As to whether the world is gaining or slipping in religion was discussed by Town Meeting of the Air Thursday evening. The fact that two speakers charged positions during the day, one turning from negative to affirmative and another from affirmative to negative, showed lack of deeply rooted opinions.

Probably people have veered away from dogmas without losing Christian principles. They emphasize spiritual virtues more and forms and ceremonies less. War is a terrible assault on the teachings of the Nazarene, though it may lead despairing mortals to give more trust to the supernatural and less to the material.

Bishop Oxnam was no doubt the ablest speaker, and he presented an array of convincing figures and arguments in support of the growth of religion.

Pluck with Age. The story of 83-year-old Governor Walter S. Goodland of Wisconsin, shows how righteousness may rule in politics and public service. It shows how majority favor may be gained by defying popular trends and refusing to buckle to special groups.

The aging governor is the very antithesis of the too often practiced policy in politics of being all things to all men. He thinks for himself and speaks what he thinks without palaver.

A Public Nuisance. If tipping on trains and in hotels and other places were abolished, so that the word could be marked obsolete by conning dictionary makers, there would be more practical democracy in service.

An Encouraging Report. A late speaker in Wayne acclaimed the spirit of this community in handling public service. This is gratifying. And this opinion from the outside is not exceptional.

Perhaps Better Health. If eating whole wheat bread conduces to health, marketing might if it is proposed to increase help to hungry nations, the result may be the development of a sturdier race.

Science has moved ahead five centuries with invention of the atomic bomb, stated Mrs. Houghton, and civilization must catch up. Civilization would be destroyed if this bomb were used in another war.

Mrs. Houghton noted that Russia and the United States are the two strongest nations in the world. "We must either get along with Russia or we'll go to war with her."

The American home must have a new infusion of tolerance, justice, thrift, discipline and religion. Crime does not usually enter a home in which the father is a pal of his son.

Regarding the public school, Mrs. Houghton believes that never was there such a need for teachers who can develop character.

Churches must provide a good spiritual background, the speaker stated. Everyone should have a church home. Returning veterans should be welcomed by church leaders.

"People must change to make peace lasting. No man can have hate in his heart for any other man if we are to have peace."

Words on Penny Take on Meaning

Film Shown Kiwanis Gives Meaning of American Way of Life.

"It's Your America," a war department film emphasizing appreciation of American freedom as gained from inscriptions on a penny, was shown for Kiwanians Monday by Dr. Geo. Seek.

The film pictures an American soldier who at first dislikes army life. The youth's attention is called to a Lincoln penny he holds which was coined in 1918, the year of his birth.

Later in Great Britain the youth talked to a British soldier who was interested in England's great men. This led the American to appreciate America's statesmen.

In battle the American soldier was wounded and the surgeon who cared for him explained the meaning of "E pluribus unum" which is the Latin for "One from many."

Later the American takes part in the liberation of Europe and from a French soldier whose wife had been killed and who has himself served in a concentration camp, the American learned that army service affords opportunity to stand for the ideals on which America is founded.

County Pioneer Passes at Home

Funeral Services Conducted Wednesday Afternoon For R. R. Smith.

R. R. Smith, nearly 87, pioneer whose life span permitted him to witness the greatest changes in history, passed away at his home in Wayne Sunday evening. Mr. Smith was strong and active until about a year ago. Since New Year's he had failed rapidly. He seemed unusually well last week and he enjoyed four sons and others. He visited with Mrs. Smith Saturday and enjoyed supper about 5 o'clock. Then he went to sleep. About 9 he lapsed into unconsciousness and at the close of Sunday he died into eternal Sabbath.

Funeral rites were conducted Wednesday at 2 from the home, Rev. J. B. Proett was in charge and he was assisted by Rev. P. Pearson, Prof. Russell Anderson sang "Wonderful Peace," written by a friend of Mr. Smith, and "Abide with Me," Prof. Albert G. Carlson was accompanist. Committal in charge of Beckenhauer mortuary followed in Greenwood cemetery. Pallbearers were L. B. McClure, Dr. Theophilus, Mayor Herman Lundberg, Carl Wright, Fred Berry and Senator W. A. Crossland.

Robert Russell Smith was born May 27, 1859, in Delaware county, Iowa. He was the 7th of 12 children, six sons and six daughters, born to Silas H. and Margaret Wilson Smith, and he was the last of the family.

From Sturdy Ancestors. Mr. Smith's ancestors were God-fearing pioneers who settled in Pennsylvania in the early days of colonization and who helped lay the foundations for rugged American individualism. They made decisions and had the courage that goes with conviction. The family followed trends of the times and moved westward. His parents, with five children, came to eastern Iowa by covered wagon in 1857 and took up the struggles of pioneer life on untamed farm land where every family had to be largely self-supporting. At the age of 5, Robert's responsibility was to care for the sheep out on the prairie. No fences marked man's domain; cattle roamed at will; and the pioneer had no disturbed the prairie ratter, Barfoot and simply clad in homespun.

