples to the county extension office which have been identified as dod-der. This plant parasite is one of the secondary noxious weed plants in Nebraska. Dodder plants should

the secondary noxious weed plants in Nebraska. Dodder plants should not be allowed to seed as they will destroy the sale value of any farm seed crop. Farmers should be on the alert to avoid purchasing and planting any seed i that contains dodder seed. It is found in alfalfa, red clover, flax and similar crop seed. Farmers should submit sam-ples of purchased seeds of these crops to the state seed laboratory before planting them unless they know the seller is unquestionably reliable and has state seed test on samples.