Robert conquered fears for he knew that the sheep were the source of food and clothing. His father was a devout man and led in establishing the church which stands as an active memorial to the family. When deceased was 17, the Smiths moved to Dallas, Texas, then a place of 5,000, and the family pasture is now in the heart of that city.

Becomes Pioneer. Robert Smith returned to Iowa in 1880 and he no longer became a pioneer. He came to Nebraska in February, 1881, just on the wake of the terrible blizzard of that year. His first crossing of the Missouri was on ice. He gave a lively man \$5 to drive him to Covington. The thermometer stood at 35 below. Trains could break drifts no farther than Jackson. From there he and the train crew walked to Ponca. Then deceased walked over the trackless snow-clad hills to Elm City, a pioneer village four miles east of Coziedge.

Mr. Smith married Etta M. Morrison of Elm City May 9, 1881. To them were born eight children, Glenn H., who died in Cleveland in 1911, J. G. Gall, now Mrs. Geo. Hughes of Wayne, George Lee of Herman, Minn., Hartford H. of Rouge River, Ore., W. Dean, James M. and R. Ren, all of Yankton, S. D., and Lula, now Mrs. Chris Pedersen of Alberta, Minn.

To County Early. The family came from Cedar to Wayne county in 1890 and for several years Mr. Smith was in the elevator business at Carroll and Winside. Then he bought his home farm six miles west of Wayne. Because of Mrs. Smith's ill health, the family bought a residence in Wayne July 19, 1912. Mrs. Smith died July 14, 1922.

Mr. Smith married Maude Joseph, descendant of an Iowa pioneer family associated with Mr. Smith's boyhood, August 25, 1925, and these two have continued in the family home.



Ickes Quits

INCORIMINATIONS flew thick and fast in Washington the past week over the Ickes-Pauley incident. The nomination of Edwin W. Pauley as assistant secretary of the navy aroused Harold L. Ickes, then secretary of the interior, to testify before the senate naval committee that Pauley had approached him with the suggestion that \$300,000 in campaign funds could be raised from oil men if the government would not press the tidelands oil title suit. Pauley said Ickes misunderstood and was mistaken. The upshot was Ickes' resignation, and the retired secretary's sharply-worded explanation to the country.

President Truman stood firm in his appointment, and hurried Ickes into retirement. The president and Ickes contradicted each other. The former secretary employed his customary acid language in handling the crisis, and for the first time in his public career he was able, on account of the public interest involved, to gain popular support.

Ickes says the president disclaimed need of an investigation by the justice department of Pauley's senate committee testimony, as suggested by the retired secretary. It is doubtful if sufficient Truman support can be arrayed against the opposition to secure Pauley's confirmation. Perhaps the easiest way out for the president would have been to persuade Pauley to withdraw himself as a candidate. But evidently the president preferred to run the chance of defeat. The result is not reassuring for the administration. It will increase difficulties which had already become tough.

Ministers and others speak glibly of sin. What was considered sinful a half century ago is soft-pedaled or treated indifferently today. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." How does one do that? Go to church and then sit in a corner and memorize the scriptures? Or take a ride or play golf? Visit a sick friend? Do work on the excuse one is just getting an ox out of the ditch? Is thinking evil thoughts a sin? Covetousness corrodes conscience, but is it as much of a sin as oldsters were led

to believe? Really, what is sin? This department will give \$5 for what it considers the best answer, expressed in not more than 25 words. We will be the sole judge. Answers should reach us not later than March 10.

Encouraging news came in the report Sunday that the steel strike was over and that 750,000 workers would return to their jobs. So many lines of production depend on steel that end of the shut-down will enable many other industries to resume or speed operations. It is hoped the strike fever is generally at an end, and it is a safe bet that strikers feel as deeply relieved as other groups. Reconversion and reconstruction have been bogged down since early last fall by thousands of voluntary idlers, and the public had become profoundly incensed. Disappearance of the strike nightmare will bring things urgently needed for civilian use. It is hoped a brighter day is just ahead.

Not in many years have there been so many sales of rural and town properties as there have been in recent months. Prices are high, and doubtless those who sell, think they have reached a peak. Probably those who buy, have a feeling they will go higher. Whether persons who retire from farm life or who move to distant farm areas will be better satisfied only experience will determine. Whether one who sells in town to relocate elsewhere or to get away from hard routine will later increase content or will feel like kicking himself, is another question impossible to settle in advance.

Republican Founders' day last week was a get-together occasion for state leaders. Active candidates for governor and United States senator aroused special interest. Val Peterson, for state executive, is recognized as a small-town boy, grown to the stature of well-balanced maturity. Senator Hugh Butler, who is asking for a second term, has the advantage of both farm and city experience. He knows farm values, and understands what a farmer needs to insure largest prosperity and greatest content.

A recent Gallup poll sensing public opinion on congressional action to restrict unions and prevent strikes showed 74 per cent in favor of doing so. It was found the country is not against organized labor, but against a wholesale tie-up of industry, as has been experienced of late.

In explaining that Henry Wallace is the only left-winger remaining in the cabinet, the Norfolk Daily News predicts that Wallace will take to the stump for left-wing congressional candidates this year, and thus put himself in shape to cast his hat into the presidential ring in 1948.

The boy who leaves home on the ground that he wants to live his own life usually gets back before he becomes hopelessly damaged. He soon realizes that home advantages and sympathies abound nowhere else.

One who offers defiance ahead of anything to defy, is just constitutionally unsuited to get along agreeably with fellow-travelers.

Russia's first national election in eight years was proclaimed a triumph for communism, though there was only one set of candidates in the field, and those who opposed the regime, had to scratch the ticket to express themselves. Time magazine mentions it as the "biggest, most meaningless election on earth." But Candidate Joseph Stalin made grateful acknowledgment just as strong as though opposition had been possible. His speech praised the soviet government as the best in the world, and expressed fear of capitalist encroachments, apparently overlooking the force offered by capitalist democracy in saving it from defeat early in the late war. In bragging to his people, Stalin told how Russia would go forward and surpass other nations. He said it would prepare to meet any eventuality. The United States, most resourceful country in the world, has been good enough to pour men and billions in money into the defense of freedom at a most critical juncture. Russia has a queer way of showing appreciation. The World-Herald suggests "dealing firmly, but honorably with Russia, shunning both appeasement and careless accusations."

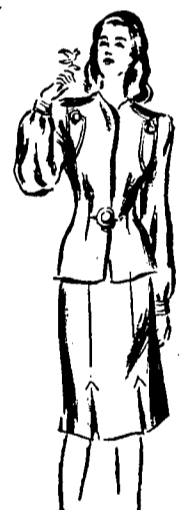

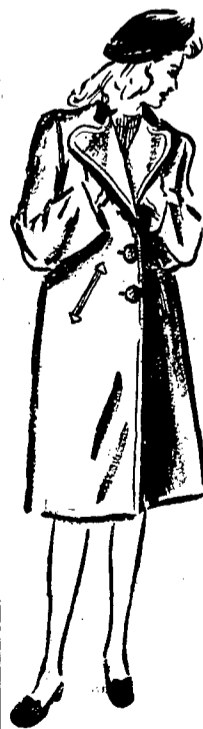

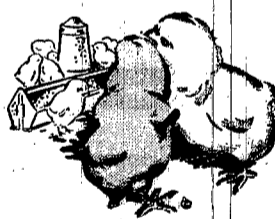

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Dodder Is Found In Grain Samples

A number of farmers have brought plant and grain samples to the county extension office which have been identified as dodder. This plant parasite is one of the secondary noxious weed plants in Nebraska. Dodder plants should not be allowed to seed as they will destroy the sale value of any farm seed crop. Farmers should be on the alert to avoid purchasing and planting any seed that contains dodder seed. It is found in alfalfa, red clover, flax and similar crop seed. Farmers should submit samples of purchased seeds of these crops to the state seed laboratory before planting them unless they know the seller is unquestionably reliable and has state seed test on samples.

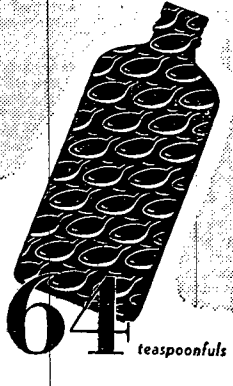

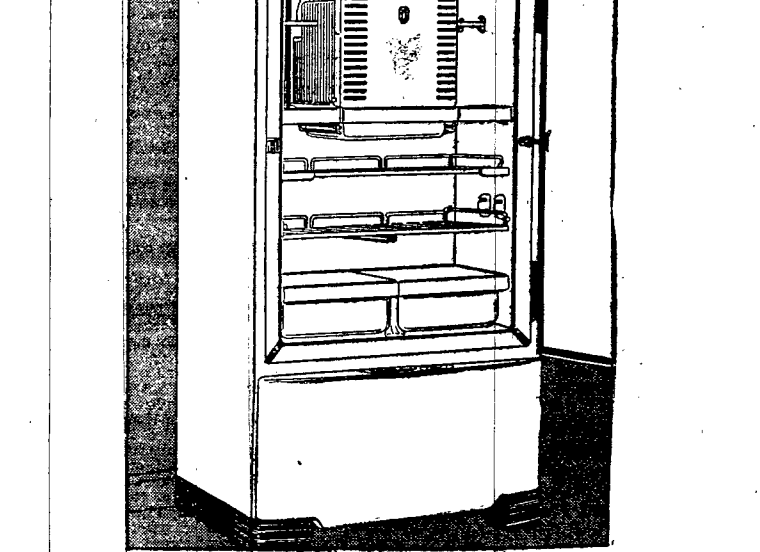


